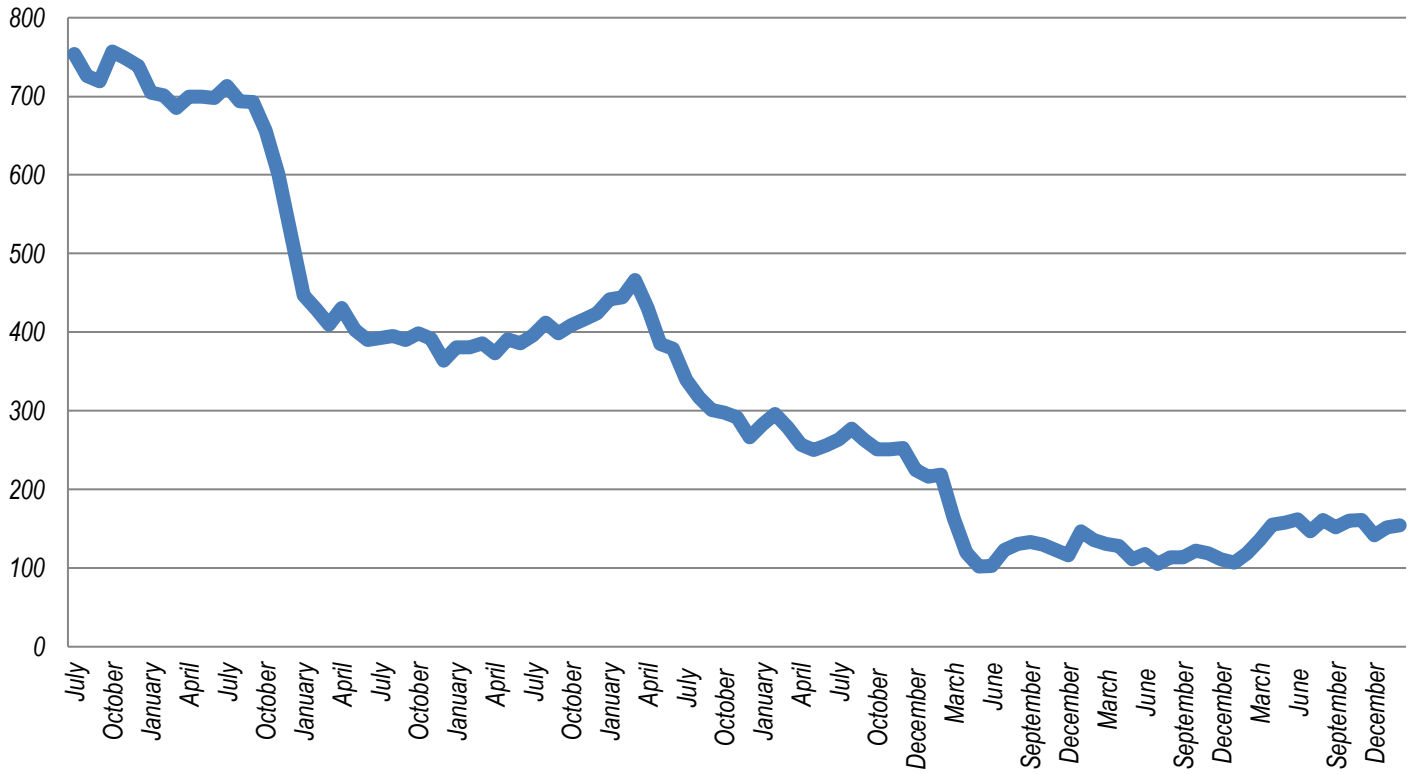

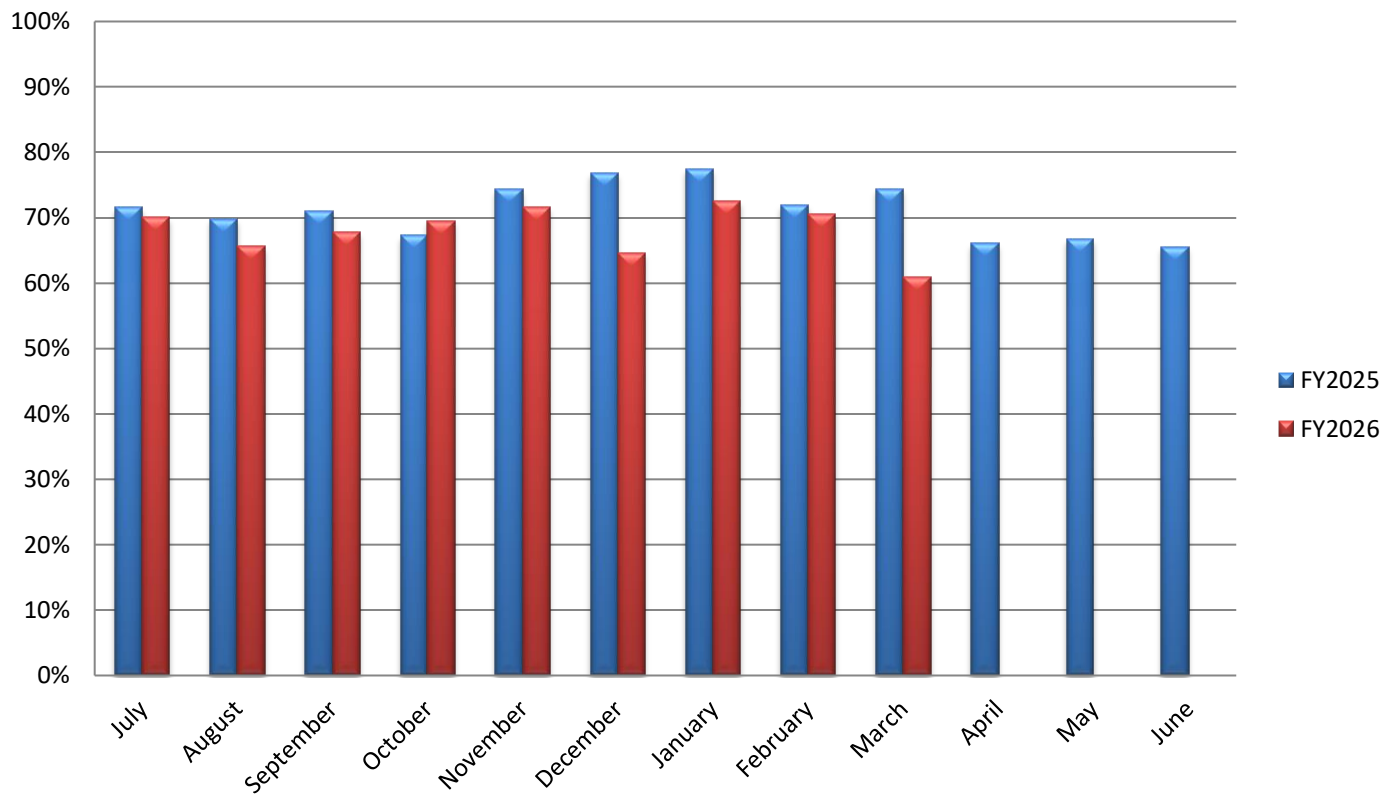

Chart 5: Number of Treatment Participants by Facility

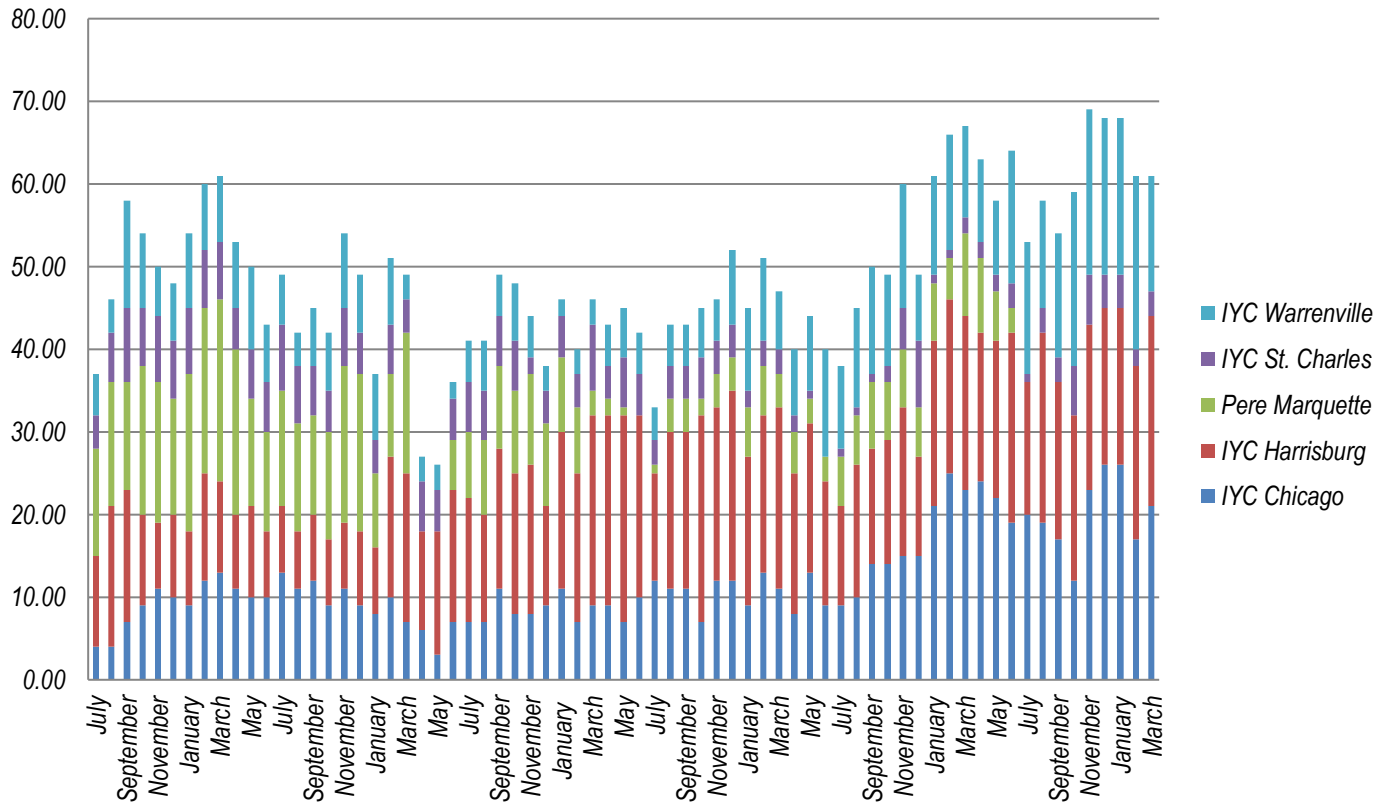
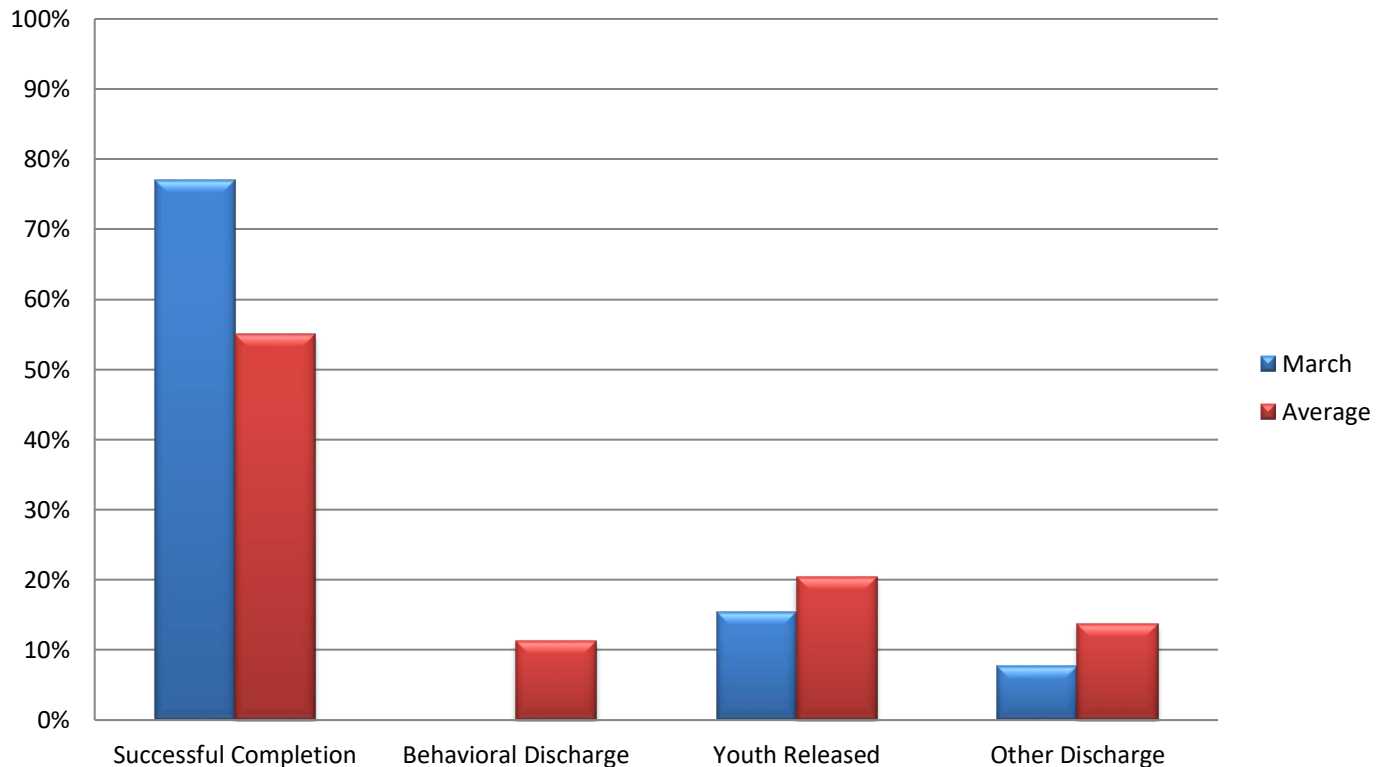


Chart 6: Discharges by Reason

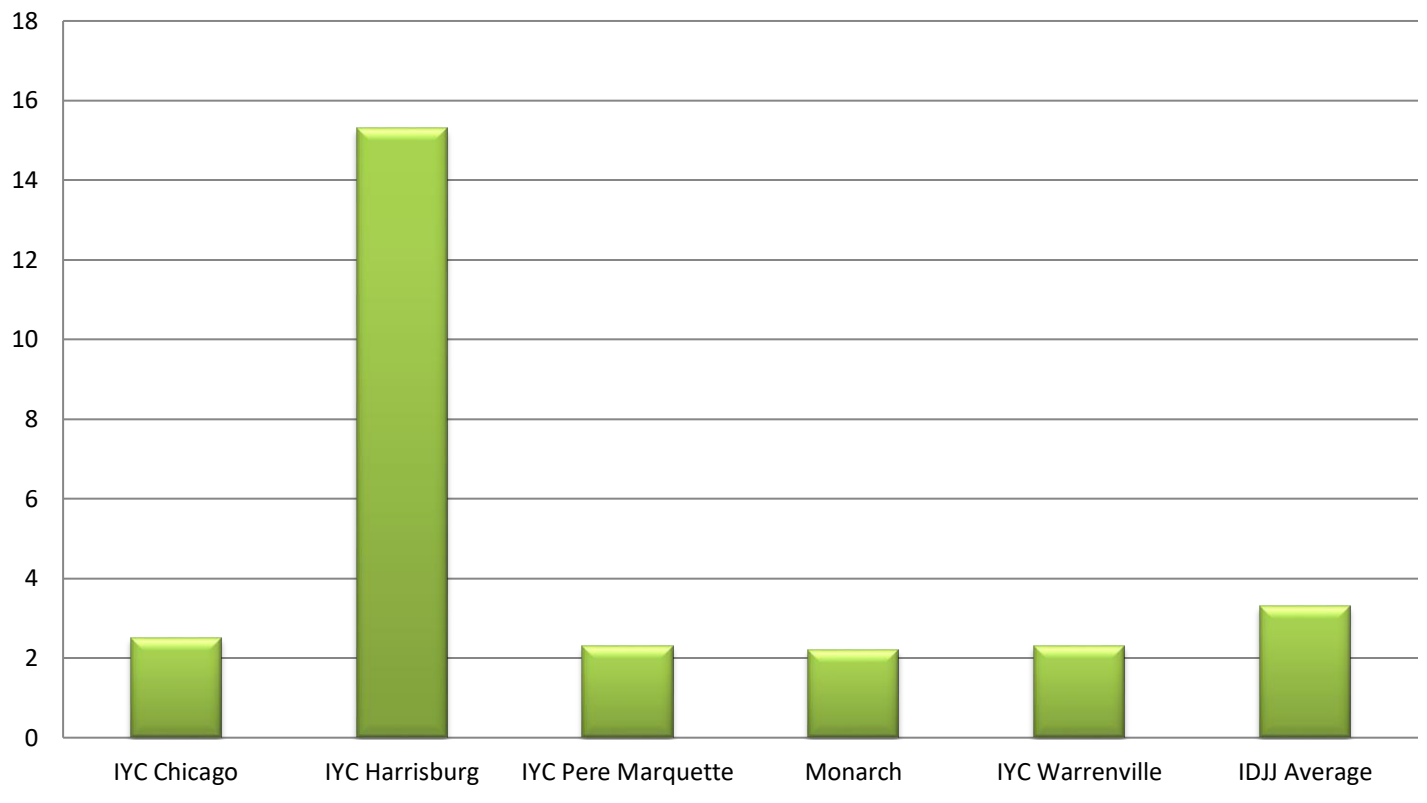

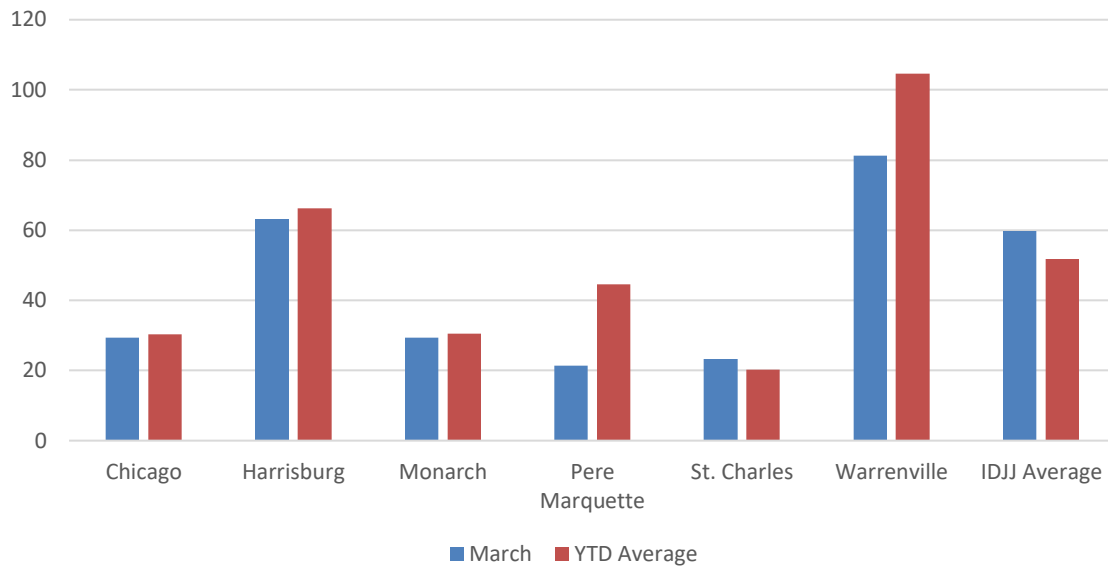

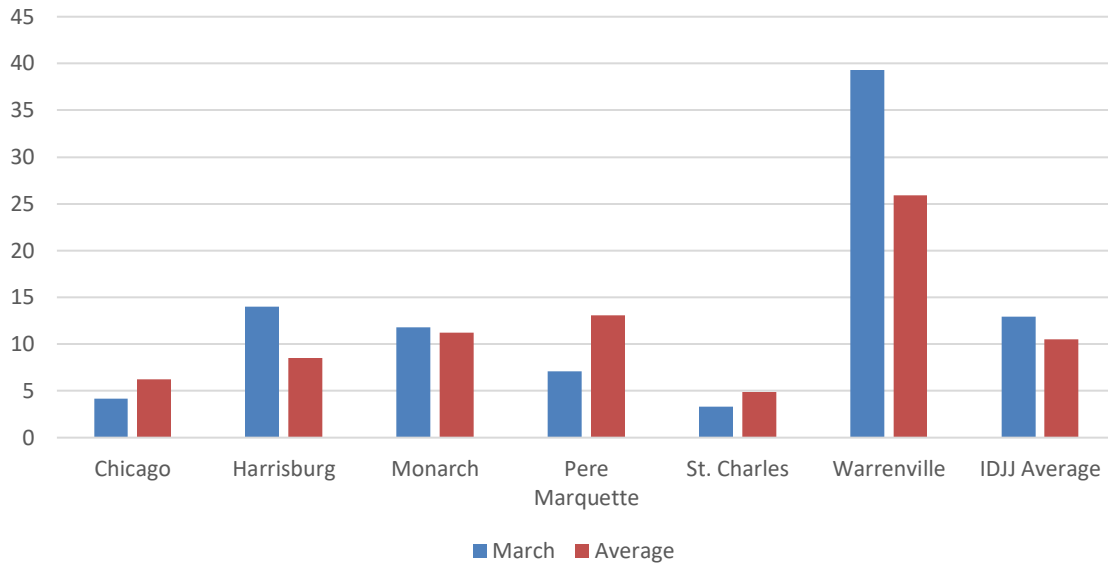

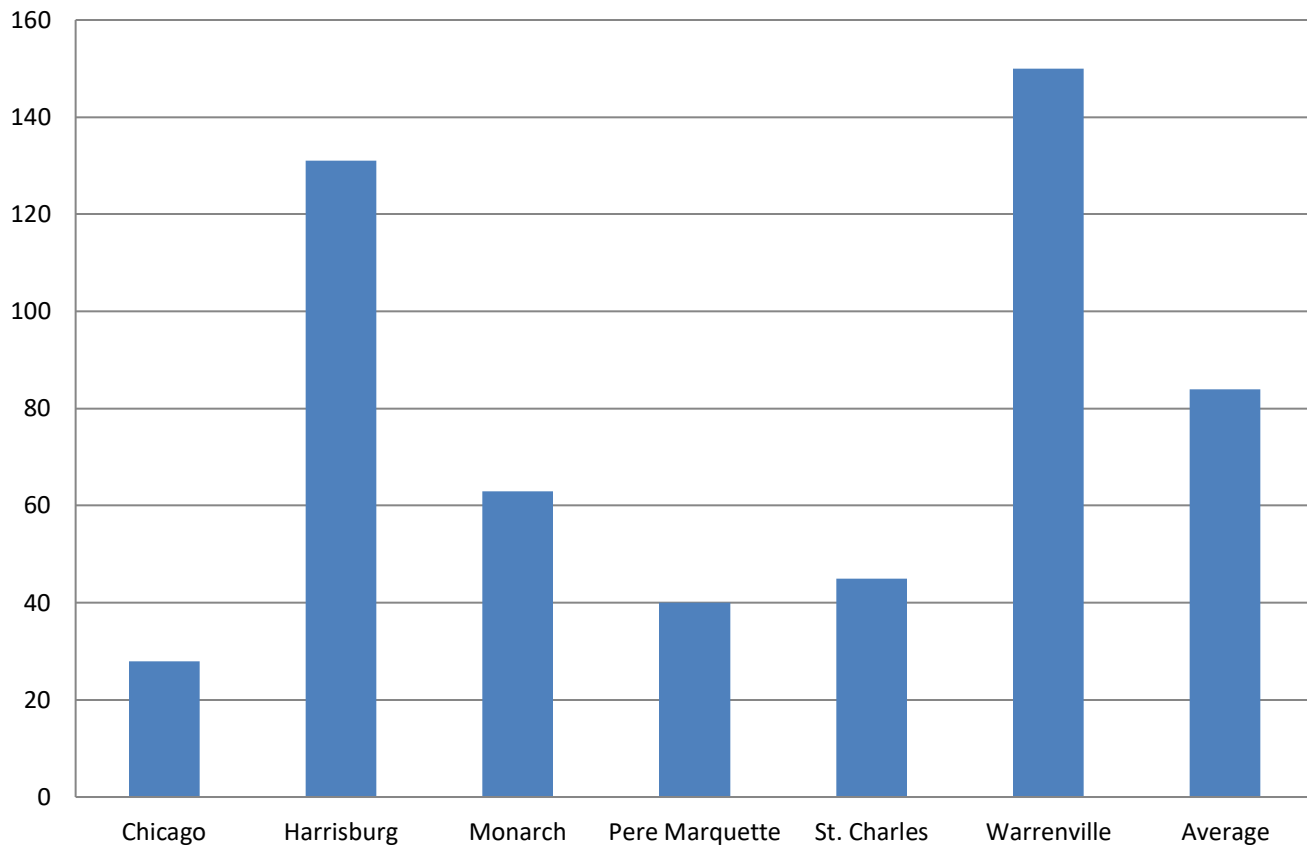

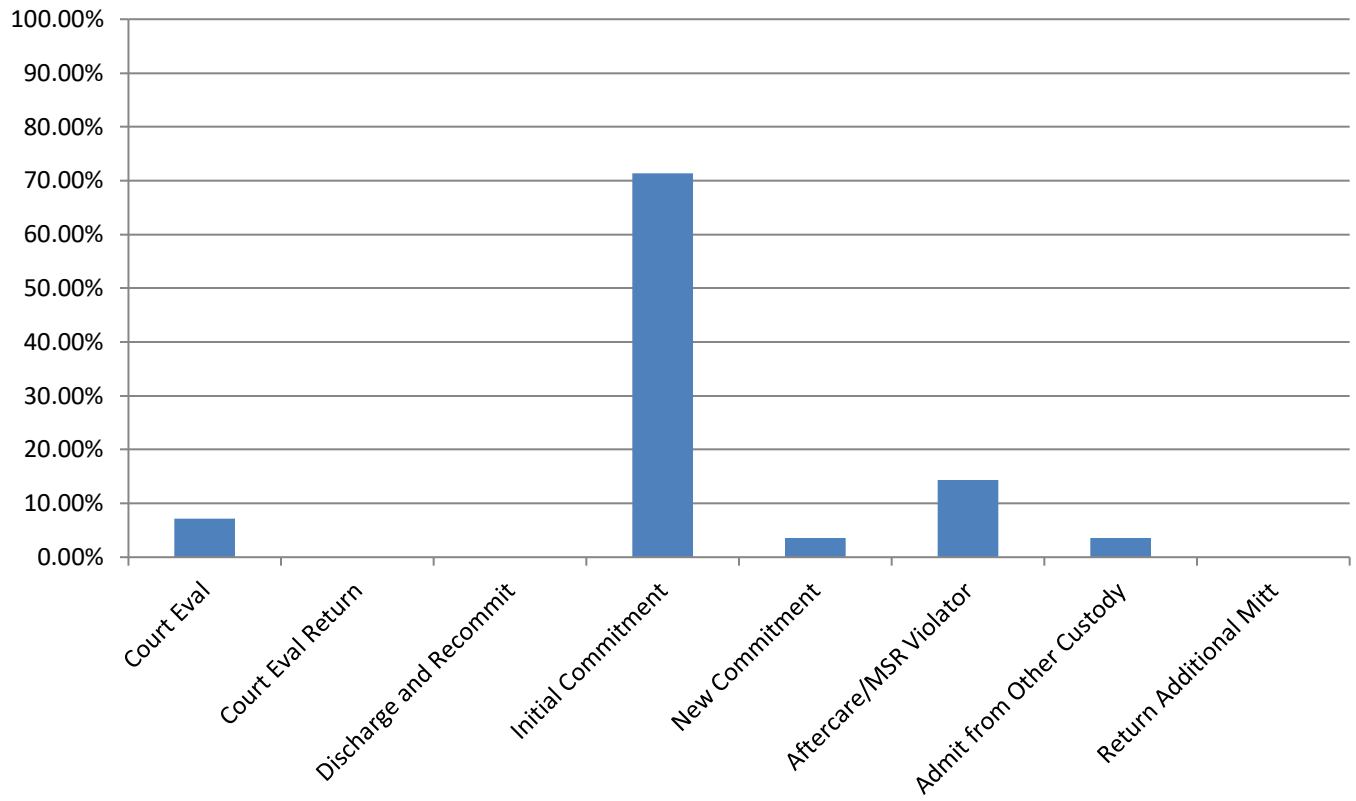

Chart 14: Types of Adjustments used by Agency

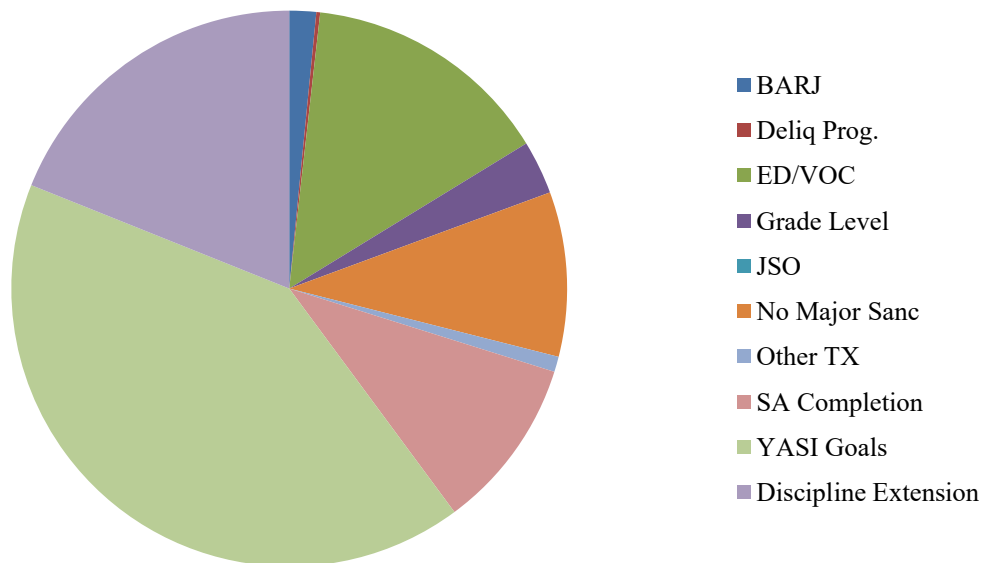

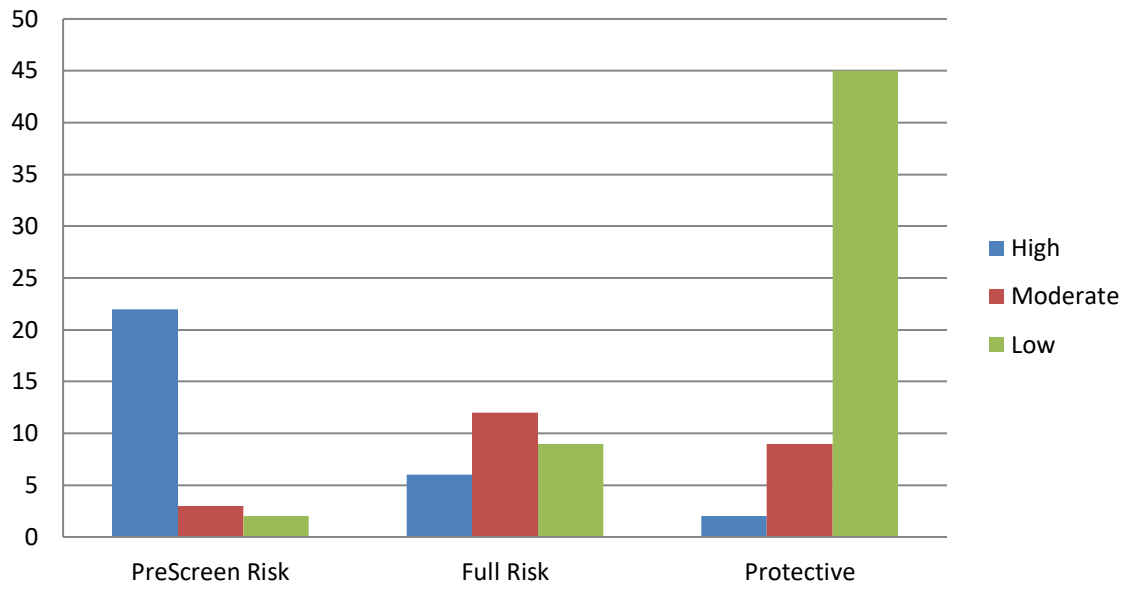

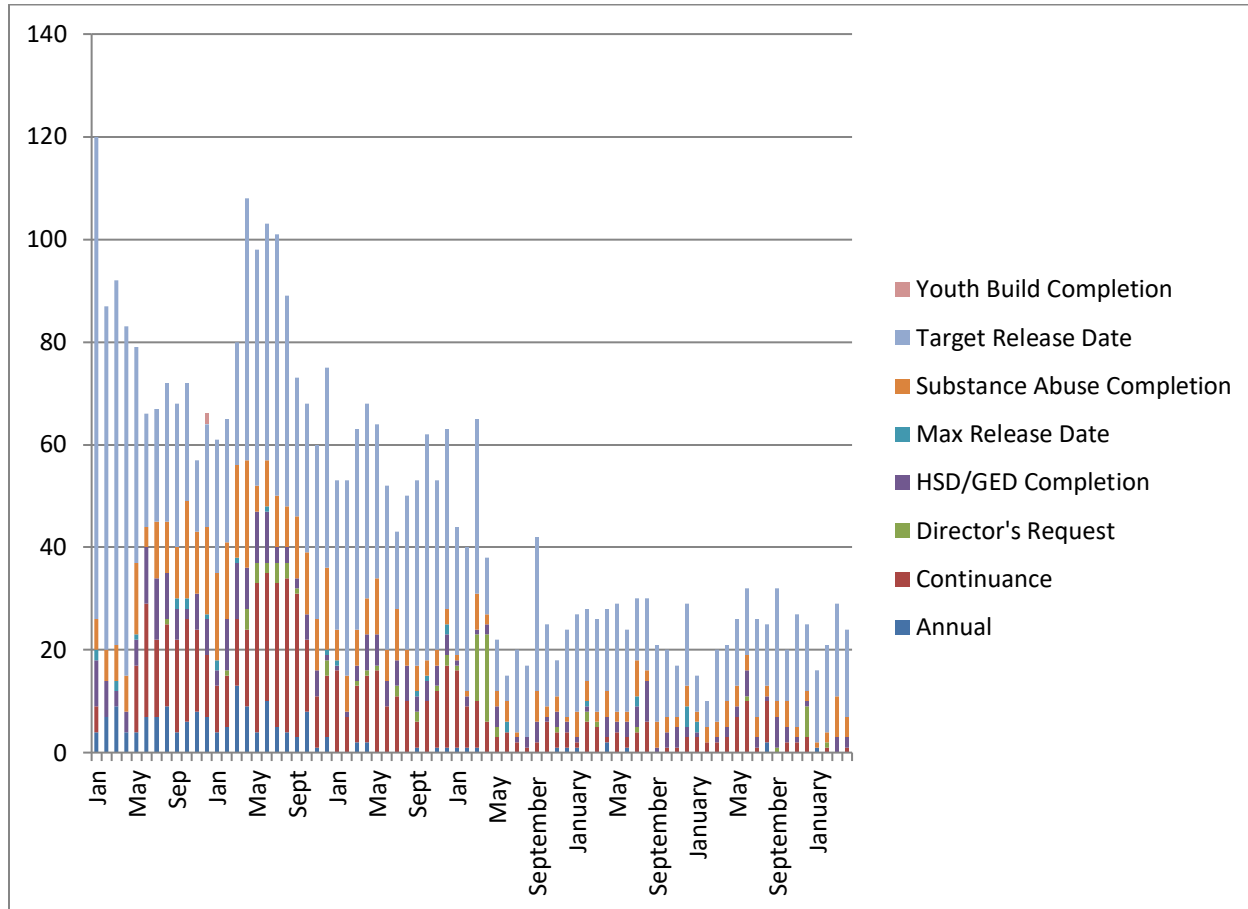

Chart 16: Risk and Protective Levels of Youth



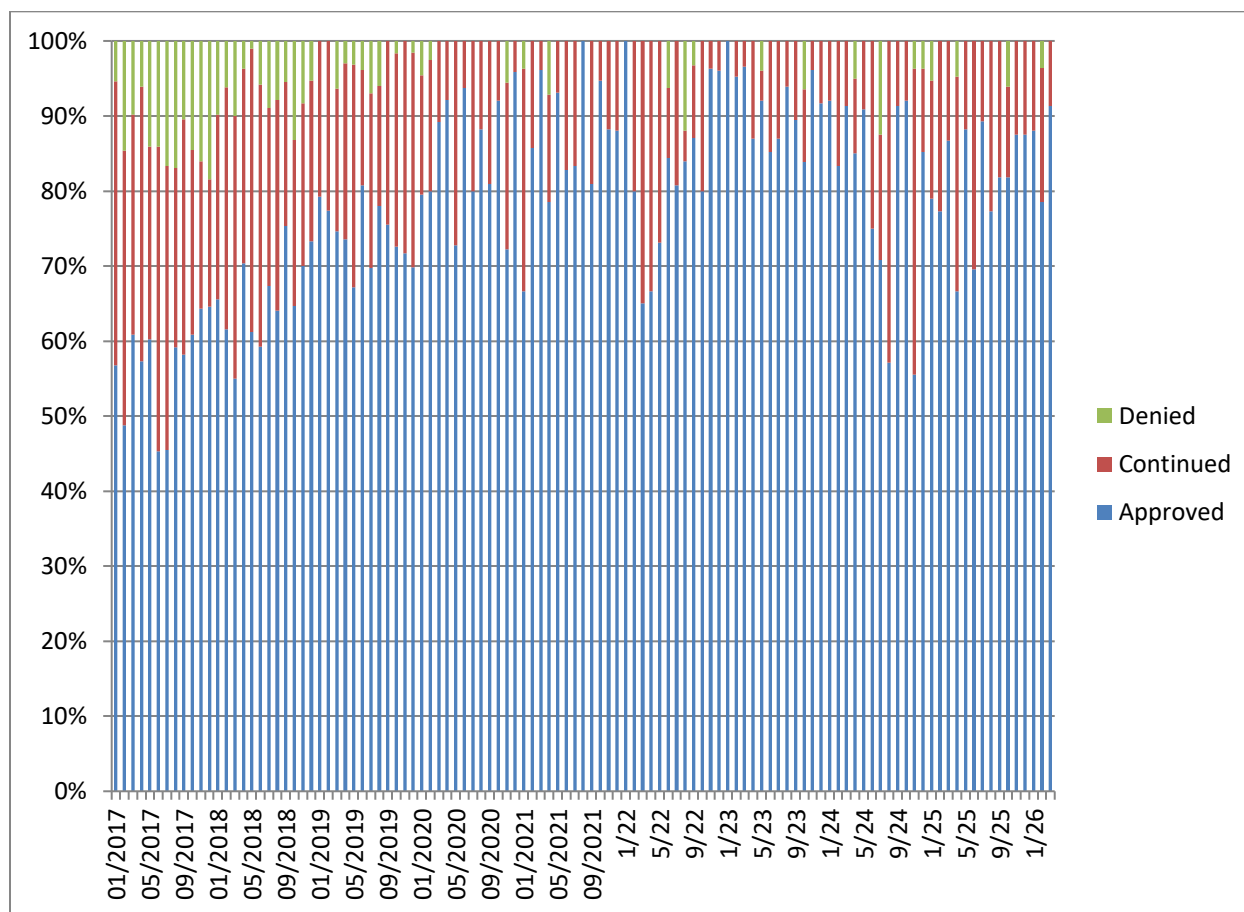
