PRESIDENT'S REPORT

4.0 The Illinois Department of Juvenile Justice continues its efforts to meet compliance standards outlined in the consent decree, particularly regarding full-day education and other components of the remedial plan.

Notably, IYC Chicago and IYC Warrenville have shown improvement in daily school attendance rates, which now consistently range between 80–90%.

In addition, School District Classrooms have been operating inside Department of Correction facilities, with services provided to individuals from Illinois River, Shawnee, and Lincoln Correctional Center.

The current daily student count exceeds fifty; several young adults who are still working toward earning their high school diplomas. One student has successfully graduated to date.

Due to budget constraints, **hiring will be limited to select positions** at this time. Further updates regarding staffing adjustments and leadership transitions will be shared as plans develop.

Over the next **6–8 weeks**, the district is expected to onboard a new **Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum**, a critical role focused on advancing instructional excellence and aligning academic initiatives district-wide.

ASST. SUPERINTENDENT 6.0 UPDATE

Summary April/May 2025 Curriculum Update

DR. BAMBI BETHEL-LEITSCHUH The 2025–2026 School Calendar has been shared. Per Illinois State Board of Education requirements, 187 student attendance days are mandated. School District #428 exceeds this with 189 attendance days.

There have been **no changes to the total number of calendar days**, and **summer school is not held**. Instead, instructional staff are encouraged to shift toward an **enrichment-based**, **project-focused teaching style**, aligning with principles of **blended learning** to maximize student engagement and creativity during the regular school year.

The **2025–2026 school calendar** has officially been approved. A motion to approve the calendar was made by **Board Member Green** and seconded by **Board Member Holifield**. The motion passed unanimously.

This year's calendar features a **color-coded format** for enhanced readability and organization. Updates will be made to incorporate **state-mandated trainings for the northern region**, which will require calendar adjustments to meet compliance and scheduling needs.

Further communication will follow once revisions are finalized.

6.2 Approximately 50–60% of the student population in School District #428 is comprised of **Special Education students**, underscoring the importance of continued support and resources for individualized instruction.

Currently, there is **no update on the IDEA grant status**. We will continue monitoring for any developments regarding funding and implementation.

Looking ahead, it is expected that **Promethean Boards will be installed in all schools' district-wide by next year**, enhancing access to interactive learning and digital instruction.

Plans are underway to onboard an additional **Special Education Director** to support operations within the Department of Corrections. This decision is driven by the growing number of individuals currently served who have **Individualized Education Programs (IEPs)**.

The increased leadership capacity will help ensure compliance with educational standards, improve service delivery, and support continuity across facilities.

CTE/ VOCATIONAL EDUCATION DIRECTOR

7.0 The Career and Technical Education Department has been actively engaged in supporting student success.

CTE/Vocational Education Summary May 2025

Recently, four students graduated from the Greater West Town training program in Shipping and Receiving. Each graduate has been given the

opportunity to apply for positions at **nearby locations**, offering convenient access to employment and further career development.

These milestones reflect the department's commitment to practical learning and workforce readiness.

EDDR, a culinary program where students can complete sanservi certificate. It is industry certified. Twenty plus students will be beginning program.

D&D Solar has developed a specialized **U.S. Vocational Program** tailored for the **Illinois Department of Juvenile Justice (IDJJ)**. The inaugural cohort launched with **four students**, each receiving hands-on training in solar installation and technical systems.

Graduates of the program will earn an **internationally recognized certificate**, opening doors to employment opportunities both locally and globally. In addition to installation skills, students will be trained in **operating heavy machinery**, further enhancing their skillset and employment potential in the renewable energy and construction sectors.

ECC, Elgin Community College 101 finalized their program successfully.

The NOVA Program is actively moving forward with implementation plans. Currently, **one teacher is undergoing background checks** to support program delivery and meet compliance standards.

Further staffing and onboarding efforts are expected as the program continues to expand.
