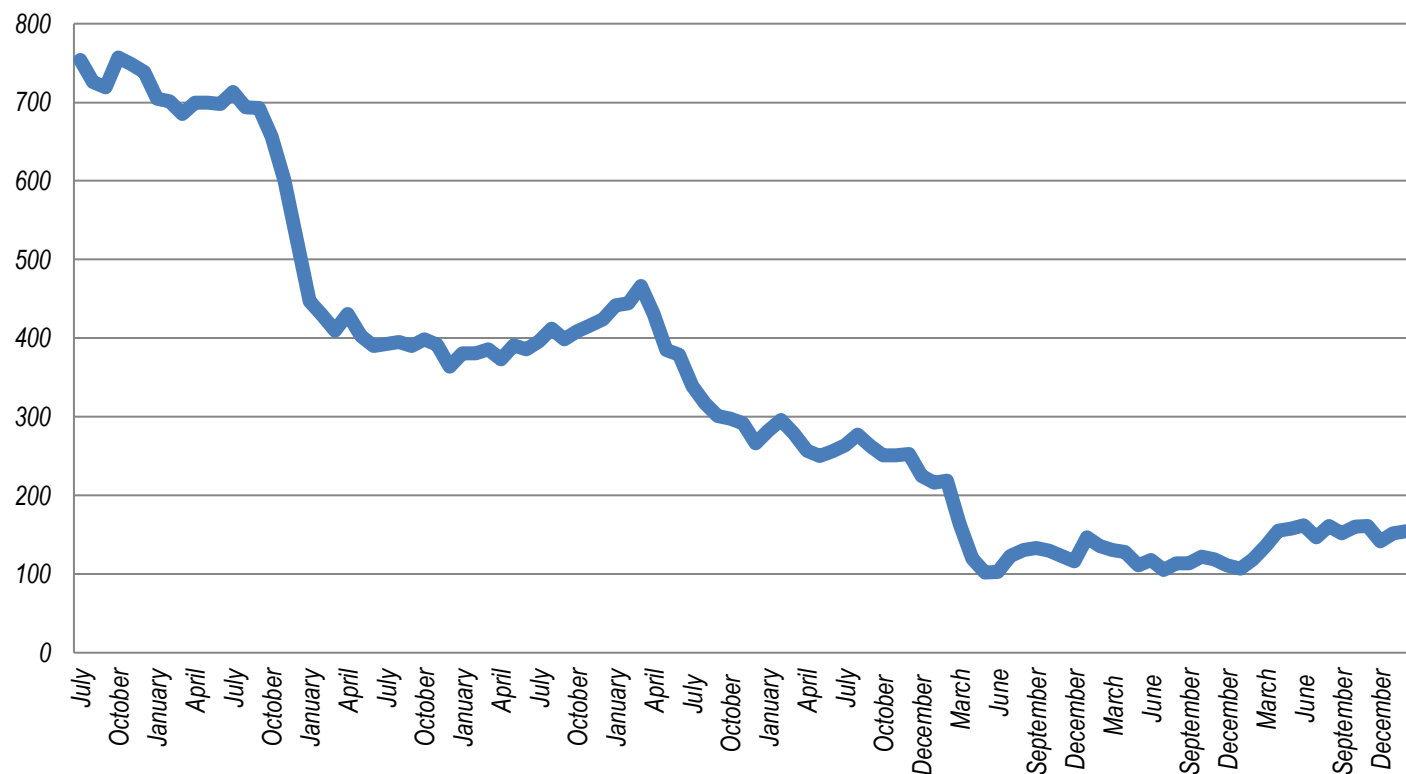

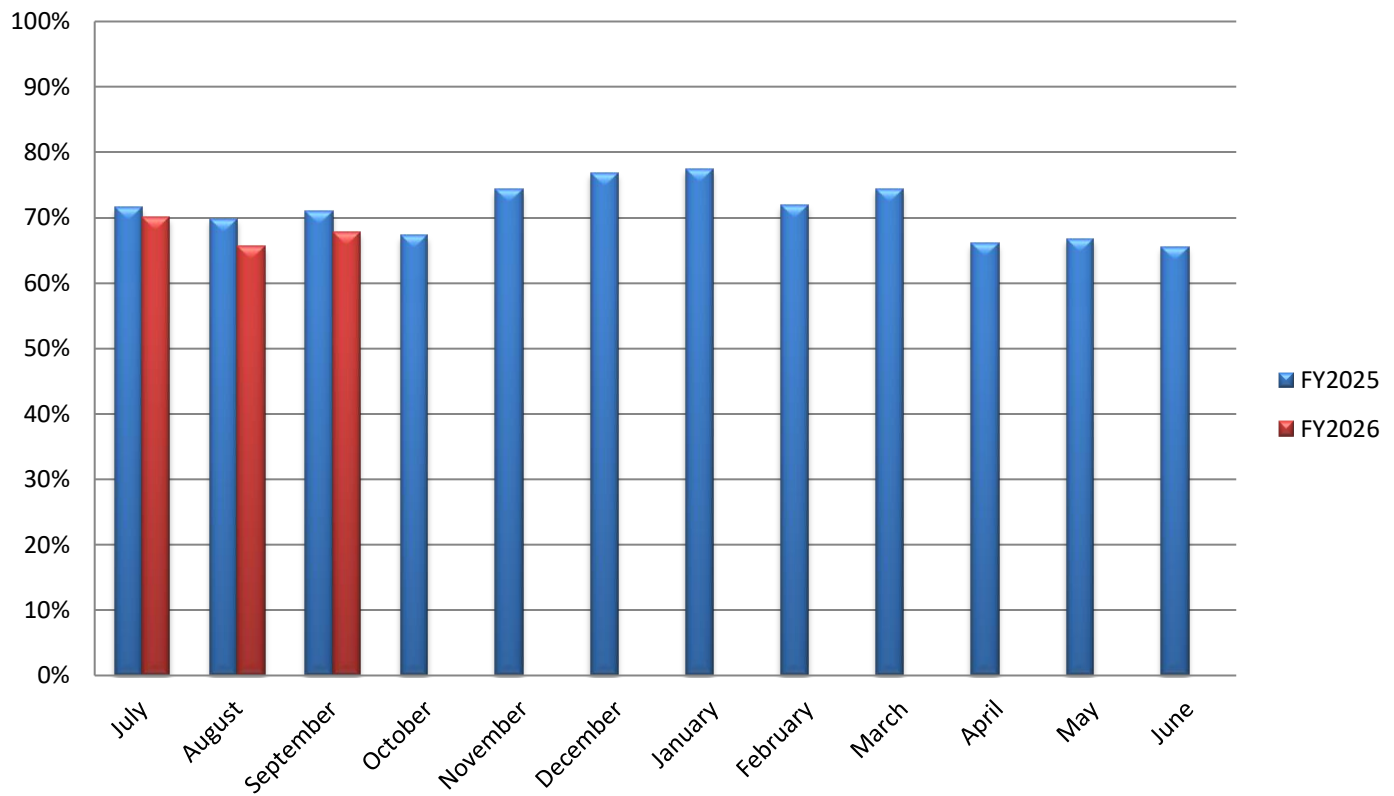

Chart 5: Number of Treatment Participants by Facility

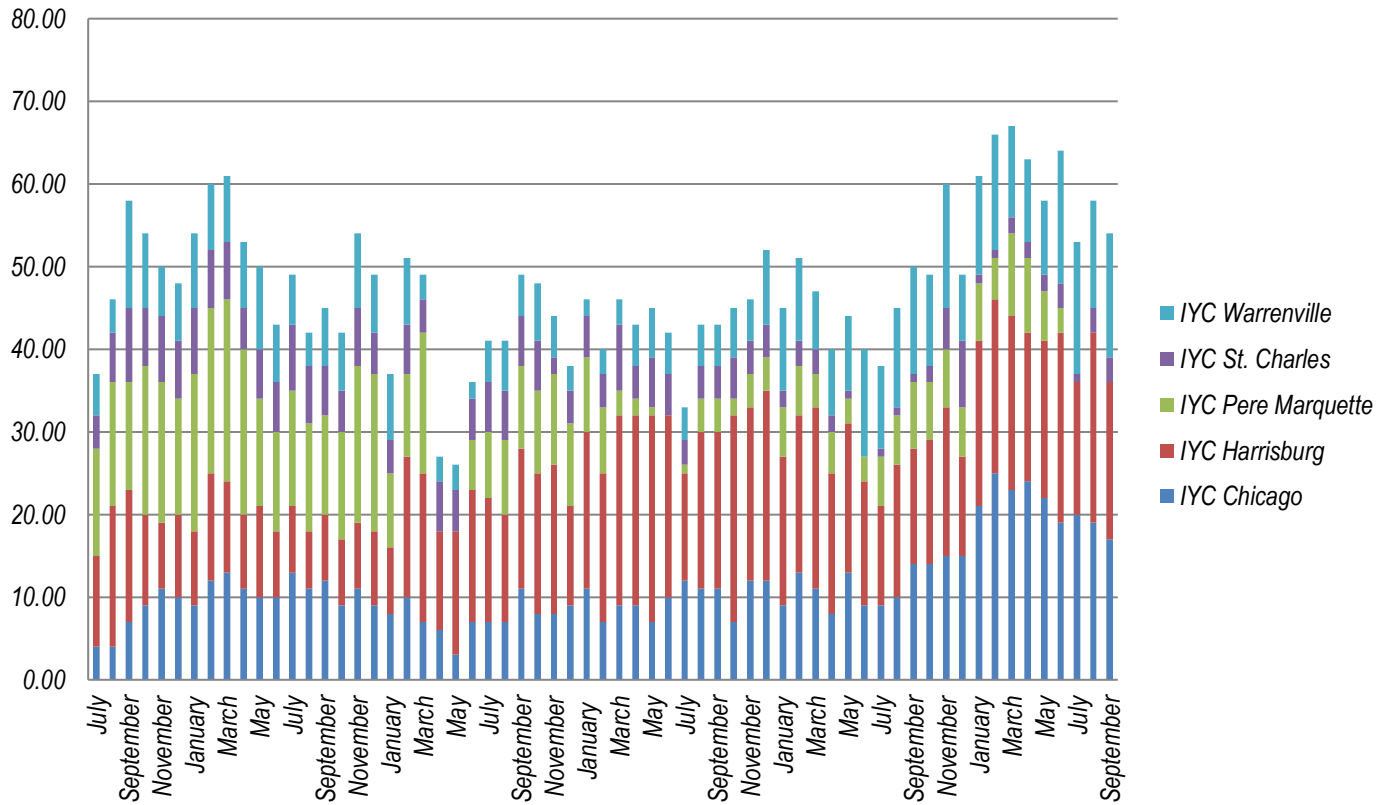
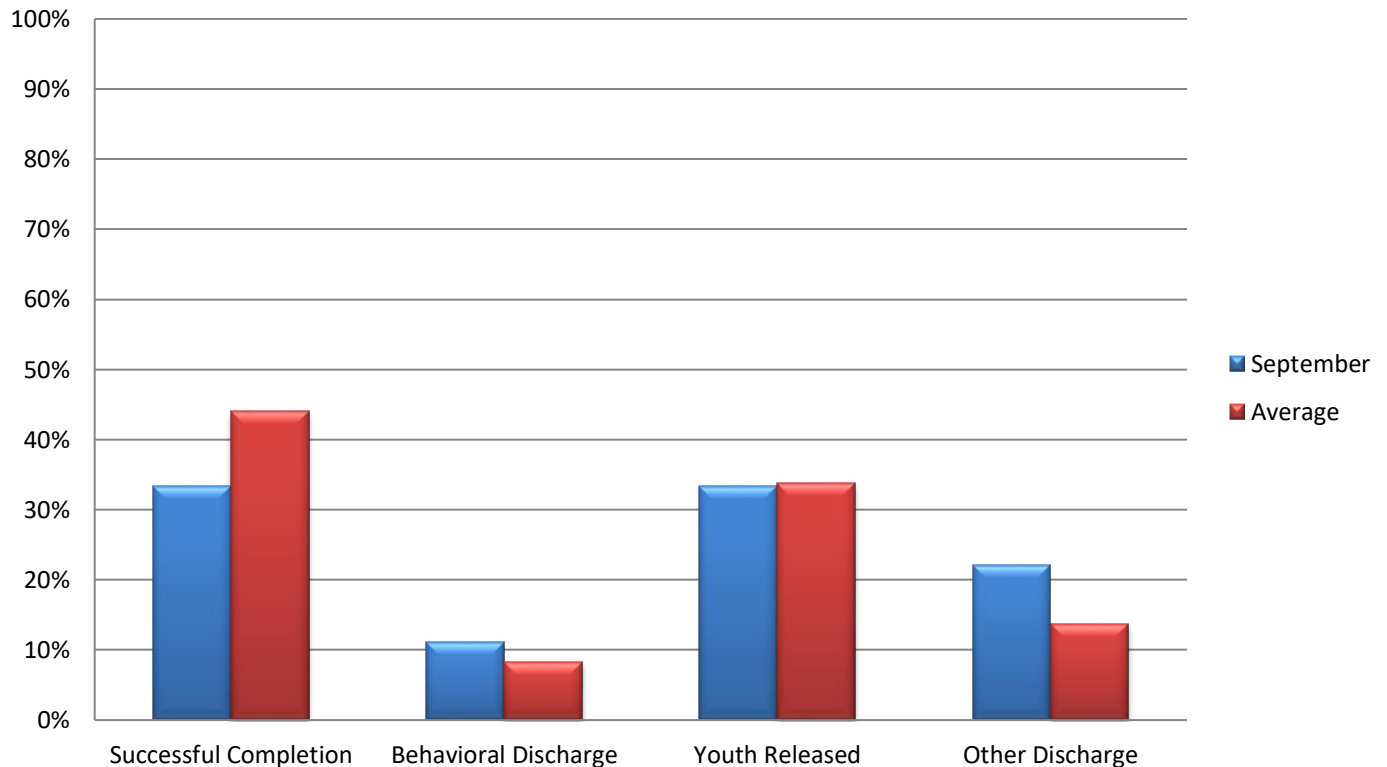


Chart 6: Discharges by Reason

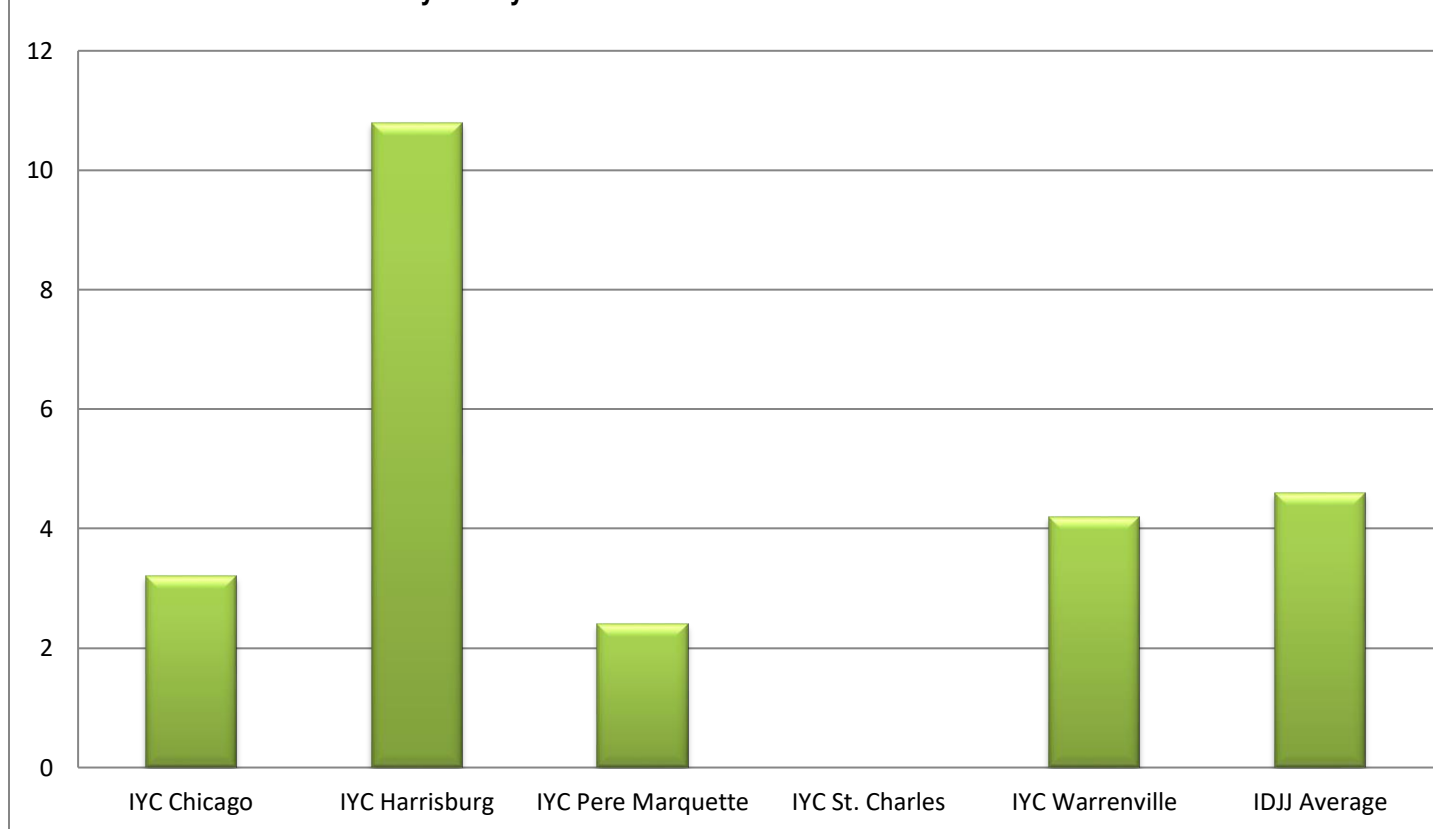

Chart 9: Rate of Reportable Incidents Per 100 Youth

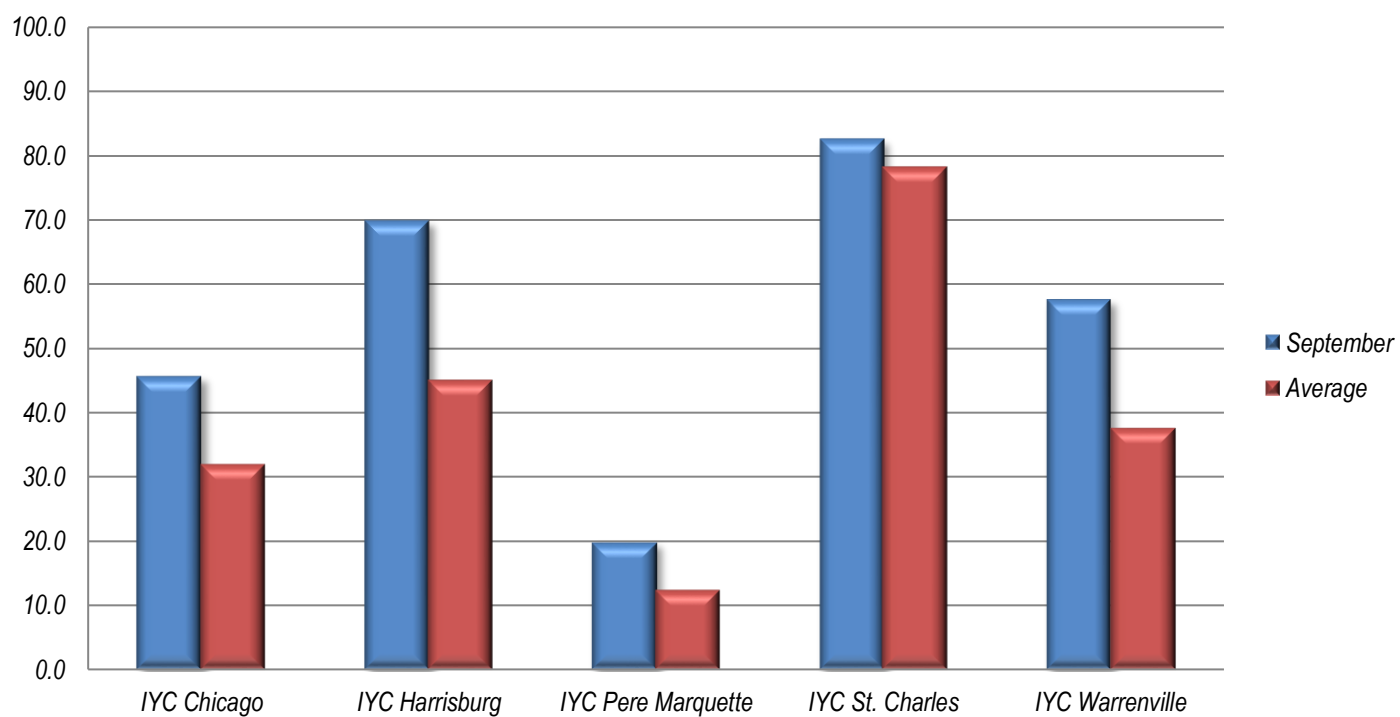
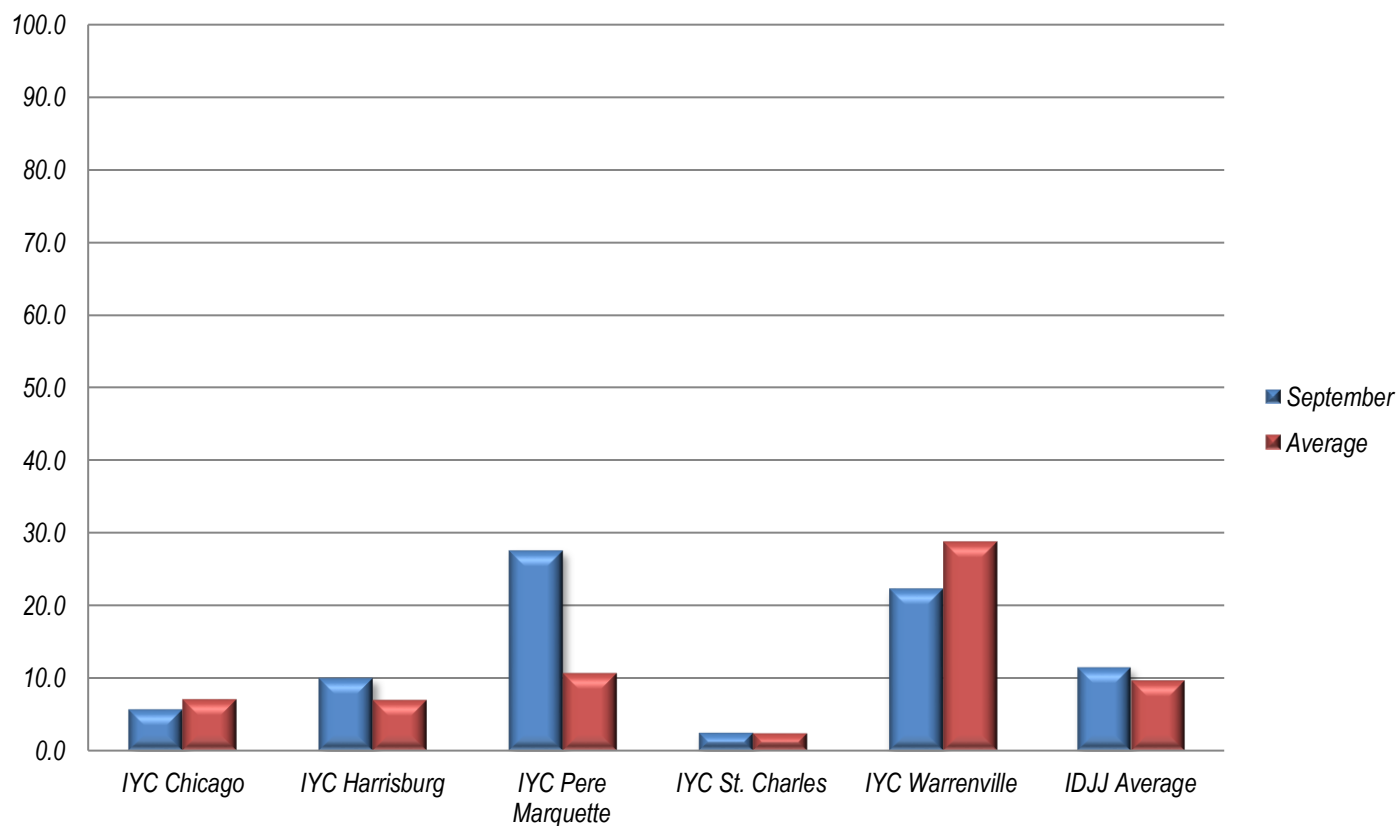


Chart 10: Rate of Youth on Staff Assault Per 100 Youth

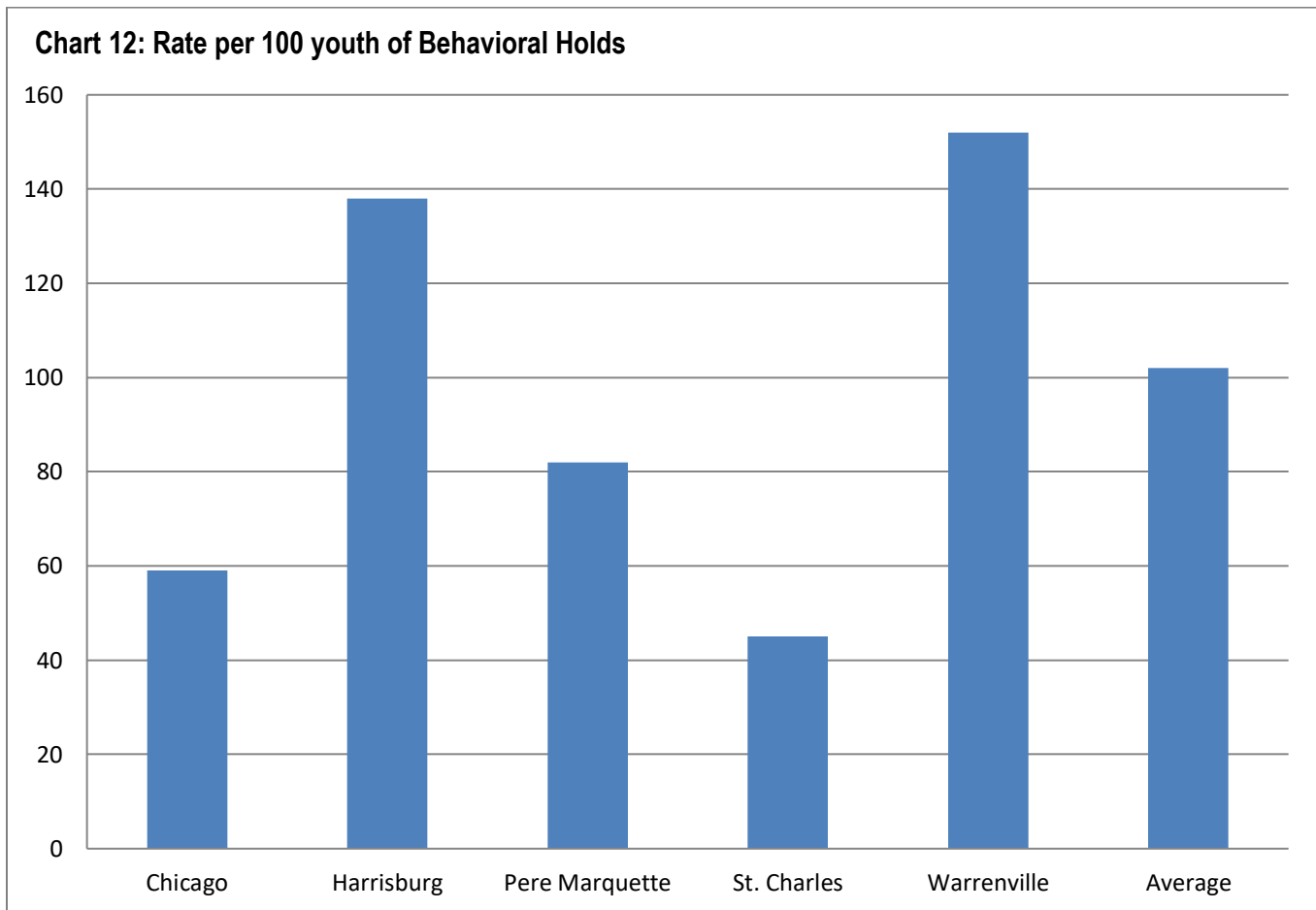

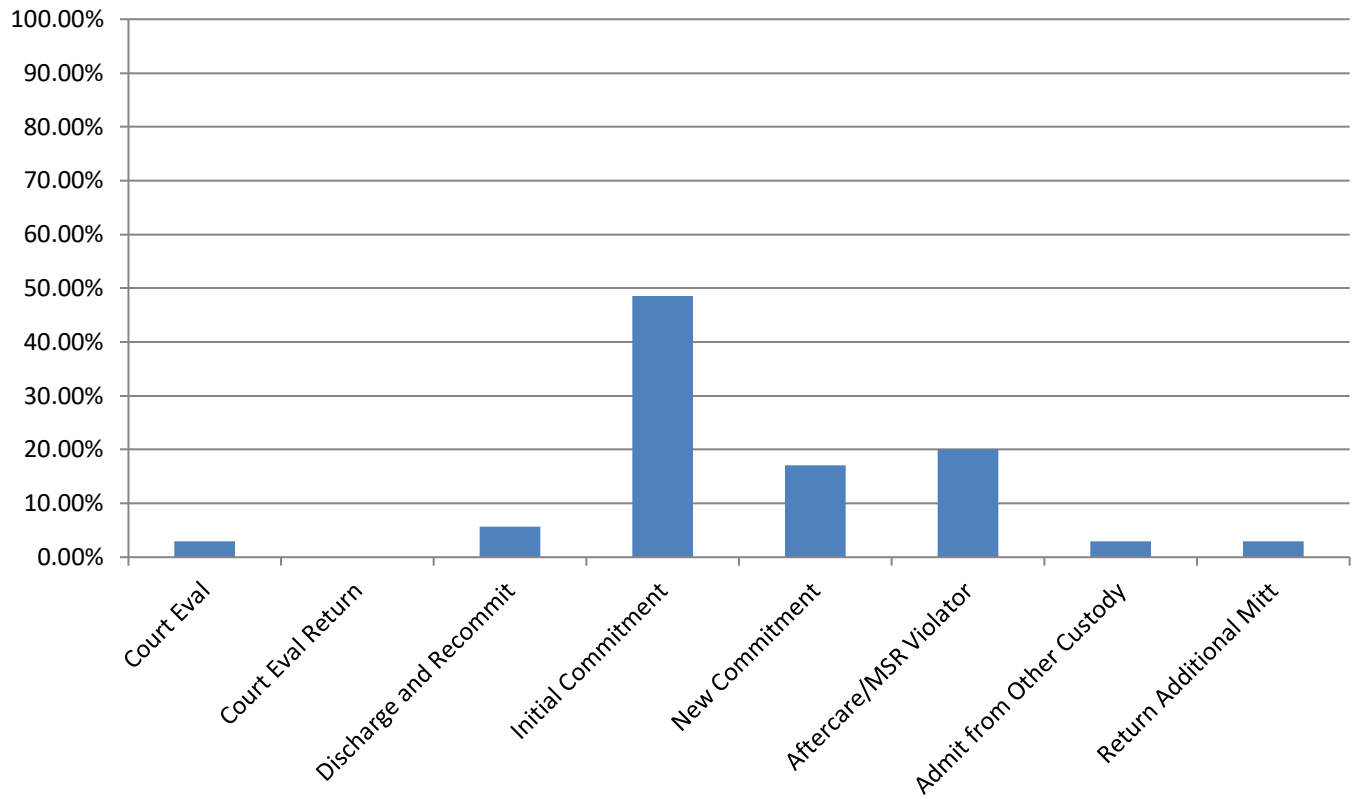

Chart 14: Types of Adjustments used by Agency

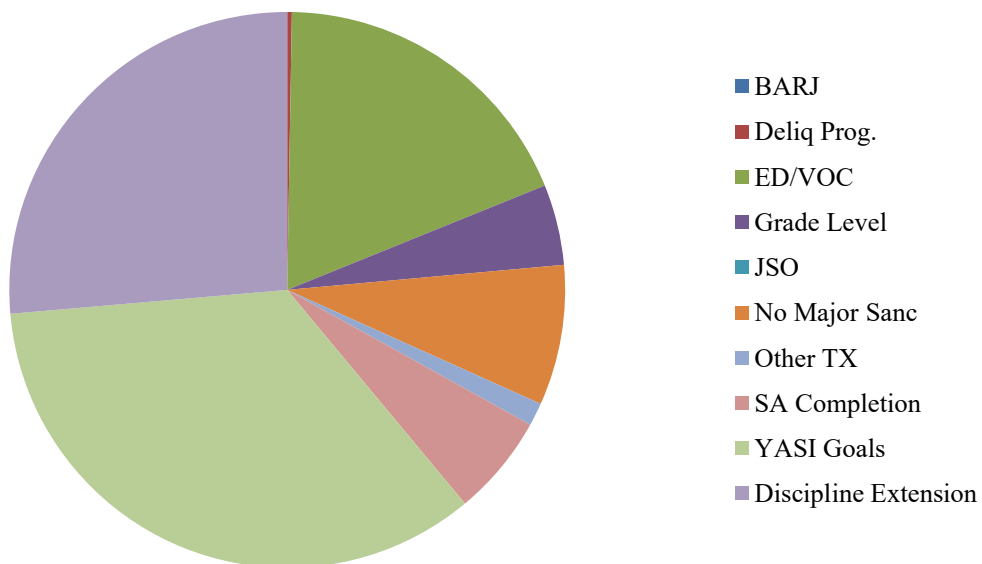


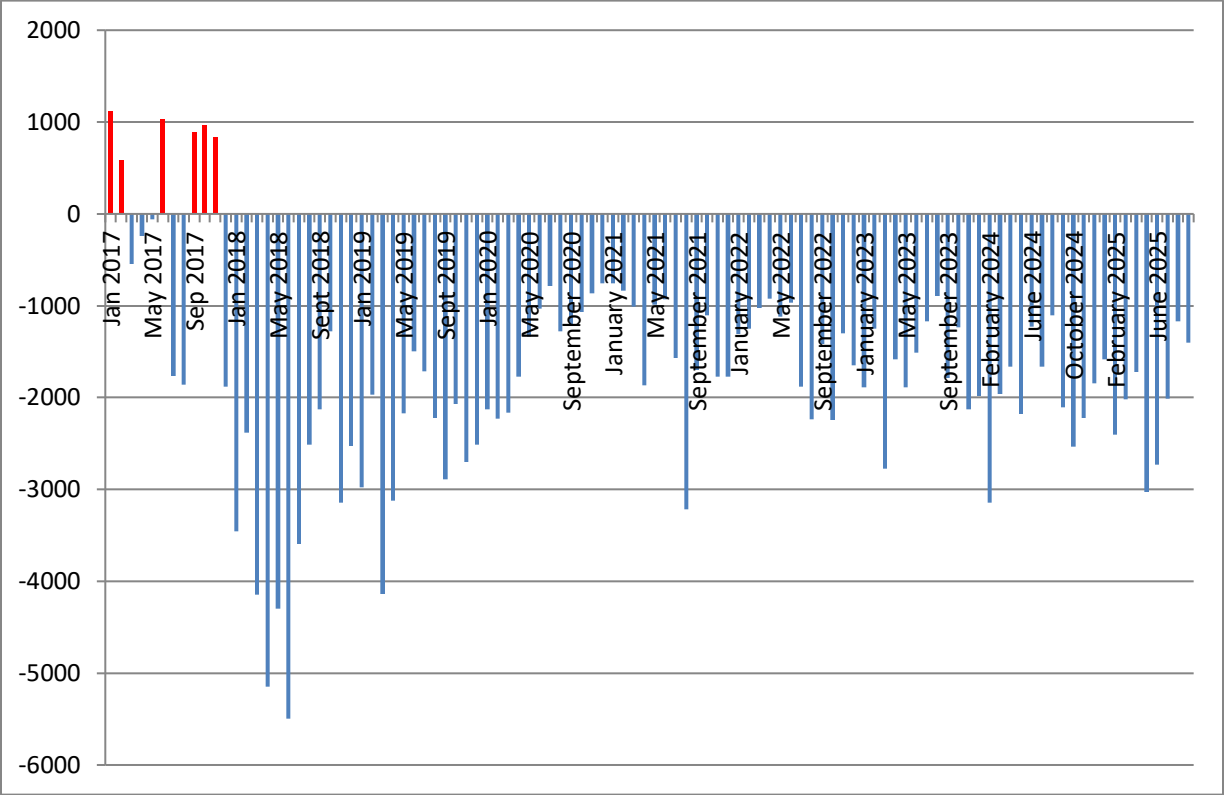

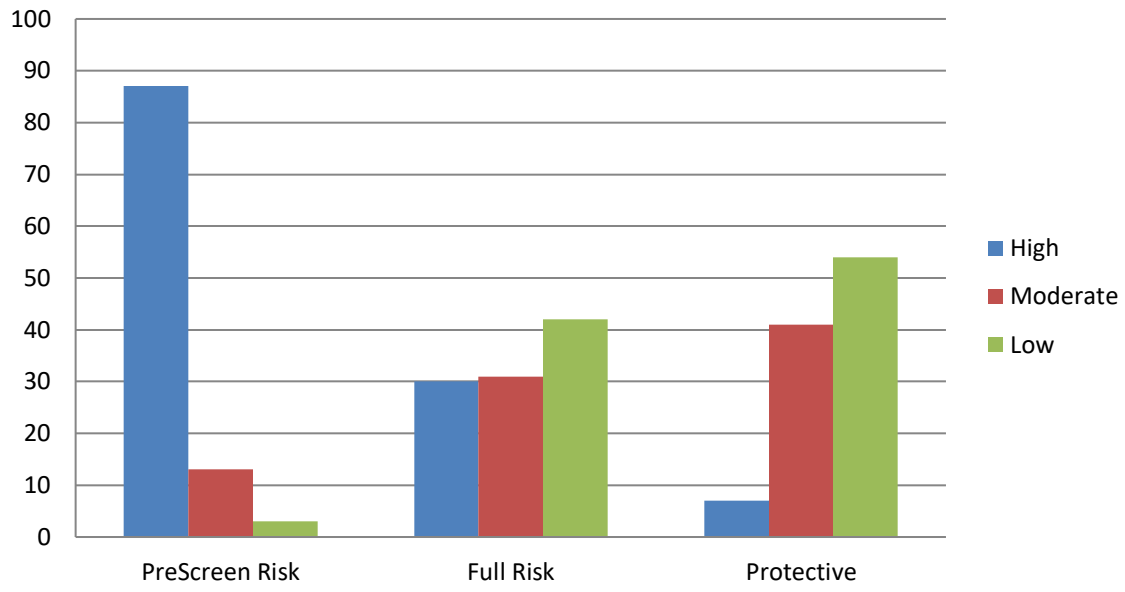

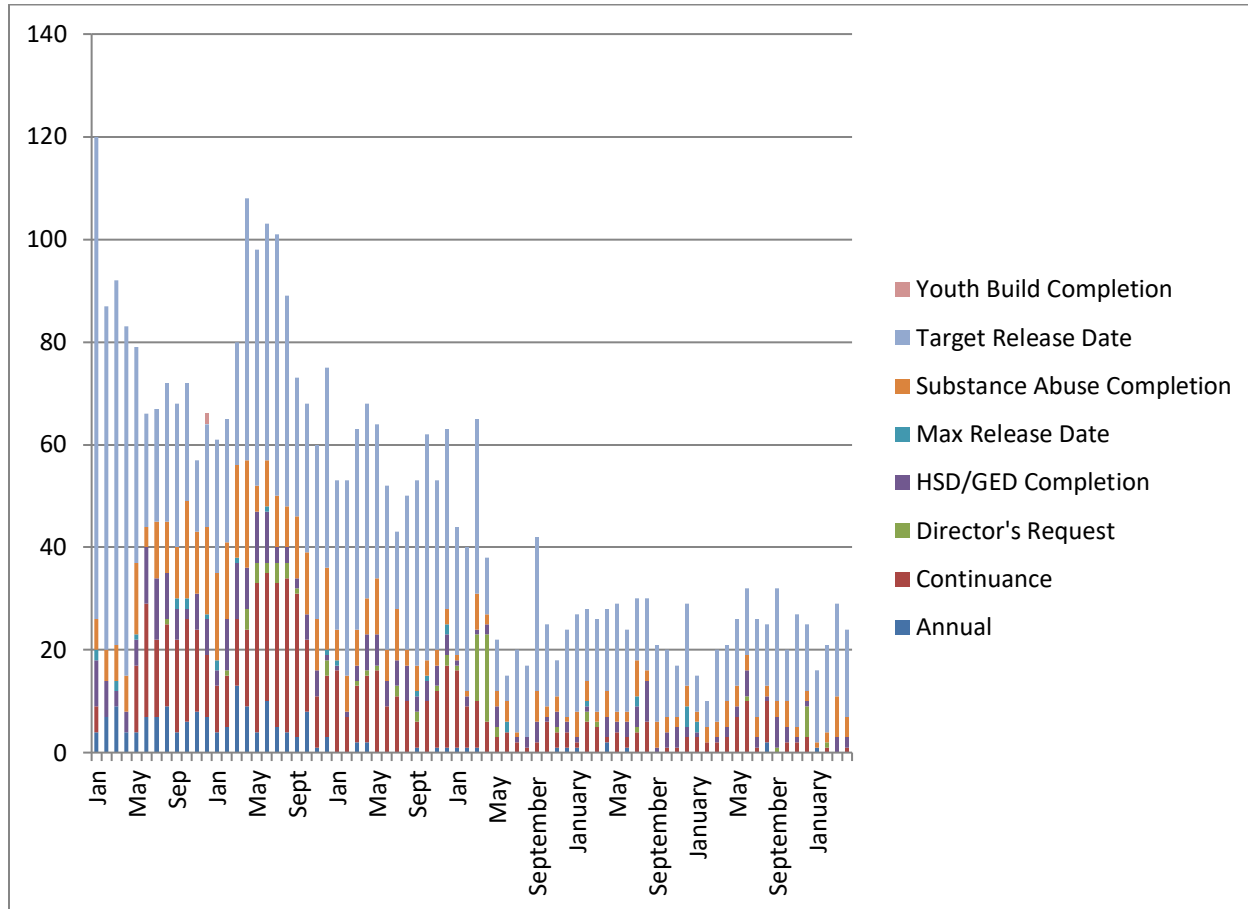

Chart 16: Risk and Protective Levels of Youth



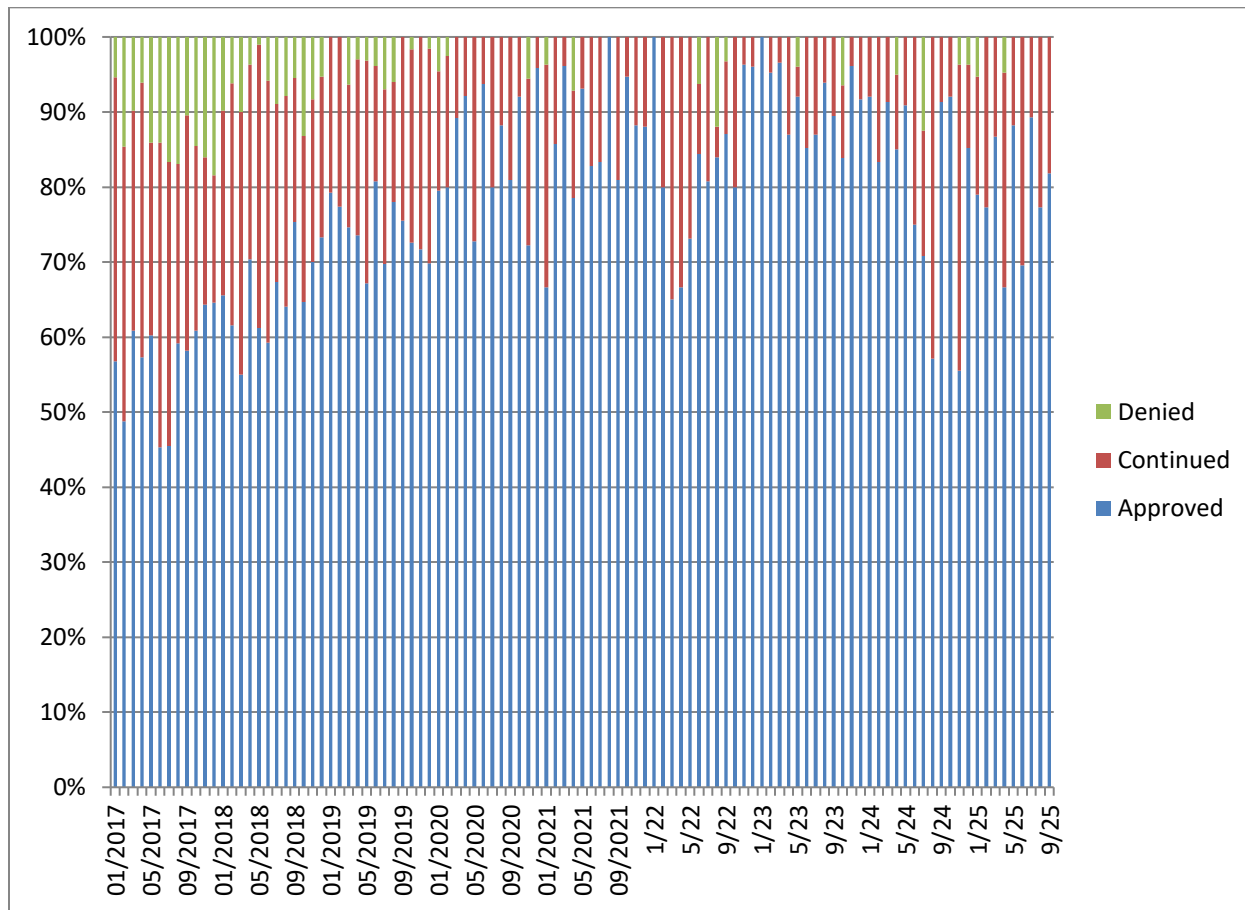
