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#### INTRODUCTION

The *Illinois Register* is the official state document for publishing public notice of rulemaking activity initiated by State governmental agencies. The table of contents is arranged categorically by rulemaking activity and alphabetically by agency within each category.

Rulemaking activity consists of proposed or adopted new rules; amendments to or repealers of existing rules; and rules promulgated by emergency or peremptory action. Executive Orders and Proclamations issued by the Governor; notices of public information required by State Statute; and activities (meeting agendas; Statements of Objection or Recommendation, etc.) of the Joint Committee on Administrative Rules (JCAR), a legislative oversight committee which monitors the rulemaking activities of State Agencies; is also published in the Register.

The Register is a weekly update of the Illinois Administrative Code (a compilation of the rules adopted by State agencies). The most recent edition of the Code, along with the Register, comprise the most current accounting of State agencies' rulemakings.

The *Illinois Register* is the property of the State of Illinois, granted by the authority of the Illinois Administrative Procedure Act [5 ILCS 100/1-1, et seq.].

- A Complete Description of the Subjects and Issues Involved: These amendments add sanitation and safety requirements to entities licensed by the Department under the Animal Welfare Act (dog breeders, cat breeders, animal shelters, kennel operators, animal control facilities, foster homes, and pet shop operators). The amendments add requirements for enclosures to be safely constructed, large enough for the animals, and have adequate lighting and ventilation. The amendments contain provisions to protect animals from dangerous weather conditions. The amendments also add requirements for licensees to provide animals with proper exercise, hygiene, and physical examinations.

#### **Section 25.10 Definitions**

"Act" means the Animal Welfare Act [225 ILCS 605].

"Physical examination" means an examination performed by a licensed veterinarian, in which the veterinarian determines the health and fitness of the animal and renders advice and recommendations pursuant to the Veterinary Medicine and Surgery Practice Act of 2004 [225 ILCS 115]. The physical examination shall include, at minimum, a hands-on examination, including a comprehensive physical examination, dental assessment, body condition scoring, and pain assessment.

"Animal" as used in this Part means any mammal, bird, fish, or reptile offered for sale, trade, or adoption or for which a service is provided by any person licensed under this Act.

"Companion Animal" means an animal that is commonly considered to be, or is considered by the owner to be, a pet. Companion animal includes, but is not limited to, canines, felines and equines. [570 ILCS 70/2.01a]

"Enclosure" means the area where a dog or cat is confined. Enclosures include, but are not limited to, cages, whelping boxes, and runs.

"Equine Shelter" is an animal shelter as defined in Section 2 of the Act that is only for equines.

"Exotic or non-domesticated animals" means mammals (including non-human primates), reptiles and birds that are not native to North America and are not normally maintained livestock (llamas, ratites, cervids and similar animals are considered livestock under this definition) or native mammals that are not domesticated and normally maintained as pets (i.e., prairie dogs). Not included in this definition are hamsters, guinea pigs and gerbils or any member of the species felis catus that have been domesticated or canis familiaris.

"Fire Alarm System" means a system automatically activated by a device that detects smoke, heat or fire. The fire alarm system automatically triggers a notification to local emergency responders.

"Fire Sprinkler System" means one of the following systems that automatically trigger a notification to local emergency responders when activated:

Any water-based automatic fire extinguishing system employing fire sprinklers. The sprinkler system shall be designed in accordance with NFPA 13 (Standard for the Installation of Sprinkler Systems (2013)) and NFPA 101 (Life Safety Code (2015)), both available from the National Fire Protection Association, 1 Batterymarch Park, Quincy MA 02169. "Fire sprinkler system" includes accessory fire pumps and assorted piping, fire standpipes, or underground fire main systems starting at the connection to the water service after the approved backflow device is installed under the requirements of the Illinois Plumbing Code (77 Ill. Adm. Code 890) (Code) and ending at the most remote fire sprinkler; or

Sprinkler heads that are in a loop of the potable water system, as described in Sections 890.1130 and 890.1200 of the Code.

"Staffing Plan" means a plan to staff a kennel operating any time cats or dogs are on the premises. At a minimum, a staffing plan must include the kennel operator's hours of operation, number of staff, names of staff, and the staff's contact information. The staffing plan must show that at least one staff member is on site, alert and available any time dogs or cats are on the premises.

"Qualified Fire Inspector" means a local fire official or a building inspector, working for a unit of local government or fire protection district, who is qualified to inspect buildings for fire safety or building code compliance.

"Work Progress Form" is a form issued by the Department to licensees or applicants notifying them of deficiencies and the improvements required to be made by them within a specified period of time to comply with the Act.

- a) All buildings and premises shall be maintained in a sanitary condition and the licensee shall:
  - 1) Have covered, leak-proof containers available for storage of waste materials before disposal to control vermin and insects. Such containers shall be maintained in a sanitary condition. This subsection (a)(1) does not apply to equine shelters.
  - Dispose of dead animals in compliance with the Illinois Dead Animal Disposal Act [225 ILCS 610] and rules enacted pursuant to that law (8 Ill. Adm. Code 90) or the Companion Animal Cremation Act [815 ILCS 318]. Compliance with this State Law shall not exempt a licensee from compliance with local ordinances.
  - Take effective control measures to prevent infestation of animals and premises with external parasites and vermin.
  - 4) Provide water from a source having sufficient pressure to properly sanitize and clean the facility and equipment. This subsection (a)(4) does not apply to equine shelters.
  - 5) Provide hand washing facilities.
- b) All buildings shall be constructed so as to provide adequate shelter for the comfort of the animals and shall provide adequate facilities for isolation of diseased animals and their waste to avoid exposure to healthy and salable animals.
- c) Floors of buildings housing or displaying animals shall be of permanent construction to enable thorough cleaning and sanitizing, except equine shelters. Dirt and unfinished wood floors are unacceptable, except for equine shelters. Cleaning shall be performed daily, or more often if necessary, to prevent any accumulation of debris, dirt or waste.
- d) <u>Enclosures Cages</u> shall be constructed of a material that is impervious to urine and water and able to withstand damage from gnawing and chewing. This subsection (d) does not apply to equine shelters. <u>The floors of the enclosures must be constructed of a material that does not sag, bend, or bounce.</u>
  - 1) The enclosures<del>cages</del> must be cleaned and sanitized at least once daily, or

more often if necessary.

- 2) All empty enclosures<del>cages</del> shall be kept clean at all times.
- 3) <u>Enclosures Cages</u> shall be of sufficient size to allow the animal to comfortably stand, sit, lie, <u>or turn in a complete circle</u>, and offer freedom of movement.
- 4) An ambient temperature as defined in the rules for the Federal Animal Welfare Act (9 CFR 3.2; 2006) shall be maintained for warmblooded animals. In the case of coldblooded animals, the temperature that is compatible to the well-being of the species shall be maintained.
- 5) Beginning December 31, 2022, all enclosures containing dogs and cats shall:
  - A) Have flooring consisting of a solid surface, slats or coated wire (PVC or vinyl) to decrease and prevent injury and decrease the detrimental health effects on the enclosed animals. Slats shall be appropriately spaced for the species and size of the animal and shall be constructed in a manner which prevents the animal's feet from getting trapped or injured;
  - B) Not be stacked on top of each other unless the enclosures were commercially designed and constructed to be a multi-level enclosure/kennel; and
  - C) Be placed in facilities, if located indoors, with adequate light and ventilation to allow for the well-being of the animal and to permit routine inspection and cleaning.
- <u>Beginning January 1, 2023, outdoor enclosures for dogs and cats must meet the requirements of this Part and meet the following additional requirements:</u>
  - A) If climatic or ambient temperatures pose a threat to the health and welfare of the dog or cat, effective measures must be taken to eliminate the threat; and

- B) Not be used if the dog or cat is unable to tolerate the prevalent temperatures, based on the animal's own characteristics, including breed, body condition, and acclimation to the environment.
- e) Runs shall be constructed of material of sufficient strength and design to confine the animals. This subsection (e) does not apply to equine shelters.
  - 1) They shall be kept in good repair and condition.
  - 2) For new construction or remodeling, the licensee shall provide runs surfaced with concrete or other impervious material.
  - 3) Surface of the run shall be designed to permit the surface to be cleaned and disinfected and kept free from excessive accumulation of animal waste.
  - 4) Provisions must be made for adequate drainage, including gutters and discharge of any fluid or content into a sewer, septic tank or filter field, and shall comply with any local zoning.
- f) Cages or aquariums for housing of small animals, birds, or fish shall provide space not less than 2½ times the body volume of living creatures contained therein.
- g) If animals are group-housed, they shall be maintained in compatible groups without overcrowding. No female animal in estrus shall be placed in a pen with male animals, except for breeding purposes.
- h) Upon an inspection of a licensee or applicant by the Department, the Department may provide a Work Progress Form to the licensee or applicant if deficiencies are detected during the inspection. The licensee or applicant must make the improvements to correct the deficiencies listed in the form within the time period specified in the form.

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#### **Section 25.30 General Care of Animals**

a) All persons or establishments licensed under this Act shall comply with all

Sections of the Humane Care for Animals Act [510 ILCS 70].

- b) Sufficient clean water and fresh food shall be offered to each animal daily as prescribed in the rules for the Federal Animal Welfare Act (9 CFR 3.5-3.7; 2006). In the case of young animals, they shall be fed more than once daily. Reptiles, fish or amphibians shall be fed and cared for in accordance with the eating patterns and environmental conditions compatible with each individual species.
- c) The licensee or <u>the licensee'shis</u> representative shall be present for general care and maintenance of the animals at least once daily.
- d) Aquariums containing fish shall be kept in a clean healthful condition. Live algae shall not be considered an unhealthful condition. Any dead fish shall be removed from aquariums.
- e) Adult cats shall be provided with litter pans at all times. The pans shall be cleaned and sanitized at least once daily or more often if necessary.
- f) Equine shelters shall follow the American Association of Equine Practitioners (AAEP) Care Guidelines for Equine Rescue and Retirement Facilities (2004). The AAEP care guidelines are available from the Department and published on the Department's web site.
- g) Dog breeders, cat breeders, animal shelters, kennel operators, animal control facilities, foster homes, and pet shop operators shall:
  - 1) Provide grooming, as necessary, to prevent matting of coat and to prevent accumulation of fecal matter, urine or any other material within the coat.

    Grooming shall include nail trimming to ensure that nails do not injure the dog or cat.
  - 2) Comply with Section 8 of the Animal Control Act [510 ILCS 5] with regards to rabies inoculation and must register with their county of residence.
  - 3) Provide animals an opportunity for daily exercise. Exercise may consist of a play area, time in run or leash walks. A daily log shall be maintained documenting daily exercise for each animal.

4) Have a working relationship with a veterinarian who provides recommendations on vaccination and deworming protocols. Each animal shall receive a complete physical examination by a licensed veterinarian within 30 days of intake or prior to adoption or sale, whichever occurs first, and thereafter on an annual basis if the animal has not yet been adopted or sold. Each animal used for breeding shall receive an annual physical examination by a licensed veterinarian as long as the dog is in the breeding population. A record of all completed physical examinations shall be available for inspection.

#### Section 25.90 Records

- a) Records of sales of all animals, excluding fish, shall be maintained by the licensee for a minimum period of 12 months after date of sale or transfer of animal, and shall include the source of animal, date of sale, description and sex of animal sold, and the name and address of purchaser. Records of sales of small mammals (i.e., hamsters, mice, gerbils or rats that were born in the United States), birds and fish are not required. These records must be available for inspection during normal business hours by Department employees or persons designated by the Department. Each licensee must report to the Department the number of dogs, puppies, cats, kittens and exotic or non-domesticated animals sold for the previous calendar year at the time of license renewal. Shelters and animal control facilities must report to the Department the total number of dogs, cats and other animals received, adopted, euthanized or reclaimed by the owner for the previous calendar year at the time of license renewal.
- b) If record of prophylactic medication is used in advertisement or is furnished the purchaser or person acquiring an animal, specific information regarding type, amount, and date of prophylactic medication shall be kept by the licensee and shall become a part of the retail sales record.
- c) The licensee or <u>the licensee'shis</u> representative shall furnish the purchaser of a dog, cat or non-human primate a written statement at the time of sale.
  - 1) The statement shall show:
    - A) Date of sale and date of birth, if known.

- B) Name, address, and telephone number of licensee.
- C) Name, address, and telephone number of purchaser.
- D) Breed and description of dog, cat or non-human primate, including age, sex and weight of the animal.
- E) Prophylactic immunizations and dates administered.
- F) Internal parasite medications and dates administered.
- G) A record of sterilization or lack of sterilization.
- H) Guarantee, if offered; if none, so state.
- I) If the dog or cat is being sold as being capable of registration, the name and registration numbers of the sire and dam and registry information.
- J) Records shall also include any other significant identification, if known, for each animal, including any official tag number, tattoo or microchip.
- 2) This information may be recorded on Department Form PS-5 (Animal Welfare Release Statement), or on a similar form prepared by the licensee and approved in advance by the Department.
- d) The licensee shall have any dog used as a <u>breeding animalsire</u> tested annually for canine brucellosis. The test must be performed by a licensed veterinarian and the licensee must keep a copy of the test results for two years.

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#### Section 25.140 Foster Homes

The licensed animal shelter shall be responsible for <u>maintaining records of formal written</u> agreements between licensee and foster as required under 225 ICLS 605/3.2 submission of the application and payment of the required fee prior to utilizing a designee as a foster home. The

following requirements shall be complied with and will be the shelter's obligation:

- a) No more than four animals (dogs or cats) shall be maintained at a foster home location at any one time.
- <u>ab</u>) The animals held at the foster home shall be afforded a clean environment and the home shall comply with all provisions of the Illinois Humane Care for Animals Act [510 ILCS 70].
- e) The animals held for adoption shall be segregated from any personally owned pets.
- <u>bd</u>) Records for the animals shall be available for review by Department personnel upon request and shall be retained at the animal shelter for two years.
- ce) The foster home shall be accessible for <u>inspection general observation</u> by Department personnel for compliance with sanitation and the quality of care being afforded the animals as required under 225 ILCS 605/3.2.
- Any dog over four months of age shall be vaccinated for rabies and the certificate of vaccination will be transferred to the person adopting the dog.
- eg) No animals shall be released to an adoptive owner until provisions have been completed for spaying of females or neutering of males.

- 4) Statutory Authority: Authorized by Sections 8, 8a and 9(7) of the Personnel Code [20 ILCS 415/8, 20 ILCS 415/8a, 20 ILCS 415/8c, 20 ILCS 415/8e, 20 ILCS 415/9(7) and 20 ILCS 415/9(14)], subsection (d) of Section 1-5 of the Illinois Administrative Procedure Act [5 ILCS 100/1-5(d)] and by Sections 4, 6, 15 and 21 of the Illinois Public Labor Relations Act [5 ILCS 315/4, 5 ILCS 315/6, 5 ILCS 315/15 and 5 ILCS 315/21].
- A Complete Description of the Subjects and Issues Involved: The reason for the amendments is to maintain compliance with the Equal Pay Act of 2003 [820 ILCS 112] and the Personnel Code [20 ILCS 415]. The Personnel Code underscores the public's interest in ensuring that the Pay Plan provides the fair and reasonable compensation of state employees for services rendered. The Equal Pay Act of 2003 underscores the public's interest in ensuring that compensation decisions are equal, not tainted by implicit or explicit discrimination, for the same or substantially similar work. State government and the Pay Plan complies with the Equal Pay Act of 2003 by complying with the Personnel Code in the Pay Plan.

The Personnel Code and Pay Plan reflect the public need for fair and reasonable compensation of state employees who provide vital services such as public health, social services, child protection, and public safety across Illinois and oversight of critical work within state government. The compensation of vital services and oversight contributes to retaining current and attracting new state employees. State agencies experience the ongoing and increasing difficulty hiring and retaining merit compensation employees to perform the often-life-saving work and oversight.

The Pay Plan provides structural pay parity. Given the fiscal year 2022 (FY2022) pay provisions in collective bargaining agreements that alter bargaining unit pay grades, FY2022 merit compensation, including MS- and broad-banded, salary ranges require structural realignment. The structural realignment is to increase the maximum salaries of

the merit compensation salary ranges by 3.95%. The realignment provides structural integrity throughout the Pay Plan.

The Pay Plan provides for employee pay parity. Given the FY2022 pay provisions in the collective bargaining agreements for a general salary increase for bargaining-unit-represented state employees, salaries of merit compensation state employees require a 3.95% salary cost-of-living adjustment. The adjustment provides employee pay integrity throughout the Pay Plan.

The merit compensation adjustment and increase to maximum salaries in merit compensation salary ranges maintains pay parity throughout the Pay Plan during FY2022. Because the pay structure and employee compensation is integral to the State's ability to retain and attract merit compensation employees to provide for the health, safety and welfare of the public, the State's best interest is served by undertaking the salary adjustment for merit compensation state employees and the structural realignment of the merit compensation salary ranges effective at the beginning of FY2022, July 1, 2021.

Specifically, in the table of contents, the fiscal year in the heading for Section 310.550 is changed.

In Section 310.530 subsection (c), the fiscal year is changed to incorporate a FY2022 cost-of-living adjustment into the Merit Compensation System implementation.

In Section 310.550, the fiscal year in the heading is changed. The effective year is changed to 2021 and the percentage amount of the adjustment is changed to 3.95%.

In Sections 310.Appendices D and G, the maximum base salary within each salary range is increased by 3.95%.6)

#### SUBPART C: PERMIT APPLICATION PROCEDURES FOR CLASS II UIC WELLS

#### Section 240.360 Area of Review

a) The area of review shall include all wells located within 1/4 mile of the proposed Class II UIC well, including directionally and horizontally drilled wells, which penetrate the injection interval within 1/4 mile of the proposed Class II UIC well.

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- b) The applicant shall submit evidence that all wells which penetrate the injection formation within the area of review contain an adequate amount of cement and are constructed or plugged in a manner which will prevent the injection fluid and the fluid in the injection formation from entering the freshwater zone. The types of evidence that will be considered acceptable by the Department include, but are not limited to: well completion reports, cementing records, well construction records, cement bond logs, tracer surveys, oxygen activation logs, and plugging records and expert opinions as to geological and engineering conditions.
- c) The applicant shall submit evidence for all wells which penetrate the injection formation within the area of review and which are determined by the Department to contain an inadequate amount of cement or are inadequately constructed or plugged, that injection into the proposed well and formation will not cause contamination of the freshwater zone. If well fluid level measurements are required as part of the submitted evidence, the fluid level measurements shall be witnessed by a Department Well Inspector. The Department shall have the authority to determine if the submitted information is acceptable as showing that the freshwater zone will not be contaminated through said well(s).

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#### SUBPART D: SPACING OF WELLS

#### **Section 240.410 Drilling Units**

- a) Oil Wells
  - 1) The Department shall not issue a permit for the drilling or deepening of a well for the production of oil within the State of Illinois unless the proposed well location and spacing <u>are withinconform to the following drilling units:</u>
    - A) 10 acres of surface area lying within the quarter-quarter section of land (as established by the official United States Public Land Survey) for wells drilled or deepened for the production of oil from a reservoir other than limestone/dolomite, the top of which lies less than 5,000 feet beneath the surface or the top of the Trenton Formation, whichever depth is greater. The location of the well shall not be less than 330 feet from the nearest lease boundary

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line except any lease boundary line located within a pooled unit. The location shall be no less than 330 feet from the nearest location of a producing well, a well being drilled, or a well for which a permit has previously been issued, but not yet drilled, for a well to the same individual reservoir. The location shall be no less than 10 feet from the nearest drilling unit boundary line; or

- B) 20 acres of surface area lying within the east west or north south one half of a quarter quarter section of land (as established by the official United States Public Land Survey) for wells drilled or deepened for the production of oil from a limestone/dolomite reservoir, the top of which lies less than 5,000 feet beneath the surface or the top of the Trenton Formation, whichever depth is greater. The location of the well shall not be less than 330 feet from the nearest lease boundary line except any lease boundary line located within a pooled unit. The location shall be no less than 330 feet from the nearest location of a producing well, a well being drilled, or a well for which a permit has previously been issued, but not yet drilled, for a well to the same individual reservoir. The location shall be no less than 10 feet from the nearest drilling unit boundary line; or
- C) 40 acres of surface area lying within a quarter quarter section of land (as established by the official United States Public Land Survey) for wells drilled or deepened for the production of oil from a reservoir, the top of which lies at or below 5,000 feet beneath the surface or the top of the Trenton Formation, whichever depth is greater. The location of the well shall be not less than 330 feet from the nearest lease boundary line except any lease boundary line located within a pooled unit. The location shall be no less than 330 feet from the nearest location of a producing well, a well being drilled, or a well for which a permit has previously been issued, but not yet drilled, for a well to the same individual reservoir. The location shall be no less than 10 feet from the nearest drilling unit boundary line.
- A permittee shall not be obligated to drill any further wells pursuant to provisions in a lease existing prior to the effective date of this Section. Any obligation shall be determined, to the extent relevant and applicable,

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by regulations in effect as of the date of the lease.

#### b) Gas Wells

The Department shall not issue a permit for the drilling or deepening of a well for the production of gas within the State of Illinois unless the proposed well location and spacing conform to the following drilling units:

- 1) 10 acres of surface area lying within the quarter-quarter section of land (as established by the official United States Public Land Survey) for wells drilled or deepened for the production of gas from a reservoir other than limestone/dolomite, the top of which lies less than 2,000 feet beneath the surface. The location of the well shall not be less than 330 feet from the nearest lease external boundary line except any lease boundary line located within a pooled unit. The location shall be no less than 330 feet from the nearest location of a producing well, a well being drilled, or a well for which a permit has previously been issued, but not yet drilled, for a well to the same individual reservoir. The location shall be no less than 10 feet from the nearest drilling unit boundary line; or
- 20 acres of surface area lying within the east-west or north-south one-half of a quarter-quarter section of land (as established by the official United States Public Land Survey) for wells drilled or deepened for the production of gas from a limestone/dolomite reservoir, the top of which lies less than 2,000 feet beneath the surface. The location of the well shall not be less than 330 feet from the nearest lease boundary line except any lease boundary line located within a pooled unit. The location shall be no less than 330 feet from the nearest location of a producing well, a well being drilled, or a well for which a permit has previously been issued, but not yet drilled, for a well to the same individual reservoir. The location shall be no less than 10 feet from the nearest drilling unit boundary line; or
- 40 acres of surface area lying within a quarter-quarter section of land (as established by the official United States Public Land Survey) for wells drilled or deepened for the production of gas from a reservoir, the top of which lies between 2,000 feet below the surface and 5,000 feet or the top of the Galena Group Trenton Formation, whichever depth is greater. The location of the well shall not be less than 330 feet from the nearest lease boundary line except any lease boundary line located within a pooled unit. The location shall be no less than 330 feet from the nearest location of a

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producing well or well being drilled or for which a permit has previously been issued, but not yet drilled, for a well to the same individual reservoir. The location shall be no less than 10 feet from the nearest drilling unit boundary line.

- 4) Establishment of Drilling Units for Deep Gas
  - A) In the case of wells drilled or deepened for the production of gas from a reservoir lying below 5,000 feet or the top of the <u>Galena GroupTrenton</u> formation, whichever depth is greater, no permit shall be issued for an exploratory well unless the proposed spacing and well location provide for a minimum of 160 acres of surface area lying within a quarter section of land (as established by the official United States Public Land Survey). The well location shall not be less than 660 feet from the nearest lease boundary line except any lease boundary line located within a pooled unit. The location shall be no less than 10 feet from the nearest drilling unit boundary line.
  - B) After completion of the exploratory well or wells, but prior to commencement of production activities, application shall be made to the Department for the adoption of rules establishing spacing and well location requirements for the reservoir or reservoirs completed. The application shall identify the lands underlying the reservoir or reservoirs for which spacing and well location rules are requested, and shall include any geological, engineering or economic data, studies or reports upon which the requested spacing and well location rules are based.
  - C) Within 20 days after receipt of the application, the Department shall submit proposed spacing and well location rules for the reservoir or reservoirs in accordance with Section 5-40 of the Illinois Administrative Procedure Act, which shall include notice of a public hearing to be commenced no later than 20 days after publication of the notice of proposed rulemaking in the Illinois Register. In addition to the notice requirements of the Illinois Administrative Procedure Act, the applicant shall give notice of public hearing, at least 10 days prior to the date of the hearing, to all permittees of record and leaseholders whose wells or leases are

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within ¼ mile of the area described in the proposed rules by first class mail, postage pre-paid, and by publication in a newspaper of general circulation in each county in which any portion of the area described in proposed rules is located.

D) The public hearing shall be conducted in accordance with the provisions of Section 240.370(d)(4) and (d)(5). The Department shall fully consider the record from the public hearing and any other public comment received during the first notice period and, prior to commencement of the second notice period, shall make such changes to the proposed rules as may be necessary to prevent waste, protect correlative rights and prevent the unnecessary drilling of wells.

#### c) Coalbed Gas Wells

The Department shall not issue a permit for the drilling or deepening of a well for the production of coalbed gas from unmined seams of coal unless the proposed well location and spacing conform to drilling unit requirements of 10 acres of surface area lying within a quarter-quarter-quarter section of land (as established by the official United States Public Land Survey). The location of the well shall be not less than 330 feet from the nearest lease boundary line except any lease boundary line located within a pooled unit. The location shall be no less than 330 feet from the nearest location of a producing well or well being drilled or for which a permit has previously been issued, but not yet drilled, for a well to the same individual reservoir. The location shall be no less than 10 feet from the nearest drilling unit boundary line.

#### d) Coal Mine Gas Wells

A well drilled into a mine void or a pillar within the mined out area for the production of gas from an abandoned coal mine is exempt from the spacing requirements of this Subpart.

#### e) Other Wells

Class II UIC wells, coal, mineral and structure test holes, observation wells, water supply wells used in relation to oil or gas production, and gas storage wells are exempt from the requirements of this Section.

f) All new well locations shall not be less than 200 feet from the nearest occupied dwelling existing at the time the permit application is filed with the Department,

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unless the permittee obtains a written agreement with the surface owner upon
which the dwelling is located specifically allowing for a closer well location.

#### SUBPART B: CONTRIBUTIONS AND SERVICE CREDIT

#### Section 1600.200 Definition of "Employee" for SURS Participation

Purpose and Application. As mandated by Section 15-107(k) of the Code, this Section provides rules for determining whether an individual is an "employee," as defined under Section 15-107 of the Code, who is eligible to participate in a SURS retirement program. This Section shall be effective for employment occurring on or after the effective date of this Section.

a) General Definition. "Employee" means any member of the educational, administrative, secretarial, clerical, mechanical, labor or other staff of an employer who satisfies either the "permanent and continuous standard" under subsection (a)(1) or the "minimum continuous duration standard" under subsection (a)(2) and meets the "payroll standard" under subsection (a)(3).

#### NOTICE OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT

- 1) Permanent and Continuous Standard. An individual satisfies this subsection (a)(1) if:
  - A) as of the date of commencement of employment, the position is permanent, that is, it is intended to continue indefinitely in the absence of further action by the employer in the normal course of business or is anticipated for automatic reappointment upon expiration of the appointment term; and
  - B) the position is continuous as described in subsection (a)(4).
- 2) <u>Minimum Continuous Duration Standard.</u> An individual satisfies the conditions of this subsection (a)(2) if:
  - A) as of the date of commencement of employment, the position requires services that are expected to be rendered over a fixed duration of at least 4 months (or 16 weeks) or one academic term, whichever is less, measured from the employment commencement date; and
  - B) the position is continuous as described in subsection (a)(4).
- For purposes of this subsection (a)(2), "academic term" means a portion of the academic year during which the employer holds classes that is no shorter than 3 months (or 12 weeks) in duration. If an employer is not an educational institution that holds classes, then the academic term shall be 4 months (or 16 weeks) for purposes of this subsection (a)(2). If services commence during a period that is not an academic term (such as a summer session) and, pursuant to a contractual commitment, are expected to extend into the following academic term, the period prior to the academic term is also counted for purposes of meeting this standard.
- 4) Notwithstanding the foregoing, services related to accelerated courses that are taught during a portion of the academic term but carry the same contact hour and credit hour loads as the unaccelerated course taught over the full academic term shall be deemed to be rendered over an academic term.

#### NOTICE OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT

- <u>An individual satisfies this subsection (a)(3) if the person:</u>
  - A) receives payment for personal services:
    - i) on a warrant issued pursuant to a payroll voucher certified by an employer and drawn by the State Comptroller upon the State Treasurer; or
    - ii) by an employer upon trust, federal or other funds; or
  - B) is on a leave of absence without pay.
- 4) Continuous Employment. To be continuous, a position must not be irregular, intermittent or temporary. A position must meet all the applicable requirements below to be continuous, depending on whether it is a faculty position or a non-faculty staff position:
  - A) Continuous Faculty Position. "Faculty" for purposes of this subsection (a)(4)(A) means an individual who has an academic appointment at an educational institution (e.g., professor, associate professor, assistant professor, adjunct faculty or professor, professor of practice, instructor, or lecturer).
    - i) The faculty position must customarily require services to be rendered on a regularly scheduled basis that the employer deems necessary to fulfill the educational objectives of the appointment.
    - ii) The faculty position shall be deemed to be irregular or intermittent if the appointment requires less than 3 hours of service per week or 10% of a full-time faculty load for the semester, whichever threshold is greater. The full-time faculty load shall be defined by employer policy or collective bargaining agreement. The total hours of service per week shall be calculated by the sum of:
      - 2.25 hours of service (representing a combination of teaching or classroom time and time performing

related tasks such as class preparation and grading of examinations or papers) per week for each hour of teaching or classroom time as defined by employer policy (in other words, in addition to crediting an hour of service for each hour teaching in the classroom, this method would credit an additional 1.25 hours for activities such as class preparation and grading) and, separately,

- an hour of service per week for each additional hour outside of the classroom that the faculty member spends performing duties the faculty member is required to perform (such as required office hours or required attendance at faculty meetings).
- For example, if a full-time faculty load requires 30 iii) hours of service per week, an adjunct faculty position requiring 1 hour of classroom time (as defined by employer policy) and 1 hour per week of office hours will be deemed to require 3.25 hours of service per week. Unless the position is temporary as provided in subsection (a)(4)(A)(iv), the position is continuous because 3.25 hours per week meets the 3 hours of service per week threshold (which is identical to the 10% of the 30 hours of service per week full-time faculty load). If the full-time faculty load was instead 40 hours of service per week as defined by employer policy, then the adjunct faculty position would be deemed irregular or intermittent because the required hours of service are less than the greater of 3 hours of service per week or 10% of 40 hours of service per week, that is, 4 hours of service per week.
- iv) The faculty position is not temporary. A position is temporary if the individual is hired by the employer to help meet a short-term demand, such as to complete a project of specified short-term duration, to teach a temporary course, to teach only during the summer sessions, or to fill a

position temporarily vacated by an employee who is sick or on a leave of absence, or if the funding for the position is temporary and renewal for such funding is not customarily sought from year to year.

- B) Continuous Non-Faculty Staff Positions. "Non-faculty staff" for purposes of this subsection (a)(4)(B) means an individual who does not have an academic appointment at an educational institution (e.g., academic professionals, research scientists, technicians, clerical staff, mechanical staff, information technology staff, or housekeeping/janitorial staff).
  - i) The non-faculty staff position customarily requires services to be rendered for at least 3 hours of service per week or 10% of full-time equivalent position as defined by employer policy, whichever is greater.
  - ii) The non-faculty staff position is not temporary. A position is temporary if the individual is hired by the employer to help meet a short-term demand, such as to complete a project of specified short-term duration or to fill a position temporarily vacated by an employee who is sick or on a leave of absence, or if the funding for the position is temporary and renewal for such funding is not customarily sought from year to year.
  - iii) The non-faculty staff position has expectations of work with a particular pattern or duration. Specifically:
    - the services in the position are not rendered solely on an "on-call" or "as-needed" basis (e.g., on-call shuttle drivers, extra-help employees, tutors, and driving instructors) and
    - the position does not fall within the scope of a
      "seasonal worker," which means a worker who
      performs labor or services on a seasonal basis or
      retail workers employed exclusively during holiday

seasons as defined under 26 CFR 54.4980H-1(a)(39) or 29 CFR 500.20(s)(1).

### b) Specific Exclusions.

- Notwithstanding the foregoing and as permitted under Sections 15-107(a)(1)-(7) of the Code [40 ILCS 5/15-107(a)(1)-(7)], an individual is not an employee under this Section if the individual:
  - <u>A)</u> <u>is a student enrolled in and regularly attending classes in a college</u> <u>or university which is an employer, and is employed on a</u> <u>temporary basis at less than full time;</u>
  - B) <u>is currently receiving a retirement annuity or a disability</u> <u>retirement annuity under Section 15-153.2 of the Code from this System;</u>
  - C) is on a military leave of absence;
  - <u>D)</u> is eligible to participate in the Federal Civil Service Retirement System and is currently making contributions to that system based upon earnings paid by an employer;
  - E) is on leave of absence without pay for more than 60 days immediately following termination of disability benefits under Article 15 of the Code;
  - F) is hired after June 30, 1979 as a public service employment program participant under the Federal Comprehensive

    Employment and Training Act and receives earnings in whole or in part from funds provided under that Act; or
  - G) is employed on or after July 1, 1991 to perform services that are excluded by subdivision (a)(7)(f) or (a)(19) of Section 210 of the federal Social Security Act from the definition of employment given in that Section (42 USC 410).
- 2) <u>In accordance with Section 15-107(a)(7) of the Code, an individual who is employed on or after July 1, 1991, to perform services that are excluded</u>

by subdivision (a)(7)(F) or (a)(19) (concerning non-immigrant visa holders) of Section 210 of the Social Security Act from the definition of employment given in that Section (42 USC 410) shall not be an employee under Section 15-107. However, an individual who was excluded from employee status due to Section 210(a)(19) of the Social Security Act may become an employee under this Section effective as of the date the individual becomes a Lawful Permanent Resident, meets the Substantial Presence Test under 26 CFR 301.7701(b)-1(c), or otherwise becomes a U.S. person for federal income tax purposes.

- Certification of Employee Status. An employer shall certify any individual who meets the applicable eligibility conditions set forth under this Section as an employee within the meaning of Section 15-107 by submitting a Report of Status to SURS. An employer shall determine whether an individual is an employee under this Section, or remains an employee under this Section, upon the occurrence and re-occurrence of any of the following events:
  - 1) initial hire;
  - 2) <u>transfer to a different position that is substantially different in character or</u> duration (such as from a faculty to a non-faculty staff position); or
  - <u>3)</u> rehire after termination from employment.
- d) Concurrent Employment. If an individual is concurrently employed in more than one position with the same employer, and at least one position qualifies for employee status under Section 15-107 of the Code as interpreted under this Section, then the other position or positions shall also be deemed as qualifying for employee status during the duration of the qualifying employment.
- e) Reservation of Rights. SURS reserves the right to determine whether an individual is an employee within the meaning of Section 15-107 of the Code and this Section, including whether a position is irregular, intermittent, or temporary under subsection (a)(4).
- Appeals. An individual who is adversely affected by a determination made under this Section may file an appeal under Section 1600.500, subject to the filing requirements therein. An employer that is adversely affected by a determination made under this Section may file an appeal under Section 1600.510, subject to the

Due to the new contractual language delegating the authority to certify prevailing rates for state employees back to the Illinois Department of Labor, the Trade Organizations, Illinois Department of Labor, Department of Central Management Services are working on the transition process. During this transition period, the Department of Central Management Services is honoring the Trade Organization's certification information to ensure state employees entitled to prevailing rates are paid correctly and timely. It is anticipated the certification process transition will be completed on or before June 30, 2021. Past agreements stated that, effective January 1, 2006, the Boiler Safety Specialist title shall be paid an additional 4% above the prevailing rate for the employees on the standard pension formula or an additional 5.5% above the prevailing rate established for the employees on the alternative pension formula. The agreement states that effective December 1, 2013, newly hired employees shall be paid the appropriate prevailing rate, which means paid without the additional 4% above the prevailing rate for the employees on the standard pension formula or the additional 5.5% above the prevailing rate for the employees on the alternative pension formula. The agreement states that,

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while in positions in maximum security institutions, the employee who has seven or more years of continuous service with the Department of Corrections receives a \$75.00 adjustment a month that is applied as an additional \$0.44 per hour. The second agreement is the Memorandum of Agreement between the State of Illinois and the International Brotherhood of Boilermakers - Iron Shipbuilders, Blacksmiths, Forgers, and Helpers signed June 22, 2016. The agreement establishes each rate for the Boiler Safety Audit Specialist title at 4.5% above that of the corresponding rate for the Boiler Safety Specialist title. Corresponding refers to the rate's region, Pay Plan Code and when the employee was hired.

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code 23421); Mental Health Technician Trainee (title code 27020); Microfilm Operator I (title code 27181); Office Clerk (title code 30020); Property and Supply Clerk I (title code 34791); Reproduction Service Technician I (title code 38203); Social Service Aide Trainee (title code 41285); Stores Clerk (title code 43060); Support Service Worker (title code 44238); and Switchboard Operator I (title code 44411. Any rate table no longer in effect is removed.

#### SUBPART A: NARRATIVE

#### **Section 310.47 In-Hire Rate**

a) Use – No employee in a position in which the position and/or the employee meet the criteria of an in-hire rate receives less than the in-hire rate. The in-hire rate is used when a candidate only meets the minimum requirements of the class specification upon entry to State service (Section 310.100(b)(1), 310.490(b)(1) or 310.495(b)(1)), when an employee moves to a vacant position (Section 310.45) or when an MS salary range is assigned to a Trainee Program (Section 310.415(b)).

#### b) Request –

Agency Head Request for Other Than a Merit-Compensation-System-only Trainee Program – An agency head may request in writing that the Director approve or negotiate an in-hire rate. The in-hire rate is a Step or dollar amount depending on whether the classification title is assigned to a negotiated full scale rate, negotiated pay grade, merit compensation salary range or broad-band salary range. The in-hire rate may be for the classification title or limited within the classification title to the agency, facilities, counties or other criteria. The supporting justifications for the

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requested in-hire rate and the limitations are included in the agency request. An effective date may be included in the request.

- 2) Agency Head Request for a Merit-Compensation-System-only Trainee Program – The Department of Central Management Services determined in-hire rates for existing trainee programs assigned only MS-salary ranges to be used by agencies as the anticipated starting salaries. The in-hire rates are tied to the targeted title and in one case the county in which the trainee position is located. Some targeted titles have been determined to be inappropriate for some trainee titles. If an agency is unable to locate an in-hire rate for its trainee program's targeted title, the targeted title is inappropriate. Agencies using inappropriate targeted titles shall allow employees in the trainee titles targeting the inappropriate targeted titles to finish their training and be promoted if successful. Then, the agency shall not use the inappropriate targeted title again for that trainee program. Questions about the best titles to use for training shall be addressed by CMS. When an agency submits for approval the establishment of a new or a targeted title revision for an existing Trainee or Apprenticeship Program form (CMS-705), the agency head shall request in writing that the Director approve an in-hire rate. The in-hire rate is a dollar amount within the merit compensation salary range assigned to the trainee title. The in-hire rate may be for the trainee title limited for the targeted title and the agency, facilities, counties or other criteria. The supporting justifications for the requested in-hire rate and the limitations shall be included in the agency request. An effective date may be included in the request.
- c) Review The Director shall review the supporting justifications, the turnover rate, the length of vacancies, the currently filled positions for the classification title, and the market starting rates for similar classes, and consult with other agencies using the classification title. Other factors may be included in the review and negotiation of negotiated in-hire rates.
- d) Approval or Negotiated
  - 1) Approval The Director indicates in writing the approved in-hire rate and effective date, which is either the date requested by the agency or the beginning of the next pay period after the approval.

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- 2) Negotiated The Director and the bargaining unit representative indicate in writing the in-hire rates and effective date, which is either the date indicated in the agreement, the date of the agreement's signature or the beginning of the next pay period after the signatures are secured on the agreement.
- e) Implementation In the classification title or within the limitations of the classification title and when the in-hire rate is above the normal minimum of the assigned salary range or pay grade, an employee paid below the in-hire rate receives the in-hire rate on the approved effective date. The in-hire rate remains in effect for any employee entering the title or the limits within the title until the title is abolished or an agency request to rescind the in-hire rate is approved by the Director or negotiated by the Director and the bargaining unit representative.
- f) Approved or Negotiated In-Hire Rates
  - 1) Assigned to a Classification

### **Section 310.50 Definitions**

The following definitions of terms are for purposes of clarification only. They affect the Schedule of Rates (Subpart B), and Negotiated Rates of Pay (Appendix A). Section 310.500 contains definitions of terms applying specifically to the Merit Compensation System.

"Adjustment in Salary" – A change in salary rate occasioned by a previously committed error or oversight, or required in the best interest of the State as defined in Sections 310.80 and 310.90.

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"Agency" means an agency (e.g., Department, Board, Commission, etc.) of Illinois State government whose employees are subject to this Part.

"Anticipated Starting Salary" – A position-specific rate or range within the pay grade or salary range assigned to the classification title to which the position being filled is allocated and based on the value of the work to be performed in the position description. The anticipated starting salary is published in the posting of a position opening. When valuing the work to be performed in the position description, agencies, boards and commissions shall consider questions based on the factors located in Section 310.80(e). The factors are: is the valuation consistent with the treatment of other similar situations; is the valuation equitable in view of the particular circumstances; what are the staffing needs and requirements of the employing agency; and are there labor market influences on recruitment for the classification or position. Some of the questions to be considered are: how are others in this title in the agency compensated; how many staff does the position supervise; what is the scope of the position's area of responsibility; is the position similar to positions at other agencies and, if so, how are those employees compensated; what types of subordinates report to the position and how are they compensated; does this position require a license that is difficult to obtain; has the agency unsuccessfully attempted to fill the position and if so, how many times; and if the position has private sector counterparts, how are they compensated? This is a non-exhaustive list of factors and questions for agencies, boards and commissions to consider when developing an anticipated starting salary.

"Bargaining Representative" – The sole and exclusive labor organization (union, chapter, lodge or association) recognized, as noted in an agreement with the State of Illinois, to negotiate for one or more bargaining units and may include one or more locals.

"Bargaining Unit" – The sole and exclusive labor organization that represents and includes at least one position and its appointed employee as specified in a Certification of Representative, Certification of Clarified Unit or corrected certification issued by the Illinois Labor Relations Board as authorized by Sections 6(c) and 9(d) of the Illinois Public Labor Relations Act [5 ILCS 315].

"Base Salary" – A dollar amount of pay specifically designated in the Negotiated Rates of Pay (Appendix A) or Schedule of Rates (Subpart B). Base salary does not include commission, incentive pay, bilingual pay, longevity pay, overtime

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pay, shift differential pay or deductions for time not worked.

"Bilingual Pay" – The dollar amount per month, or percentage of the employee's monthly base salary, paid in addition to the employee's base salary when the individual position held by the employee has a job description that requires the use of sign language, Braille, or another second language (e.g., Spanish), or that requires the employee to be bilingual.

"Classification" – The classification established by the Department and approved by the Civil Service Commission based on Section 8a(1) of the Personnel Code [20 ILCS 415] and to which one or more positions are allocated based upon similarity of duties performed, responsibilities assigned and conditions of employment. Classification may be abbreviated to "class" and referred to by its title or title code.

"Class Specification" – The document comprising the title, title code, effective date, distinguishing features of work, illustrative examples of work and desirable requirements.

"Comparable Classes" – Two or more classes that are in the same pay grade.

"Creditable Service" – All service in full or regularly scheduled part-time pay status beginning with the date of initial employment or the effective date of the last salary increase that was at least equivalent to a full step.

"Demotion" – The assignment for cause of an employee to a vacant position in a class in a lower pay grade than the former class.

"Department" or "CMS" means the Department of Central Management Services.

"Differential" – The additional compensation added to the base salary of an employee resulting from conditions of employment imposed on the employee during normal schedule of work.

"Director" means the Director of the Department of Central Management Services.

"Divided Class" – The classification established by Section 8a(1) of the Personnel Code [20 ILCS 415], represented by more than one bargaining unit as certified by

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the Illinois Labor Relations Board. The divided classes effective February  $\underline{11}$ , 202125,  $\underline{2020}$  are:

"Entrance Base Salary" – The initial base salary assigned to an employee upon entering State service.

"Hourly Pay Grade" – The designation for hourly negotiated pay rates is "H".

"In Between Pay Grade" – The designation for negotiated pay rates in between pay grades is ".5".

"In-hire Rate" – An in-hire rate is a minimum rate/step for a class that is above or below the normal minimum of the range or full scale rate, as approved by the Director after a review of competitive market starting rates for similar classes or as negotiated between the Director and a bargaining unit.

"Midpoint Salary" – The rate of pay that is the maximum rate and the minimum rate in the salary range added together divided by two and rounded up or down to the nearest whole dollar.

"Option" – The denotation of directly-related education, experience and/or knowledge, skills and abilities required to qualify for the position allocated to the classification. The requirements may meet or exceed the requirements indicated in the class specification. The following options are for the Public Service Administrator classification and have a negotiated pay grade and/or a broadbanded salary range assigned:

- 1 = General Administration/Business/Marketing/Labor/Personnel
- 2 = Fiscal Management/Accounting/Budget/Internal Audit/Insurance/Financial
- 2B = Financial Regulatory
- 2C = Economist

- b) Boiler Safety Specialist This section shall apply to employees occupying positions in the Boiler Safety Specialist class that are represented by the RC-008 bargaining unit (see Appendix A, Table L).
- c) Rate Certification Process and Effective Date Copies of signed agreements between contractors or other employers and the respective union shall be certified to the Illinois State Department of Labor by the international representative of the respective union and shall be considered adequate proof of the prevailing rate of

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wages to be paid, minus the per hour costs of fringe benefits so designated by agreement, if any, in keeping with past practice. The Illinois Department of Labor shall notify the Department of Central Management Services of the prevailing rate. The effective date of changes in wage rates shall be on the date of certification by the Illinois Department of Labor.

- d) Pension Formula Adjustment Effective January 1, 2006, employees shall be paid an additional 4.00% above the prevailing rate of wages for employees on the standard pension formula and 5.5% above the prevailing rate of wages for employees on the alternative pension formula, minus the per hour costs of fringe benefits. New prevailing rate employees hired on or after December 1, 2013, shall be paid the appropriate/certified prevailing rate which shall not include the additional 4.00% above the prevailing rate of wages on the standard pension formula and 5.5% above the prevailing rate of wages for employees on the alternative pension formula.
- e) Maximum Security Rates Positions in maximum security institutions shall receive a \$75 a month adjustment to the employee's monthly wages for all employees with seven or more years of continuous service with the Department of Corrections. Employees shall receive the adjustment as long as they remain employees at a maximum-security facility.
- f) FY2020 Signing Bonus Upon ratification of the contract, all bargaining unit employees on active payroll effective June 30, 2020 shall receive a one-time signing bonus of \$2,500 within fiscal year 2020. Only employees on active status shall receive the bonus payable after ratification of the collective bargaining agreement. The signing shall be paid as soon as practicable after the ratification of the agreement.
- g) Employee Bonus in Lieu of Merit Incentive Bonus Those employees who in the past have received a Merit Incentive Bonus and who were employed from July 1, 2018 to June 30, 2019 will receive in the second year of the contract a \$600 bonus to be paid on July 1, 2020. Those employees who in the past have received a Merit Incentive Bonus and who were employed from July 1, 2018 to June 30, 2019 will receive in the third year of the contract a \$330 bonus to be paid on July 1, 2021.

#### **Section 310.500 Definitions**

The following are definitions of certain terms and are for purposes of clarification as they affect the Merit Compensation System only.

"Adjustment in Salary" – A change in salary occasioned by previously committed error or oversight, or required in the best interest of the agency or the state as defined in Sections 310.470 and 310.480.

<sup>&</sup>quot;Agency" means an agency (e.g., Department, Board, Commission, etc.) of Illinois State government whose employees are subject to this Part.

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"Anticipated Starting Salary" – A position-specific rate or range within the pay grade or salary range assigned to the classification title to which the position being filled is allocated and based on the value of the work to be performed in the position description. The anticipated starting salary is published in the posting of a position opening. When valuing the work to be performed in the position description, agencies, boards and commissions shall consider questions based on the factors located in Section 310.470. The factors are: is the valuation consistent with the treatment of other similar situations; is the valuation equitable in view of the particular circumstances; what are the staffing needs and requirements of the employing agency; and are there labor market influences on recruitment for the classification or position. Some of the questions to be considered are: how are others in this title in the agency compensated; how many staff does the position supervise; what is the scope of the position's area of responsibility; is the position similar to positions at other agencies and, if so, how are those employees compensated; what types of subordinates report to the position and how are they compensated; does this position require a license that is difficult to obtain; has the agency unsuccessfully attempted to fill the position and, if so, how many times; and if the position has private sector counterparts, how are they compensated? This is a non-exhaustive list of factors and questions for agencies, boards and commissions to consider when developing an anticipated starting salary.

"Base Salary" – The dollar amount of pay of an employee as determined under the provisions of the Merit Compensation System. Base salary does not include commission, incentive pay, bilingual pay, longevity pay, overtime pay, shift differential pay or deductions for time not worked.

"Bilingual Pay" – The dollar amount per month, or percentage of the employee's monthly base salary, paid in addition to the employee's base salary when the individual position held by the employee has a job description that requires the use of sign language, Braille, or another second language (e.g., Spanish), or that requires the employee to be bilingual.

"Classification" – The classification established by the Department and approved by the Civil Service Commission based on Section 8a(1) of the Personnel Code and to which one or more positions are allocated based upon similarity of duties performed, responsibilities assigned and conditions of employment. Classification may be abbreviated to "class" and referred to by its title or title code.

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"Class Specification" – The document comprising the title, title code, effective date, distinguishing features of work, illustrative examples of work and desirable requirements.

"Creditable Service" — All service in full or regularly scheduled part-time pay status beginning with the date of initial employment or the effective date of the last in-range or promotional salary increase. Reevaluations (Sections 310.460(c) and 310.480(d)), reallocations (Sections 310.460(b) and 310.480(b)), adjustments (Sections 310.470, 310.480(e) and 310.495(c)) and interim assignments (Section 310.490(p)) shall not change the creditable service date.

"Comparable Classes" – Two or more classes that are in the same salary range.

"Demotion" – The assignment for cause of an employee to a vacant position in a class in a lower salary range than the former class.

"Department" or "CMS" means the Department of Central Management Services.

"Differential" – The additional compensation added to the base salary of an employee resulting from conditions of employment imposed during the normal schedule of work.

"Director" means the Director of the Department of Central Management Services.

"Entrance Base Salary" – The initial base salary assigned to an employee upon entering State service.

"In-hire Rate" – An in-hire rate is a minimum rate/step for a class that is above or below the normal minimum of the range or full scale rate, as approved by the Director after a review of competitive market starting rates for similar classes or as negotiated between the Director and a bargaining unit.

"Maximum Rate of Pay" – The highest rate of pay for a given salary range.

"Minimum Rate of Pay" – The lowest rate of pay for a given salary range. Normally the minimum rate of pay represents the salary to be paid a qualified employee who is appointed to a position in a class assigned to a given salary range.

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"Option" – The denotation of directly-related education, experience and/or knowledge, skills and abilities required to qualify for the position allocated to the classification. The requirements may meet or exceed the requirements indicated in the class specification. The following options are for the Public Service Administrator classification and have a negotiated pay grade and/or a broadbanded salary range assigned:

"Performance Review" – The required review of an employee's on-the-job performance as measured by a specific set of criteria.

"Performance Review Date" – The date on which the annual merit increase and bonus shall be made effective if a performance review indicates it is appropriate. Actual performance review procedures are to be completed prior to the effective date of any recommendation to allow sufficient time for the records to be processed by the originating agency.

"Promotion" – The appointment of an employee, with the approval of the agency and the Department of Central Management Services, to a vacant position in a class in a higher salary range than the former class.

"Reallocation" – A position action in which gradual changes in a single position's assigned duties and responsibilities accumulate and result in the assignment of the position to another class.

"Reclassification" – A position action that occurs subsequent to approval of a new or revised classification by the Civil Service Commission and results in the assignment of a position or positions to a different class.

"Reevaluation" – The assignment of a different salary range to a class of positions based upon a change in relation to other classes or to the labor market.

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"Salary Range" – The dollar values encompassed by the minimum and maximum rates of pay of a salary range assigned to a class title.

"Transfer" – The assignment of an employee to a vacant position in a class having the same salary range.

"Work Year" – That period of time determined by the agency and filed with the Department in accordance with 80 Ill. Adm. Code 303.300.

NOTES: Stipend All bargaining unit employees on active payroll on April 29, 2020 shall receive a one-time stipend of \$2,500 prorated by 25% for each year the employee was employed from July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2019. The stipend shall be paid as soon as practicable.

General Increases – The pay rates for all bargaining unit classifications shall be increased the specified percentage amounts effective on the following dates: January 1, 2020, 1.50%; July 1, 2020, 2.10%; July 1, 2021, 3.95%; and July 1, 2022, 3.95%.

In-Hire Rate – In-hire rates are located in Section 310.47(a). The parties agree the inhire rate as was amended to 75% for the 2008-2012 Collective Bargaining Agreement shall continue in effect. The parties also agree that all classifications shall continue the 75% in-hire rate as agreed to in the 2012-2015 agreement. Employees in the in-hire will receive a 5% increase each year for five years on their anniversary date in order to obtain the full rate. Effective July 1, 2019 the in-hire rate is unfrozen. Each employee on active payroll upon ratification of the contract, whose in-hire rate was frozen during the 2015-2019 agreement shall be placed on his/her correct in-hire rate, on July 1, 2019. The placement shall not change the employee's creditable service (anniversary) date. Example: An employee who was hired on and whose creditable service (anniversary) date is April 1, 2017 at 75% shall be placed on the 85% rate on July 1, 2019. The employee's next in-hire movement (to 90%) will be due on April 1, 2020, pursuant to their creditable service (anniversary) date. Employees within this bargaining unit who are promoted and are in the in-hire progression will promote to the next higher step of the in-hire rate of the higher classification. In addition, temporary assignments to higher-level classifications shall also be calculated at the in-hire rates. All full-scale employees within this collective bargaining unit will be promoted to the full-scale rate as if they were promoted to the next higher classification within the series. Any certified employee of this bargaining unit who is offered and accepts a position within this bargaining unit that is a promotion, notwithstanding classification series and without a break in service, shall be placed on the next higher step of the in-hire

rate of the new classification. Employees covered under this bargaining agreement who transfer to any position within the bargaining unit without a break in service shall maintain their continuous service date for in-hire rate progression. A certified employee who is assigned and accepts a voluntary reduction in grade shall be certified in the lower class without serving a probationary period. The employee shall be reduced to the appropriate in-hire rate, i.e. 85% lead worker voluntarily reduces to an 85% Highway Maintainer.

NOTES: Stipend All bargaining unit employees on active payroll on the date of ratification shall receive a one-time stipend of \$2,500 prorated by 25% for each year the employee was employed from July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2019. The stipend shall be paid as soon as practicable.

General Increases – The pay rates for all bargaining unit classifications shall be increased the specified percentage amounts effective on the following dates: January 1, 2020, 1.50%; July 1, 2020, 2.10%; July 1, 2021, 3.95%; and July 1, 2022, 3.95%. Pay rates for each step and their effective dates are listed in the rate tables in this Section.

In-Hire Rate – In-hire rates are located in Section 310.47(a). The parties agree the inhire rate as was amended to 75% for the 2008-2012 Collective Bargaining Agreement shall continue in effect. The parties also agree that all classifications shall continue the 75% in-hire rate as agreed to in the 2012-2015 agreement. Employees in the in-hire will receive a 5% increase each year for five years on their anniversary date in order to obtain the full rate. Effective July 1, 2019 the in-hire rate is unfrozen. Each employee on active payroll upon ratification of the contract, who's in-hire rate was frozen during the 2015-2019 agreement shall be placed on their correct in-hire rate, on July 1, 2019. Such placement shall not change the employee's credible service date. Example: employee who was hired on and whose credible service date is April 1, 2018, would have been frozen at 75% shall be moved to 80% on July 1, 2019. The employee will then be due their next in-hire rate on April 1, 2020, pursuant to their credible service date. Employees within this bargaining unit who are promoted and are in the in-hire progression will promote to the next higher step of the in-hire rate of the higher classification. In addition, temporary assignments to higher level classifications shall also be calculated at the in-hire rates. All full-scale employees within this collective bargaining unit will be promoted to full-scale rate as if they were promoted to the next higher classification

within the series. Any certified employee of this bargaining unit who is offered and accepts a position within this bargaining unit that is a promotion, notwithstanding classification series and without a break in service, shall be placed on the next higher step of the in-hire rate of the new classification. Employees covered under this bargaining agreement who transfer to any position within the bargaining unit without a break in service shall maintain their continuous service date for in-hire rate progression. A certified employee who is assigned and accepts a voluntary reduction in grade shall be certified in the lower class without serving a probationary period. The employee shall be reduced to the appropriate in-hire rate; i.e., 85% lead worker voluntarily reduces to an 85% Highway Maintainer.

NOTES: Stipend All bargaining unit employees on active payroll on the date of ratification shall receive a one-time stipend of \$2,500 prorated by 25% for each year the employee was employed from July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2019. The stipend shall be paid as soon as practicable.

> General Increases – The pay rates for all bargaining unit classifications shall be increased the specified percentage amounts effective on the following dates: January 1, 2020, 1.50%; July 1, 2020, 2.10%; July 1, 2021, 3.95%; and July 1, 2022, 3.95%. Pay rates for each step and their effective dates are listed in the rate tables in this Section.

> In-Hire Rate – In-hire rates are located in Section 310.47(a). The parties agree the inhire rate as was amended to 75% for the 2008-2012 Collective Bargaining Agreement shall continue in effect. The parties also agree that all classifications shall continue the 75% in-hire rate as agreed to in the 2012-2015 agreement. Employees in the in-hire will receive a 5% increase each year for five years on their anniversary date in order to obtain the full rate. Effective July 1, 2019 the in-hire rate is unfrozen. Each employee on active payroll upon ratification of the contract, whose in-hire rate was frozen during the 2015-2019 agreement shall be placed on his/her correct in-hire rate, on July 1, 2019. Such placement shall not change the employees creditable service (anniversary) date. Example: An employee who was hired on and whose creditable service (anniversary) date is April 1, 2017 at 75% shall be placed on the 85% rate on July 1, 2019. The employee's next in-hire movement (to 90%) will be due on April 1, 2020, pursuant to their creditable service (anniversary) date. Employees within this bargaining unit who are promoted and are in the in-hire progression will promote to the next higher step of the in-hire rate of the higher classification. In addition, temporary assignments to higher-level classifications shall also be calculated at the in-hire rates. All full-scale employees within this collective bargaining unit will be promoted to the full-scale rate as if they were promoted to the next higher classification within the series. Any certified employee of this bargaining unit who is offered and accepts a position within this bargaining unit that is a promotion, notwithstanding classification series and without a break in service, shall be placed on the next higher step of the in-hire rate of the

new classification. Employees covered under this bargaining agreement who transfer to any position within the bargaining unit without a break in service shall maintain their continuous service date for in-hire rate progression. A certified employee who is assigned and accepts a voluntary reduction in grade shall be certified in the lower class without serving a probationary period. The employee shall be reduced to the appropriate in-hire rate; i.e., 85% lead worker voluntarily reduces to an 85% Highway Maintainer.

In addition, temporary assignments shall also be calculated at the in-hire rates. Employees in the in-hire progression will receive a 5% increase each year for five years on their anniversary date in order to obtain the full rate. All full scale employees will be promoted to the full-scale rate of the next higher classifications, upon promotion.

Longevity Pay – Effective July 1, 1998, the Step 7 rate shall be increased \$50 per month for those employees (non-sworn) who attain 15 years of service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 7 in the same pay grade. Effective July 1,

2010, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$50 per month for those employees (non-sworn) who attain 10 years of service and have three or more years of creditable service at Step 8 in the same pay grade. Effective July 1, 2013, the Step 8 rate shall be increased \$75 per month for those employees (non-sworn) who attain 10 years of service and have three of more years of creditable service at Step 8 in the same pay grade. Effective July 1, 2013, the Step 8 rate shall be increased \$100 per month for those employees (non-sworn) who attain 15 years of service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8.

Pension Formula Change – An employee newly hired to a position that was previously covered by the alternative formula for pension benefits prior to January 1, 2011 and, effective January 1, 2011, is covered by the standard formula for pension benefits (see the Illinois Pension Code [40 ILCS 5/1-160(g) and 14-110(b)]) shall be placed on the Pay Plan Code B salary grade assigned to the classification to which the position is allocated. An employee newly hired is an employee hired on or after January 1, 2011 who has never been a member of the State Employees' Retirement System (SERS) or any other reciprocal retirement system. Other reciprocal retirement systems are the Chicago Teachers' Pension Fund, County Employees' Annuity and Benefit Fund of Cook County, Forest Preserve District Employees' Annuity and Benefit Fund of Cook County, General Assembly Retirement System (GARS), Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund (IMRF), Judges Retirement System (JRS), Laborers' Annuity and Benefit Fund of Chicago, Metropolitan Water Reclamation District Retirement Fund, Municipal Employees Annuity and Benefit Fund of Chicago, State Universities Retirement System (SURS) and Teachers' Retirement System of the State of Illinois (TRS).

Longevity Pay – Effective January 1, 2002, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$25 per month for those employees who attain 10 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 7 in the same or higher pay grade on or before January 1, 2002. For those employees who attain 15 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 7 in the same or higher pay grade on or before January 1, 2002, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$50 per month. For employees not eligible for longevity pay on or before January 1, 2002, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$25 per month for those employees who attain 10 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade. For those employees who attain 15 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$50 per month. Effective July 1, 2010, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$50 per month for those employees who attain 10 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade on or before July 1, 2010. For those employees who attain 15 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade on or before July 1, 2010, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$75 per month. Effective July 1, 2013, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$25 per month to \$75 a month for those employees who attain 10 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8

Employees whose salaries are red-circled above the maximum step rate continue to receive all applicable general increases and any other adjustments (except the longevity pay) provided for in an applicable collective bargaining agreement. For these employees, the longevity pay shall be limited to the amount that would increase the employee's salary to the amount that is equal to that of an employee on the maximum step rate with the same number of years of continuous and creditable service. Employees receiving the longevity pay shall continue to receive the longevity pay as long as they remain in the same or successor classification as a result of a reclassification or reevaluation. Employees who are eligible for the increase provided for longevity pay on or before January 1, 2002, shall continue to receive longevity pay after being placed on Step 8 while they remain in the same or lower pay grade.

NOTES: Stipend—Effective June 30, 2019, and paid upon ratification of the 2019 collective bargaining agreement, all bargaining unit employees shall receive a one-time stipend of \$2,500 prorated by 25% for each year the employee was employed from July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2019.

Sub-Steps – Step 1a, 1b, and 1c shall be implemented for all employees hired on or after May 20, 2013, with a 3% step differential. Effective July 1, 2019, Step 1a, 1b, and 1c shall be increased by \$25 per month, with subsequent \$25 per month increases effective July 1, 2020 and July 1, 2021.

General Increases – The pay rates for all bargaining unit classifications and steps shall be increased by the specified percentage amounts effective on the following dates: January 1, 2020, 1.50%; July 1, 2020, 2.10%; July 1, 2021, 3.95%; and July 1, 2022, 3.95%. Pay rates for each step and their effective dates are listed in the rate tables in this Section.

Longevity Pay – Effective January 1, 2002, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$25 per month for those employees who attain 10 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 7 in the same or higher pay grade on or before January 1, 2002. For those employees who attain 15 years of continuous

service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 7 in the same or higher pay grade on or before January 1, 2002, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$50 per month. For employees not eligible for longevity pay on or before January 1, 2002, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$25 per month for those employees who attain 10 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade. For those employees who attain 15 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$50 per month. Effective July 1, 2010, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$50 per month for those employees who attain 10 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade on or before July 1, 2010. For those employees who attain 15 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade on or before July 1, 2010, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$75 per month. Effective July 1, 2013, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$25 per month to \$75 a month for those employees who attain 10 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade on or before July 1, 2013. For those employees who attain 15 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade on or before July 1, 2013, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$25 per month to \$100 a month. Employees whose salaries are redcircled above the maximum Step rate continue to receive all applicable general increases and any other adjustments (except the longevity pay) provided for in an applicable collective bargaining agreement. For these employees, the longevity pay shall be limited to the amount that would increase the employee's salary to the amount that is equal to that of an employee on the maximum Step rate with the same number of years of continuous and creditable service. Employees receiving the longevity pay shall continue to receive the longevity pay as long as they remain in the same or successor classification as a result of a reclassification or reevaluation. Employees who are eligible for the increase provided for longevity pay on or before January 1, 2002, shall continue to receive longevity pay after being placed on Step 8 while they remain in the same or lower pay grade.

NOTES: Stipend—Effective June 30, 2019, and paid upon ratification of the 2019 collective bargaining agreement, all bargaining unit employees shall receive a one-time stipend of \$2,500 prorated by 25% for each year the employee was employed from July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2019.

Sub-Steps – Step 1a, 1b, and 1c shall be implemented for all employees hired on or after May 20, 2013, with a 3% step differential. Effective July 1, 2019, Step 1a, 1b, and 1c shall be increased by \$25 per month, with subsequent \$25 per month increases effective July 1, 2020 and July 1, 2021.

#### NOTICE OF ADOPTED AMENDMENTS

General Increases – The pay rates for all bargaining unit classifications and steps shall be increased by the specified percentage amounts effective on the following dates: January 1, 2020, 1.50%; July 1, 2020, 2.10%; July 1, 2021, 3.95%; and July 1, 2022, 3.95%. Pay rates for each step and their effective dates are listed in the rate tables in this Section.

Longevity Pay – Effective January 1, 2002, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$25 per month for those employees who attain 10 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 7 in the same or higher pay grade on or before January 1, 2002. For those employees who attain 15 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 7 in the same or higher pay grade on or before January 1, 2002, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$50 per month. For employees not eligible for longevity pay on or before January 1, 2002, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$25 per month for those employees who attain 10 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade. For those employees who attain 15 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$50 per month. Effective July 1, 2010, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$50 per month for those employees who attain 10 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade on or before July 1, 2010. For those employees who attain 15 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade on or before July 1, 2010, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$75 per month. Effective July 1, 2013, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$25 per month to \$75 a month for those employees who attain 10 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade on or before July 1, 2013. For those employees who attain 15 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade on or before July 1, 2013, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$25 per month to \$100 a month. Employees whose salaries are red-circled above the maximum Step rate continue to receive all applicable general increases and any other adjustments (except the longevity pay) provided for in an applicable collective bargaining agreement. For these employees, the longevity pay shall be limited to the amount that would increase the employee's salary to the amount that is equal to that of an employee on the maximum Step rate with the same number of years of continuous and creditable service. Employees receiving the longevity pay shall continue to receive the longevity pay as long as they remain in the same or successor classification as a

result of a reclassification or reevaluation. Employees who are eligible for the increase provided for longevity pay on or before January 1, 2002, shall continue to receive longevity pay after being placed on Step 8 while they remain in the same or lower pay grade.

Other reciprocal retirement systems are the Chicago Teachers' Pension Fund, County Employees' Annuity and Benefit Fund of Cook County, Forest Preserve District Employees' Annuity and Benefit Fund of Cook County, General Assembly Retirement System (GARS), Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund (IMRF), Judges Retirement System (JRS), Laborers' Annuity and Benefit Fund of Chicago, Metropolitan Water Reclamation District Retirement Fund, Municipal Employees Annuity and Benefit Fund of Chicago, State Universities Retirement System (SURS) and Teachers' Retirement System of the State of Illinois (TRS).

Employees whose salaries are red-circled above the maximum Step rate continue to receive all applicable general increases and any other adjustments (except the longevity pay) provided for in an applicable collective bargaining agreement. For these employees, the longevity pay shall be limited to the amount that would increase the employee's salary to the amount that is equal to that of an employee on the maximum Step rate with the same number of years of continuous and creditable service. Employees receiving the longevity pay shall continue to receive the longevity pay as long as they remain in the same or successor classification as a result of a reclassification or reevaluation. Employees who are eligible for the increase provided for longevity pay on or before January 1, 2002, shall continue to receive longevity pay after being placed on Step 8 while they remain in the same or lower pay grade.

For the employees who attained 15 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 7 in the same or higher pay grade on or before August 16, 2010, the Step 8 rate was increased by \$75 per month. Effective August 16, 2013, the Step 8 was raised by \$25 per month to \$75 per month for the employees who attained 10 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade on or before August 16, 2013. For the employees who attained 15 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade on or before August 16, 2013, the Step 8 rate was increased by \$25 per month to \$100 per month. Employees who are eligible for longevity on or before January 1, 2002 shall continue to receive longevity pay after being placed on Step 8 while they remain in the same or lower pay grade. Employees not eligible for longevity pay on or before the date they are placed on Step 8 shall begin to receive longevity pay after three years or more of creditable service on Step 8.

NOTES: Stipend—Effective June 30, 2019, and paid upon ratification of the 2019 collective bargaining agreement, all bargaining unit employees shall receive a one time stipend of \$2,500 prorated by 25% for each year the employee was employed from July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2019.

#### NOTICE OF ADOPTED AMENDMENTS

Sub-Steps – Step 1a, 1b, and 1c shall be implemented for all employees hired on or after May 20, 2013, with a 3% step differential. Effective July 1, 2019, Step 1a, 1b, and 1c shall be increased by \$25 per month, with subsequent \$25 per month increases effective July 1, 2020 and July 1, 2021.

General Increases – Pay rates for all bargaining unit classifications and steps shall be increased by the specified percentage amounts effective on the following dates: January 1, 2020, 1.50%; July 1, 2020, 2.10%; July 1, 2021, 3.95%; July 1, 2022, 3.95%. Pay rates for each step and their effective dates are listed in the rate tables in this Section.

Longevity Pay – Effective January 1, 2002, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$25 per month for those employees who attain 10 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 7 in the same or higher pay grade on or before January 1, 2002. For those employees who attain 15 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 7 in the same or higher pay grade on or before January 1, 2002, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$50 per month. For employees not eligible for longevity pay on or before January 1, 2002, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$25 per month for those employees who attain 10 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade. For those employees who attain 15 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$50 per month. Effective July 1, 2010, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$50 per month for those employees who attain 10 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade on or before July 1, 2010. For those employees who attain 15 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade on or before July 1, 2010, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$75 per month. Effective July 1, 2013, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$25 per month to \$75 a month for those employees who attain 10 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade on or before July 1, 2013. For those employees who attain 15 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade on or before July 1, 2013, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$25 per month to \$100 a month. Employees whose salaries are red-circled above the maximum Step rate continue to receive all applicable general increases and any other adjustments (except the longevity pay) provided for in an applicable collective bargaining agreement. For

these employees, the longevity pay shall be limited to the amount that would increase the employee's salary to the amount that is equal to that of an employee on the maximum Step rate with the same number of years of continuous and creditable service. Employees receiving the longevity pay shall continue to receive the longevity pay as long as they remain in the same or successor classification as a result of a reclassification or reevaluation. Employees who are eligible for the increase provided for longevity pay on or before January 1, 2002, shall continue to receive longevity pay after being placed on Step 8 while they remain in the same or lower pay grade.

General Increases – Pay rates for all bargaining unit classifications and steps shall be increased by the specified percentage amounts effective on the following dates: January 1, 2020, 1.50%; July 1, 2020, 2.10%; July 1, 2021, 3.95%; July 1, 2022, 3.95%. Pay rates for each step and their effective dates are listed in the rate tables in this Section.

For those employees who attain 15 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 7 in the same or higher pay grade on or before January 1, 2002, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$50 per month. For employees not eligible for longevity pay on or before January 1, 2002, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$25 per month for those employees who attain 10 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade. For those employees who attain 15 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$50 per month. Effective July 1, 2010, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$50 per month for those employees who attain 10 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade on or before July 1, 2010. For those employees who attain 15 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade on or before July 1, 2010, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$75 per month. Effective July 1, 2013, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$25 per month to \$75 a month for those employees who attain 10 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade on or before July 1, 2013. For those employees who attain 15 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade on or before July 1, 2013, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$25 per month to \$100 a month. Employees whose salaries are red-circled (see Section 310.220(f)) above the maximum Step rate continue to receive all applicable general increases and any other adjustments (except the longevity pay) provided for in an applicable collective bargaining

agreement. For these employees, the longevity pay shall be limited to the amount that would increase the employee's salary to the amount that is equal to that of an employee on the maximum Step rate with the same number of years of continuous and creditable service. Employees receiving the longevity pay shall continue to receive the longevity pay as long as they remain in the same or successor classification as a result of a reclassification or reevaluation. Employees who are eligible for the increase provided for longevity pay on or before January 1, 2002 shall continue to receive longevity pay after being placed on Step 8 while they remain in the same or lower pay grade.

NOTES: Stipend Effective June 30, 2019, and paid upon ratification of the 2019 collective bargaining agreement, all bargaining unit employees shall receive a one-time stipend of \$2,500 prorated by 25% for each year the employee was employed from July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2019.

Sub-Steps – Step 1a, 1b, and 1c shall be implemented for all employees hired on or after May 20, 2013, with a 3% step differential. Effective July 1, 2019, Step 1a, 1b, and 1c shall be increased by \$25 per month, with subsequent \$25 per month increases effective July 1, 2020 and July 1, 2021.

General Increases – The pay rates for all bargaining unit classifications and steps shall be increased by the specified percentage amounts effective on the following dates: January 1, 2020, 1.50%; July 1, 2020, 2.10%; July 1, 2021, 3.95%; and July 1, 2022, 3.95%. Pay rates for each step and their effective dates are listed in the rate tables in this Section.

Longevity Pay – Effective January 1, 2002, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$25 per month for those employees who attain 10 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 7 in the same or higher pay grade on or before January 1, 2002. For those employees who attain 15 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 7 in the same or higher pay grade on or before January 1, 2002, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$50 per month. For employees not eligible for longevity pay on or before January 1, 2002, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$25 per month for those employees who attain 10 years of continuous service and have three or more

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years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade. For those employees who attain 15 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$50 per month. Effective July 1, 2010, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$50 per month for those employees who attain 10 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade on or before July 1, 2010. For those employees who attain 15 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade on or before July 1, 2010, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$75 per month. Effective July 1, 2013, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$25 per month to \$75 a month for those employees who attain 10 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade on or before July 1, 2013. For those employees who attain 15 years of continuous service and have three or more years of creditable service on Step 8 in the same or higher pay grade on or before July 1, 2013, the Step 8 rate shall be increased by \$25 per month to \$100 a month. Employees whose salaries are red-circled above the maximum Step rate continue to receive all applicable general increases and any other adjustments (except the longevity pay) provided for in an applicable collective bargaining agreement. For these employees, the longevity pay shall be limited to the amount that would increase the employee's salary to the amount that is equal to that of an employee on the maximum Step rate with the same number of years of continuous and creditable service. Employees receiving the longevity pay shall continue to receive the longevity pay as long as they remain in the same or successor classification as a result of a reclassification or reevaluation. Employees who are eligible for the increase provided for longevity pay on or before January 1, 2002, shall continue to receive longevity pay after being placed on Step 8 while they remain in the same or lower pay grade.

For these employees, the longevity pay shall be limited to the amount that would increase the employee's salary to the amount that is equal to that of an employee on the maximum Step rate with the same number of years of continuous and creditable service. Employees receiving the longevity pay shall continue to receive the longevity pay as long as they remain in the same or successor classification as a result of a reclassification or reevaluation. #### SUBPART D: PAYMENT FOR NON-INSTITUTIONAL SERVICES

#### **Section 140.405 Non-Institutional Rate Reductions**

Notwithstanding any provisions to the contrary in this Part, effective for dates of service on or after July 1, 2012, reimbursement rates and other payments to non-institutional providers shall be reduced by an additional 2.7% from the rates or payments that were otherwise in effect on June 30. 2012, except that the reductions shall not apply to:

- a) Rates or payments for physician services, dental services, services reimbursed through an encounter rate, services provided under the Medicaid Rehabilitation Option of the Illinois Title XIX State Plan.
- b) Rates or payments, or the portion thereof, paid to a provider that is operated by a unit of local government or State University that provides some or all of the non-federal share of the services.
- c) Pharmacy services, which are reduced pursuant to Sections 140.414 and 140.445.
- d) Notwithstanding any other provision to the contrary in this Part, federally approved rates or payments for services related to a public health emergency that:

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- 1) Appear on the Department's public health emergency published fee schedule; and
- 2) Meet the date of service specifications on the Department's public health emergency published fee schedule.
- The Department's public health emergency published fee schedule shall remain in place until the Department determines the rates or payments described under this subsection (d) are no longer necessary to address a public health emergency, for reasons including, but not limited to: the establishment, termination, or modification of any applicable federal or State disaster declaration, Executive Orders of the Governor, or disaster-related flexibilities granted by federal agencies.

#### Section 140.416 Optometric Services and Materials

- a) Payment for optometric services and materials shall be made to physicians, optometrists, opticians and optical companies.
- b) Payment shall be made for the following optometric services and materials:
  - 1) An eye examination by a physician or an optometrist for the purpose of determining the condition of the eye including the refractive state.
  - 2) Frame repairs, contact lenses, artificial eyes and low vision devices provided by physicians, optometrists, opticians and optical companies.
  - 3) Dispensing of optical materials.
  - 4) Lenses, frame parts and frames provided by the Department of Corrections (DOC) laboratory.
- c) Optometric services and materials for which payment shall not be made include:
  - 1) Services which are not provided to address a recipient's particular visual problems or complaints.

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- 2) Lenses, frames and frame parts obtained from a source other than the DOC laboratory.
- 3) Trifocals.
- 4) Tinted lenses.
- 5) Provider's transportation costs.
- d) Payment for services and materials shall be at the lesser of the provider's usual and customary charge or the maximums established by the Department pursuant to Section 140.400.
- e) Lenses, Frames and Frame Parts Requirements that Began During a Public Health Emergency. Notwithstanding subsections (b)(4) and (c)(2) of this Section and Section 140.418, and any other provision to the contrary in this Part, the Department will reimburse for lenses, frame parts and frames provided by the Department's laboratory vendors for dates of service on or after March 9, 2020 until the Department determines any or all of the services provided by the Department's laboratory vendors are no longer necessary or until the DOC laboratory resumes production of lenses, frames and frame parts.

#### SUBPART G: FINANCIAL FACTORS OF ELIGIBILITY

#### **Section 112.110 Exempt Unearned Income**

The following unearned income shall be exempt from consideration in determining eligibility and the level of assistance payment:

- a) The value of the benefit allotment under the Food and Nutrition Act of 2008 (7 USC 2017(b));
- b) The value of the U.S. Department of Agriculture donated foods (surplus commodities);
- c) Any payment received under the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970 (42 USC 4636);
- d) Any funds distributed per capita to or held in trust for members of any Indian Tribe under P.L. 92-254, P.L. 93-134, P.L. 94-114 or P.L. 94-540;
- e) Any benefits received under Title VII, Nutrition Program for the Elderly, of the Older Americans Act of 1965, as amended (42 USC 3045 et seq.);
- f) Any compensation provided to individual volunteers under the Volunteers in Service to America (VISTA) Program (known as AmeriCorps VISTA). Payments made under Americorps State/National programs, funded under the National and Community Service Act of 1993, are not exempt. Stipends or living allowance payments made under this program are considered nonexempt earned income. These payments are subject to the general rules concerning the budgeting of earned income;
- g) Income received under the provisions of Section 4(c) of the Senior Citizens and Disabled Persons Property Tax Relief and Pharmaceutical Assistance Act [320 ILCS 25/4]. This includes both the benefits commonly known as the circuit

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breaker and additional grants;

- h) Payments for supporting services or reimbursement for out-of-pocket expenses made to volunteers serving as senior health aides, senior companions, foster grandparents, and persons serving in the Service Corps of Retired Executives (SCORE) and Active Corps of Executives (ACE) and any other programs under Titles II and III, pursuant to Section 418 of P.L. 93-113;
- Unearned income such as need based payments, cash assistance, compensation in lieu of wages and allowances received through the Workforce Investment Act (WIA);
- j) Social Security death benefit expended on a funeral and/or burial;
- k) The value of supplemental food assistance received under the Child Nutrition Act of 1966, as amended (42 USC 1780(b)) and the special food service program for children under the Richard B. Russell National School Lunch Act, as amended (42 USC 1760);
- 1) Tax exempt portions of payments made pursuant to the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act (43 USC 1626);
- m) Payments received under Title I of P.L. 100-383 of the Civil Liberties Act of 1988 (50 USC 1989b through 1989b-8);
- n) Payments received under Title II of P.L. 100-383 of the Aleutian and Pribilof Islands Restitution Act (50 USC 1989c through 1989c-8);
- o) Payments made to veterans who receive an annual disability payment or to the survivors of deceased veterans who receive a one-time lump-sum payment from the Agent Orange Settlement Fund or any other fund referencing Agent Orange product liability under P.L. 101-201;
- p) Payments received under the federal Radiation Exposure Compensation Act (42 USC 2210 nt);
- q) Federal subsidized housing payments under section 8 of the Housing and Community Development Act (42 USC 1437f);

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- r) Any adoption subsidy payment or foster care payment received from DCFS or from a state welfare agency of another state are exempt for MAG and MANG. Independent Living Arrangement Payments are not exempt for MAG and MANG;
- s) Supportive Service payments (Section 112.82);
- t) Benefits paid to eligible households under the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Act of 1981 pursuant to Section 2605(f) of P.L. 97-35;
- u) Disaster relief payments provided by federal, state or local government or a disaster assistance organization;
- v) Any payment provided by the Department of Human Services under the Family Assistance Program for Children with Mental Disabilities [405 ILCS 80/Art. III];
- w) A nonrecurring lump-sum SSI or SSA payment made to an individual in a TANF assistance unit. The nonrecurring SSA lump sum is exempt if it is based on disability. The monthly amount, up to the monthly SSI level for one, is exempt. For those individuals not in a TANF assistance unit whose income is used to determine TANF eligibility for others (for example, the parent of a person under age 18 who is receiving assistance as a parent), the lump-sum payment is nonexempt income for the month received;
- x) Payments made to individuals because of their status as victims of Nazi persecution pursuant to P.L. 103-286;
- y) Payments to a member of the Passamquoddy Indian Tribe, the Penobscot Nation of the Houlton Band of the Maliseet Indians pursuant to the Maine Indian Claims Settlement Act of 1980;
- z) Up to \$2000 per year of income received by individual Indians, which is derived from leases or other uses of individually-owned trust or restricted lands pursuant to Section 13736 of P.L. 103-66;
- Payments based on disability status are disregarded in an amount up to the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payment level for one person with no income. This disregard applies to disability benefits from Social Security (including SSI), Railroad Retirement Disability, Department of Veterans' Affairs (100% disability only) and Black Lung;

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- bb) Payments made under the federal Crime Act of 1984 (as amended by P.L. 104-132, Section 234, Crime Victims Fund);
- cc) Inconsequential income, which is defined as gifts, prizes or other unearned income (excluding that which is otherwise exempted in this Section) of up to \$50 per person per quarter;
- dd) The value of home produce that is used for personal consumption;
- ee) Child support payments made to an assistance unit by the Department or noncustodial parent that represent the first \$100 or any lesser amount of support collected in a month for a family with one child, or \$200 or any lesser amount of support collected in a month for a family with two or more children;
- ff) Three dollars of every \$4 of excess child support distributed by the child support agency to a family with earnings budgeted. This includes the wage supplementation programs of on-the-job training, Job Corps, AmeriCorps VISTA, and work study;
- gg) Payments from the principal or trust of a trust fund made to or on behalf of a dependent child when the court orders the money released for a specific purpose other than the income maintenance needs of the child;
- hh) Earmarked child support payments received by the client for the support of a child not included in the assistance unit;
- ii) Cash that is exchanged for purposes of satisfying payment of shelter-related obligations in situations in which the assistance unit shares a dwelling unit with another family, individual or individuals. The money is not available to meet the needs of the party who received and disburses the shelter-related payment;
- jj) Employment-related reimbursements for past or future expenses to the extent that they do not exceed actual expenses incurred and do not represent a gain or benefit to the client;
- kk) All educational loans, grants, scholarships, fellowships, veteran's educational benefits, and federal and State work study programs; and

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- ll) Achieving a Better Life Experience (ABLE) accounts All earnings on ABLE accounts are exempt. The balance of this account is to be exempt unearned income.
- mm) For a period of no more than 60 months, any financial assistance, including wages, cash transfers, or gifts, that is provided to a person who is enrolled in a program or research project that is not funded with general revenue funds that is intended to investigate impacts of policies or programs designed to reduce poverty, promote social mobility, or increase financial stability for Illinois residents, if there is an explicit plan to collect data and evaluate the program or initiative that is developed prior to participants in the study being enrolled in the program and if a research team has been identified to oversee the evaluation.

# SUBPART C: FINANCIAL FACTORS OF ELIGIBILITY

# **Section 121.31 Exempt Unearned Income**

The following unearned income is exempt:

- a) Vendor payments when these are made in behalf of a household by a nonhousehold member with nonhousehold funds, and paid directly to the household's creditors or person or organization providing the service to the household. (This includes rent and mortgage payments made to landlords or mortgagees by Housing and Urban Development (HUD));
- b) Monies that are legally obligated and otherwise payable to the household such as, but not limited to, garnished wages, public assistance grants directed to a protective payee, GA disbursing orders and payments directed to a vendor, and support or alimony payments legally obligated to a household member, but which are diverted by the provider of the payment to a third party for a household expense, are counted as income and not excluded as a vendor payment. The following are considered vendor payments and not diverted income:
  - 1) Rent paid directly to a landlord by a household's employer in addition to paying the household its regular wages;
  - 2) Assistance payments that would not normally be provided in a money payment to the household, and that are over and above normal public assistance or general assistance grants, if they are made directly to a third party for a household expense;
  - 3) Child support or alimony payments specified by a court order or other legally binding agreement to go directly to a third party rather than to a household;

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- 4) Support payments not required by a court order or other legally binding agreement (such as, payments in excess of an amount specified in a court order or written agreement) which are paid to a third party rather than to the household;
- 5) Public Assistance or General Assistance payments to a third party in behalf of a household for medical, child care, or energy assistance (Public Assistance means AFDC and AABD);
- From October 20, 1987, to September 30, 1989, the entire amount of Public Assistance or General Assistance payments to third parties in behalf of a household for temporary housing, even any portion of the payment which is part of the normal Public Assistance or General Assistance payment, provided the housing lacks facilities for preparation and cooking of hot meals or refrigerated food storage; and
- 7) Emergency Public Assistance (PA) or General Assistance (GA) payments made directly to a third party (that is, vendor payment) on behalf of a migrant or seasonal farmworker household while the household is in the job stream. This assistance includes, but is not limited to, emergency vendor payments for housing or transportation.
- c) Cash donations based on need received on or after February 1, 1988, from one or more private nonprofit charitable organizations, but not to exceed \$300 in a federal fiscal year quarter;
- d) Any income in the certification period which is received too infrequently or irregularly to be reasonably anticipated, not in excess of \$50 per quarter;
- e) All loans on which repayment is deferred;
- f) Reimbursements for past or future expenses, to the extent they do not exceed actual expenses and do not represent a gain or benefit to the household. This does not include reimbursements for normal living expenses;
- g) Monies received and used for the care and maintenance of a third-party beneficiary who is not a household member. Foster care payments are considered income to the adult or child in foster care and not income to the household providing the foster care even if the payments are made to the provider household

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rather than to the adult or child or children in foster care. If the household chooses to include the adults and/or children in foster care as part of the household, the entire foster care payment is considered unearned income to the household:

- h) Income of nonhousehold members except ineligible household members who have been sanctioned for fraud or intentional program violation, for failure to comply with work registration requirements due to a voluntary job quit or reduction in work hours, or failure to comply with the FSE&T program, for failure to meet the social security number requirements, because of ineligible alien status, or due to questionable citizenship status (see Section 121.73);
- i) Payments to volunteers under the Domestic Volunteer Service Act (42 USC 4951-4993) (VISTA) are exempt only if the individual:
  - 1) was receiving food stamps or public assistance at the time he or she joined VISTA; and/or
  - 2) was receiving an exempted VISTA payment, or other subsistance payments under Title I of the Domestic Volunteer Services Act, prior to March 1, 1979, and the volunteer contract in effect March 1, 1979, has not expired;
- j) Income received from the disposition of funds to the Grand River Band of Ottawa Indians;
- k) Any income specifically excluded by any federal statute from income consideration for food stamp purposes;
- Unearned income such as need based payments, cash assistance, compensation in lieu of wages and allowances through the Job Training Partnership Act (29 USC 1501-1781);
- m) Payments made by the Illinois Department of Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities under the Family Assistance Program for Mentally Disabled Children under P.A. 86-921;
- n) Income received from the Social Security Administration under the PASS Program;

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- o) Payments made under the federal Crime Act of 1984 (as amended by P.L. 104-132, Section 234, Crime Victims Fund);
- p) All educational loans, grants, scholarships, fellowships, veteran's educational benefits, and all federal and State work study programs; and
- q) Any additional payment received under Chapter 5 of Title 37, United States Code, by a member of the United States Armed Forces deployed to a designated combat zone shall be excluded from household income for the duration of the member's deployment if the additional pay is the result of deployment to or while serving in a combat zone, and it was not received immediately prior to serving in the combat zone.
- For a period of no more than 60 months, any financial assistance, including wages, cash transfers or gifts, that is provided to a person who is enrolled in a program or research project that is not funded with general revenue funds that is intended to investigate impacts of policies or programs designed to reduce poverty, promote social mobility, or increase financial stability for Illinois residents, if there is an explicit plan to collect data and evaluate the program or initiative that is developed prior to participants in the study being enrolled in the program and if a research team has been identified to oversee the evaluation.

# Section 554.10 Potentially Eligible Students

Potentially eligible students are individuals who can provide supporting evidence that they meet the definition of "student with a disability" at 89 Ill. Adm. Code 521.20.

# **Section 554.20 Service Options**

- a) Potentially eligible students shall receive one or more pre-employment transition services as defined in 89 Ill. Adm. Code 521.20, including: job exploration counseling; work-based learning experiences; counseling on opportunities for enrollment in postsecondary educational programs; workplace readiness training to develop social and independent living skills; and instruction in self-advocacy, including peer mentoring.
- b) Potentially eligible students shall not receive any individualized vocational rehabilitation services. Any potentially eligible individual seeking to receive individualized vocational rehabilitation services must apply for vocational rehabilitation services and be certified as eligible (see Section 554.60).

Potentially eligible students shall receive a written agreement, stating the specific preemployment transition services they will receive and the name of the entity that will provide the services.

# Section 554.40 Parent or Guardian Signature

Written consent of a parent or guardian is required to participate in pre-employment transition services for a potentially eligible student who:

- a) is under 18 years of age, unless emancipated in accordance with the Emancipation of Mature Minors Act [750 ILCS 30]; or
- b) is a person for whom a legal guardian has been appointed.

# Section 554.50 Exit from Services to Potentially Eligible Students

- a) A potentially eligible student shall no longer receive services under this Part if the student is no longer a student or reaches the age of 22.
- b) A potentially eligible student may choose to terminate services at any time. Written consent of a parent or guardian is required to terminate services for students under 18 years of age or for whom a legal guardian has been appointed.

# Section 554.60 Transfer to Eligibility Status in the Vocational Rehabilitation Program

A potentially eligible student may choose to apply for the Vocational Rehabilitation Program under 89 Ill. Adm. Code 557 and be evaluated for program eligibility under 89 Ill. Adm. Code 553. During the time the potentially eligible student is being evaluated for eligibility, the student may continue to receive pre-employment transition services under this Part.

operations which is necessary for the production of income;

- e) life insurance including:
  - 1) group life insurance held as a condition of employment or provided by an employer;
  - 2) a prepaid burial plan with a value of up to \$1,500; and/or

- f) the principal of a trust if the trust document establishing the trust specifically states the principal cannot be impaired. HSP administration must be involved in any determination involving trust funds; and
- g) In the case of a minor customer (Section 682.200(b)), the parents' pension funds are exempt assets. "Pension funds" are defined as funds held in individual retirement accounts (IRA) or in work-related pension plans or plans for self-employed individuals; and-
- h) an approved Achieving a Better Life Experience (ABLE) account under the State Treasurer Act [15 ILCS 505/16.6], 26 USCA 529A, and 74 Ill. Adm. Code 722.

- Summary and Purpose of Rulemaking: The Department is required to establish the minimum standards for physical conditions of the juvenile detention centers across the State. To that end, this proposed new Part provides minimum standards that reflect current practices. Numerous definitions have been added. Specifically, definitions for

delinquent minor, direct staff supervision, full compliance, gender nonconforming, intersex, medical practitioner, mental health practitioner, pat-down search sexual abuse, sexual harassment, and transgender are among the new definitions. Additionally, relevant Sections of the Prison Rape Elimination Act's (PREA) (33 USC 303) federal rules (29 CFR 125) have been added. These provisions detail the guidelines the juvenile detention centers shall follow with respect to personnel matters including hiring, promotion and training; youth record keeping; medical assessment; placement of youth; grievances regarding sexual abuse and sexual harassment; searches of youth; and rules of conduct for youth while in the facility. Also, a Section for mental health services has been added allowing the juvenile detention centers to hire or contract with mental health providers. If needed once assessed, youth with significant mental health needs will have a service plan developed that will include counseling or psychotherapy, behavioral management strategies and goals, medication, protocol for monitoring progress and needed adjustments to normal detention programs and procedures. Juvenile detention centers shall also have a policy regarding suicide prevention and intervention. A Section for all grievances, other than those covered by PREA, has been added to allow youth the opportunity to file a grievance on matters such as damaged or lost personal property, staff conduct, handling of mail, dietary issues, medical or mental health treatment issues, requests for Americans with Disabilities Act accommodations, and disciplinary issues.

Other updates include clarifying that calls with attorneys are private and shall not be monitored. Juvenile detention centers, can, on a case-by-case basis, allow visits outside the normal visiting hours. Juvenile detention centers shall also prioritize family engagement when setting visitation regulations. Visitation has been increased to one hour from 30 minutes. Juvenile detention centers shall also provide an option for video conferencing. Another change clarifies at various times (following admission, after leaving the facility grounds, and after visits) youth may be strip searched only when there is individualized reasonable suspicion. Further, juvenile detention centers shall designate a qualified educational authority to provide educational services to youth. All programs shall meet all State and federal education standards. Teacher ratios shall be at least 1 teacher per every 12 general education students and 1 teacher for every 8 special education students. Juvenile detention centers shall file an annual plan no later than August 1 with the Department which shall include the number of anticipated school days, how the curriculum complies with State and federal standards, how class size will be limited and how credits will be calculated and awarded. No later than July 1 of each year, juvenile detention centers shall file with the Department an annual report that includes the number of students served, total number of days and teacher to student ratios served, total number of days and teacher to student ratios.

# **Section 2602.5 Definitions**

"Agency" means the unit of a State, local, corporate, or nonprofit authority, or of the Department of Justice, with direct responsibility for the operation of any facility that confines inmates, youth, or residents, including the implementation of policy as set by the governing, corporate, or nonprofit authority. (Section 115.5 of PREA). For the purposes of this Part, agency shall also mean each individual county detention center.

"Agency head" means the principal official of an agency. (Section 115.5 of PREA)

"Confinement/Room confinement" is the practice of isolating a youth in the youth's room for disciplinary reasons.

"Contractor" means a person who provides services on a recurring basis pursuant to a contractual agreement with the agency. (Section 115.5 of PREA)

"Corporal punishment" is any deliberate action to humiliate, demean, embarrass or cause physical pain or discomfort for the purpose of punishment.

"Delinquent minor" means any minor who, prior to the minor's 18th birthday, has violated or attempted to violate, regardless of where the act occurred, any federal or State law or municipal ordinance, except for status offenses.

"Department" means the Department of Juvenile Justice.

"Detention" means the temporary care of a minor who is alleged to be or adjudicated delinquent and who requires custody for the minor's own protection or the community's protection in a facility designed to physically restrict the minor's movements, pending disposition by the court or execution of an order of the court for placement or commitment. (Section 5-105 of the Juvenile Court Act)

#### NOTICE OF ADOPTED RULES

"Direct staff supervision" means that security staff are in the same room with, and within reasonable hearing distance of, the resident or youth. (Section 115.5 of PREA)

"Employee" means a person who works directly for the agency or facility. (Section 115.5 of PREA)

"Exigent circumstances" means any set of temporary and unforeseen circumstances that require immediate action in order to combat a threat to the security or institutional order of a facility. (Section 115.5 of PREA)

"Facility" means a place, institution, building (or part of the building), set of buildings, structure, or area (whether enclosing a building or set of buildings) that is used by an agency for the confinement of youth. (Section 115.5 of PREA)

"Facility head" means the principal official of a facility. (Section 115.5 of PREA)

"Full compliance" means compliance with all material requirements of each standard except for de minimis violations, or discrete and temporary violations during otherwise sustained periods of compliance. (Section 115.5 of PREA)

"Gender nonconforming" means a person whose appearance or manner does not conform to traditional societal gender expectations. (Section 115.5 of PREA)

"Intersex" means a person whose sexual or reproductive anatomy or chromosomal pattern does not seem to fit the typical binary expectations of male or female. Intersex medical conditions are sometimes referred to as disorders of sex development. (Section 115.5 of PREA)

"JMIS" means Juvenile Monitoring Information System.

"Juvenile Court Act" or "Juvenile Court Act of 1987" means 705 ILCS 405.

"Juvenile" means any person under the age of 18, unless under adult court supervision and confined or detained in a prison or jail. (Section 115.5 of PREA)

"Juvenile facility" means a facility primarily used for the confinement of juveniles pursuant to the juvenile justice system or criminal justice system. (Section 115.5 of PREA)

"Medical practitioner" means a health professional who, by virtue of education, credentials and experience, is permitted by law to evaluate and care for patients within the scope of the medical practitioner's professional practice. A "qualified medical practitioner" refers to a professional who has also successfully completed specialized training for treating sexual abuse victims. (Section 115.5 of PREA)

"Mental health practitioner" means a mental health professional who, by virtue of education, credentials, and experience, is permitted by law to evaluate and care for patients within the scope of the mental health practitioner's professional practice. A "qualified mental health practitioner" refers to a professional who has also successfully completed specialized training for treating sexual abuse victims. (Section 115.5 of PREA)

"Office of Detention and Audit Services" means the unit within the Department of Juvenile Justice that is authorized to monitor compliance with the County Juvenile Detention Standards.

"Pat-down search" means a running of the hands over the clothed body of a youth by an employee to determine whether the individual possesses contraband. (Section 115.5 of PREA)

"PREA" means the Prison Rape Elimination Act National Standards, 28 CFR 115 (July 1, 2019).

"Resident" means any person confined or detained in a juvenile facility or in a community confinement facility. (Section 115.5 of PREA)

"Security staff" means employees primarily responsible for the supervision and control of youth in housing units, recreational areas, dining areas, and other program areas of the facility.

"Sexual Abuse" means:

Sexual abuse of a youth by another youth; and

Sexual abuse of a youth by a staff member, contractor or volunteer.

Sexual abuse of a youth by another youth includes any of the following acts, if the victim does not consent, is coerced into the act by overt or implied threats of violence, or is unable to consent or refuse:

Contact between the penis and the vulva or the penis and the anus, including penetration, however slight;

Contact between the mouth and the penis, vulva or anus;

Penetration of the anal or genital opening of another person, however slight, by a hand, finger, object or other instrument; and

Any other intentional touching, either directly or through the clothing, of the genitalia, anus, groin, breast, inner thigh or the buttocks of another person, excluding contact incidental to a physical altercation.

Sexual abuse of a youth by a staff member, contractor or volunteer includes any of the following acts, with or without consent of the youth:

Contact between the penis and the vulva or the penis and the anus, including penetration, however slight;

Contact between the mouth and the penis, vulva or anus;

Contact between the mouth and any body part where the staff member, contractor or volunteer has the intent to abuse, arouse or gratify sexual desire;

Penetration of the anal or genital opening, however slight, by a hand, finger, object or other instrument, that is unrelated to official duties or where the staff member, contractor or volunteer has the intent to abuse, arouse, or gratify sexual desire;

Any other intentional contact, either directly or through the clothing, of or with the genitalia, anus, groin, breast, inner thigh, or the buttocks, that is unrelated to official duties or where the staff member, contractor or volunteer has the intent to abuse, arouse, or gratify sexual desire;

Any attempt, threat, or request by a staff member, contractor, or volunteer to engage in the activities described in this definition;

Any display by a staff member, contractor or volunteer of his or her uncovered genitalia, buttocks or breast in the presence of a youth; and

Voyeurism by a staff member, contractor, or volunteer.

Voyeurism by a staff member, contractor or volunteer means an invasion of privacy of a youth by staff for reasons unrelated to official duties, such as peering at a youth who is using a toilet in his or her cell to perform bodily functions; requiring a youth to expose his or her buttocks, genitals or breasts; or taking images of all or part of a youth's naked body or of a youth performing bodily functions. (Section 115.6 of PREA)

## "Sexual Harassment" means:

Repeated and unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, or verbal comments, gestures or actions of a derogatory or offensive sexual nature by one youth directed toward another; and

Repeated verbal comments or gestures of a sexual nature to a youth by a staff member, contractor or volunteer, including demeaning references to gender, sexually suggestive or derogatory comments about body or clothing, or obscene language or gestures. (Section 115.6 of PREA)

"Staff" means employees. (Section 115.5 of PREA)

"Status offense" means an offense that would not be criminal if committed by an adult, such as truancy, curfew violations, or running away from home.

"Strip search" means a search that requires a person to remove or arrange some or all clothing so as to permit a visual inspection of the person's breasts, buttocks or genitalia. (Section 115.5 of PREA)

"Substantiated allegation" means an allegation that was investigated and determined to have occurred. (Section 115.5 of PREA)

### NOTICE OF ADOPTED RULES

"Transgender" means a person whose gender identity (i.e., internal sense of feeling male or female) is different from the person's assigned sex at birth. (Section 115.5 of PREA).

"Unfounded allegation" means an allegation that was investigated and determined not to have occurred. (Section 115.5 of PREA)

"Unified Code of Corrections" means 730 ILCS 5.

"Unsubstantiated allegation" means an allegation that was investigated, and the investigation produced insufficient evidence to make a final determination as to whether the event occurred. (Section 115.5 of PREA)

"Volunteer" means an individual who donates time and effort on a recurring basis to enhance the activities and programs of the agency. (Section 115.5 of PREA)

"Youth" means any person detained in a lockup, regardless of adjudication status.

## **Section 2602.10 Detention Admission Policy**

- a) Statement of Admission Policy
  The Chief Judge or the Chief Judge's designee will define in writing the court's detention admission policies for each judicial circuit. Included in those policies shall be a current detention screening tool, directions for its use and circumstances for exceptions. The detention screening tool shall be reviewed at least annually to ensure efficacy.
  - 1) A qualified intake officer shall be appointed to screen court intake service referrals and control detention admissions. The chief judge shall identify those court services staff authorized to make detention decisions.
  - 2) Twenty-four hour intake coverage shall be provided. Authorized court personnel will be available at all times to make detention screening decisions.
  - 3) No youth shall be placed in detention without authorization by the judge or person appointed by the judge. However, a youth who has a valid warrant issued by the Department for violating the youth's terms of aftercare release, and is arrested based on that warrant, may be placed in

detention without prior authorization. A copy of the judicial order or completed detention screening tool shall be reviewed prior to admission and maintained in the youth's file.

- 4) The law enforcement officer requesting detention of a youth shall submit a detailed written report of the alleged charge.
- 5) Youth with serious medical or mental health needs, including severe intoxication, shall not be admitted unless examined and cleared for admission by qualified medical personnel.
- No youth shall be admitted to a detention facility when the admission will result in exceeding the operational capacity.
- 7) Youth shall not be placed in detention for status offenses.

# b) Detention Hearing

Unless sooner released, a minor alleged to be a delinquent minor taken into temporary custody must be brought before a judicial officer within 40 hours for a detention or shelter care hearing to determine whether he or she shall be further held in custody. If a minor alleged to be a delinquent minor taken into custody is hospitalized or is receiving treatment for a physical or mental condition, and is unable to be brought before a judicial officer for a detention or shelter care hearing, the 40 hour period will not commence until the minor is released from the hospital or place of treatment. If the minor gives false information to law enforcement officials regarding the minor's identity or age, the 40 hour period will not commence until the court rules that the minor is subject to the Act and not subject to prosecution under the Criminal Code of 1961 or the Criminal Code of 2012. Any other delay attributable to a minor alleged to be a delinquent minor who is taken into temporary custody shall act to toll the 40 hour time period. The 40 hour time period shall be tolled to allow counsel for the minor to prepare for the detention or shelter care hearing, upon a motion filed by such counsel and granted by the court. In all cases, the 40 hour time period is exclusive of Saturdays, Sundays and court-designated holidays. (Section 5-415 of the Juvenile Court Act)

1) A youth shall not be placed in detention for a period of more than 30 days as a disposition pursuant to Section 5-710(1)(a)(v) of the Juvenile Court Act, less any time previously spent in detention for the same offense.

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2) The use of detention pending completion of a trial must comply with Section 5-601 of the Juvenile Court Act.

## c) Situation Change

A youth shall be released from detention when a change in the situation that necessitated detention occurs and the need for secure custody is no longer justified.

## Section 2602.20 Administration

a) Detention Responsibility

The Chief Judge for the judicial circuit where the facility sits shall appoint a superintendent of detention with appropriate qualifications and experience. The superintendent shall have full responsibility and accountability for secure custody management.

b) Objectives

The purposes of supervision, guidance and treatment shall be clearly stated in writing and each staff member made fully aware of them.

c) Staff Training

The superintendent shall identify a staff person responsible for developing and implementing necessary training and ensuring that individual staff training requirements are met. All training hours and topics must be documented.

- 1) Pre-Service Training
  - Staff with direct contact with youth shall receive a minimum of 40 scheduled hours of training each year. This training shall include PREA training outlined in Section 2602.30(e). Prior to assuming responsibility for supervision of youth, all staff must complete a 40-hour orientation including but not limited to:
  - A) Facility mission and code of ethics;
  - B) Basic rights of incarcerated youth, including legal rights, grievance procedures and right to be free of retaliation for making a complaint;

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- C) Facility policies and procedures, particularly safety, security and fire and other emergency procedures; and
- D) Confidentiality
- 2) Continued Training
  In the first year of employment, all staff shall minimally receive an additional 80 hours of training including:
  - A) Adolescent development;
  - B) Crisis prevention and intervention;
  - C) Positive behavior management strategies;
  - D) Suicide prevention and intervention;
  - E) Working with special populations including LGBTQI+ youth, youth with intellectual or physical disabilities, youth with mental or physical health issues, and youth with limited English proficiency;
  - F) Prevention and management of infectious disease;
  - G) Gender responsive and culturally appropriate supervision strategies;
  - H) Science of behavior change and effective practice in juvenile justice;
  - I) The effects of trauma and trauma informed care; and
  - J) First aid, CPR, and use of AED equipment.
- 3) All staff will have a minimum of 40 hours of training annually.
- 4) All staff shall review this Part on an annual basis.
- d) Procedures

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Employees shall have access to a manual of policies and procedures either in a written or electronic format. Emergency procedures in event of a fire, riot, escape, bomb threat and natural disaster shall be part of the manual. Employees shall review policies on a yearly basis and document acknowledgement of their review. The superintendent shall designate a person to maintain documentation of employee review from year to year.

## e) Job Description

A comprehensive job description for each detention position shall be in writing and made available to each employee performing the functions described in the job description.

f) Staff Development

Access to up-to-date professional literature dealing with detention and related fields shall be maintained and accessible to staff.

### Section 2602.30 Personnel

a) Detention Staffing

Each detention facility must have sufficient personnel to provide adequate 24-hour supervision of youth seven days a week. A staffing plan or roster shall be maintained and reviewed daily by the superintendent or designee.

- 1) A superintendent, qualified by training and experience to supervise staff and youth, shall be appointed for each detention facility.
- 2) An assistant superintendent, qualified by training and experience to supervise staff and youth, shall be designated for a detention facility of 25 or more rated capacity.
- 3) A shift supervisor must be scheduled and available at all times and on duty during all waking hours and immediately available if not on duty during sleeping hours.
- 4) Direct care staff (detention officers) employed in sufficient numbers to ensure a ratio of 1:8 staff per youth during waking hours and 1:16 during sleeping hours. Staffing levels must anticipate the need for coverage for staff absence for leave and training.

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- 5) Supervision shall be conducted by a person of the same gender (transgender youth shall be allowed to choose the gender of the staff). At least one male and one female staff member shall be on duty when males and females are in custody.
- 6) No detention facility shall have fewer than three persons on duty per shift. On the midnight shift, two persons may be on duty and one on call. (See Section 2602.140(a)(1).)
- 7) An agency shall employ or designate an upper-level, agency-wide PREA coordinator with sufficient time and authority to develop, implement, and oversee agency efforts to comply with the PREA standards in all of its facilities.

## b) Staff Selection

A background screening shall be conducted which may include, among other factors, a criminal history check, Child Abuse and Neglect Tracking System, and Law Enforcement Agencies Data System. Staff selection criteria shall be based on education, training, and experience that demonstrate capacity to engage with youth and serve as a positive role model.

## c) Background Checks

All personnel working in the detention center, including contractual staff and volunteers, must complete a background check prior to employment and at least once every five years throughout employment.

- 1) The background check shall include criminal background investigation, a check of the child abuse registry, and an inquiry of prior institutional employers for information on any substantiated reports of abuse, sexual abuse, or sexual harassment.
- 2) Employment shall be denied or terminated if criminal convictions for any offense other than a minor traffic or petty offense, a finding of child abuse or neglect, inclusion on the sex offender registry, a current order of protection, or active warrants pending criminal charges. Exceptions to these exclusions may be recommended by the superintendent and approved in writing by the Chief Judge of the Circuit Court. Exceptions to these exclusions include, but is not limited to, when the employee or

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potential employee will be participating in a specific program or has a unique skill set that would be difficult to replicate.

- 3) The detention center policy shall require staff to disclose any subsequent conviction and identify disciplinary consequences for failure to do so.
- d) Hiring and Promotion Decisions PREA
  - 1) The agency shall not hire or promote anyone who may have contact with youth, and shall not enlist the services of any contractor who may have contact with youth, who has:
    - A) engaged in sexual abuse in a prison, jail, lockup, community confinement facility, juvenile facility or other institution (as defined in 42 USC 1997);
    - B) been convicted of engaging or attempting to engage in sexual activity in the community facilitated by force, overt or implied threats of force, or coercion or if the victim did not consent or was unable to consent or refuse; or
    - C) been civilly or administratively adjudicated to have engaged in the activity described in subsection (d)(1)(A).
  - 2) The agency shall consider any incidents of sexual harassment in determining whether to hire or promote anyone, or to enlist the services of any contractor, who may have contact with youth.
  - 3) Before hiring new employees who may have contact with youth, the agency shall:
    - A) Perform a criminal background records check;
    - B) Consult any child abuse registry maintained by the State or locality in which the employee would work; and
    - C) Consistent with federal, State, and local law, make its best efforts to contact all prior institutional employers for information on

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substantiated allegations of sexual abuse or any resignation during a pending investigation of an allegation of sexual abuse.

- 4) The agency shall also perform a criminal background records check, and consult applicable child abuse registries, before enlisting the services of any contractor who may have contact with youth.
- 5) The agency shall either conduct criminal background records checks at least every five years of current employees and contractors who may have contact with youth or have in place a system for otherwise capturing information for current employees.
- The agency shall also ask all applicants and employees who may have contact with youth directly about previous misconduct described in subsection (d)(1) in written applications or interviews for hiring or promotions and in any interviews or written self-evaluations conducted as part of reviews of current employees. The agency shall also impose upon employees a continuing affirmative duty to disclose any misconduct.
- 7) Material omissions regarding misconduct, or the provision of materially false information, shall be grounds for termination.
- 8) Unless prohibited by law, the agency shall provide information on substantiated allegations of sexual abuse or sexual harassment involving a former employee upon receiving a request from an institutional employer for whom the employee has applied to work. (See Section 317 of PREA.)

# e) PREA Training

- 1) The agency shall train all employees who may have contact with youth on:
  - A) Its zero-tolerance policy for sexual abuse and sexual harassment;
  - B) How to fulfill their responsibilities under agency sexual abuse and sexual harassment prevention, detection, reporting and response policies and procedures;
  - C) Youths' right to be free from sexual abuse and sexual harassment;

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- D) The right of youth and employees to be free from retaliation for reporting sexual abuse and sexual harassment;
- E) The dynamics of sexual abuse and sexual harassment in juvenile facilities:
- F) The common reactions of juvenile victims of sexual abuse and sexual harassment;
- G) How to detect and respond to signs of threatened and actual sexual abuse and how to distinguish between consensual sexual contact and sexual abuse between youth;
- H) How to avoid inappropriate relationships with youth;
- I) How to communicate effectively and professionally with youth, including lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, intersex, or gender nonconforming residents;
- J) How to comply with relevant laws related to mandatory reporting of sexual abuse to outside authorities; and
- K) Relevant laws regarding the applicable age of consent (See Section 331 of PREA.).
- Training shall be tailored to the unique needs and attributes of residents of juvenile facilities and to the gender of the youth at the employee's facility. The employee shall receive additional training if the employee is reassigned from a facility that houses only male youth to a facility that houses only female youth, or vice versa.
- The agency shall provide each employee with refresher training every two years to ensure that all employees know the agency's current sexual abuse and sexual harassment policies and procedures. In years in which an employee does not receive refresher training, the agency shall provide refresher information on current sexual abuse and sexual harassment policies.

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- 4) The agency shall document, through employee signature or electronic verification, that employees understand the training they have received. (See Section 331 of PREA.)
- f) Casework

Professional staff shall possess appropriate qualifications as required by law. Social workers shall be qualified in accordance with the Clinical Social Work and Social Work Practice Act [225 ILCS 20].

- g) Certificate, Licenses, Registration
  Duties that require possession of a current certificate, license or registration as
  evidence of special competence to perform those duties shall be licensed and
  certified by the Department of Financial and Professional Regulation.
- h) Disciplinary and Grievance Procedures
  Procedures regarding employee disciplinary matters and grievances shall be
  established and made known to all employees.
- i) Volunteer and Contractor Training PREA
  - 1) The agency shall ensure that all volunteers and contractors who have contact with youth have been trained on their responsibilities under the agency's sexual abuse and sexual harassment prevention, detection and response policies and procedures.
  - 2) The level and type of training provided to volunteers and contractors shall be based on the services they provide and level of contact they have with youth, but all volunteers and contractors who have contact with youth shall be notified of the agency's zero-tolerance policy regarding sexual abuse and sexual harassment and informed how to report incidents.
  - 3) The agency shall maintain documentation confirming that volunteers and contractors understand the training they have received. (See Section 332 of PREA.)

### Section 2602.40 Records

a) Personal Record Information

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A personal record file shall be established at admission and maintained for each youth throughout the period of confinement. Records shall include:

- 1) Name: 2) AKA and nicknames; 3) Address; 4) Age, date of birth and sex; 5) Parents, guardian or responsible person to notify in case of emergency, including address and telephone number; Physical description; 6) 7) Occupation; 8) Education level and name and address of school last attended; 9) Religion or religious affiliation; 10) Presenting offense; Date and time of police custody; 11) 12) Date and time of admission and authority; 13) Name and title of officers presenting and receiving youth, as well as law enforcement jurisdiction by name; 14) Name and telephone number of youth's attorney; 15) Dates of previous admission and releases;
- 16) Legal status (i.e., DCFS youth in care, adult transfer, aftercare release);
- Medical record of health and physical condition at admission; during 17) confinement, including treatment and medication administered; and

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condition at discharge. Medical records shall be kept separately, subject to court order:

- 18) Itemized record of youth's case, other valuables and monetary expenditures and receipts while in custody;
- 19) Date and time of court detention order;
- 20) Date of petition filing;
- 21) Date of adjudicatory and/or dispositional hearing, including continuances;
- Dates of temporary absences from detention facility, authority to be absent and destination;
- 23) Record of visitors' names and dates of visits;
- 24) Record of any incidents related to the youth including injury, misconduct and discipline administered;
- 25) Probation officer and/or aftercare Specialist;
- Date of release, including name of person and agency to whom released; and
- 27) Case number.
- b) Confidential Record

All personal record and police record information is confidential and shall not be disclosed to unauthorized persons or to the public, except by order of the court. Staff members shall be provided access to personal record and police record information as required for the performance of their duties.

- 1) Rights of and Limitations on Record Access
  - A) A youth, an authorized attorney, a parent or guardian, may inspect and copy all records contained in the youth's personal record, provided:

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- The youth consents in writing to the inspection and copying of records by an authorized attorney or a parent or guardian; and
- ii) That information not subject to inspection and copying may be deleted from records otherwise available to a youth or a parent or guardian.
- B) Authorized personnel of the Department may inspect and copy records.
- C) All requests by the youth, authorized attorneys, parents and guardians to copy or inspect file material shall be made in writing.
- 2) The facility shall comply with all written requests for records subject to inspection and copying within 15 days.
- c) Monthly Reports and Statistics
  - The superintendent shall report accurate information on all detained youth to JMIS. Required information for each youth includes initials, date of birth, race, ethnicity, admission and release dates and times, admitting offense, legal status, and hearing dates. JMIS information on youth in custody should be current and shall be updated no less than monthly. The superintendent shall maintain statistical records, available for review by DJJ, including: detention screening results, admissions, releases, releases with conditions, and overrides; unusual incidents by category; use of force, and use of room confinement. The superintendent shall submit to the Office of Detention and Audit Services monthly, an accurate report of the number of youth confined during the preceding month and provide information on each in the categories indicated on the report form provided by the Office. If JMIS is updated to require additional information the superintendent shall report that additional information.
  - 1) Monthly population reports must be submitted to the Office by the 10th day of the following month.
  - 2) Each calendar day, including day of admission and day of release, shall be counted for calculating length of stay.

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- 3) Duplicate copies shall be prepared. The reporting facility shall maintain the original and forward the duplicate to JMIS.
- d) Extraordinary or Unusual Occurrences
  - 1) Extraordinary or unusual occurrences shall mean:
    - A) Death, regardless of cause;
    - B) Attempted suicide;
    - C) Serious injury, to include accidental or self-inflicted;
    - D) Escape;
    - E) Attempted escape;
    - F) Fire;
    - G) Riot;
    - H) Battery on a staff member;
    - I) Battery on youth by a staff member;
    - J) Battery on youth by another youth (only if hospitalization or extensive medical treatment is required);
    - K) Allegations of sexual abuse and assaults PREA;
      - i) The agency shall require all staff to report immediately and according to agency policy any knowledge, suspicion or information they receive regarding an incident of sexual abuse or sexual harassment that occurred in a facility, whether it is part of the agency; retaliation against residents or staff who reported an incident; and any staff neglect or violation of responsibilities that may have contributed to an incident or retaliation.

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- ii) The agency shall also require all staff to comply with any applicable mandatory child abuse reporting laws.
- iii) Apart from reporting to designated supervisors or officials and designated State or local services agencies, staff shall be prohibited from revealing any information related to a sexual abuse report to anyone other than to the extent necessary, as specified in agency policy, to make treatment, investigation and other security and management decisions.
- iv) Medical and mental health practitioners shall:
  - be required to report sexual abuse to designated supervisors and officials pursuant to subsection (d)(2)(K)(i) as well as to the designated State or local services agency where required by mandatory reporting laws.
  - practitioners shall be required to inform residents at the initiation of services of their duty to report and the limitations of confidentiality.

# v) Reporting

- Upon receiving any allegation of sexual abuse, the facility head or designee shall promptly report the allegation to the appropriate agency office and to the alleged victim's parents or legal guardians, unless the facility has official documentation showing the parents or legal guardians should not be notified.
- If the alleged victim is under the guardianship of the Department of Children and Family Services, the report shall be made to the alleged victim's caseworker instead of the parents or legal guardians.
- If a juvenile court retains jurisdiction over the alleged victim, the facility head or designee shall

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also report the allegation to the juvenile's attorney or other legal representative of record within 14 days of receiving the allegation.

- vi) The facility shall report all allegations of sexual abuse and sexual harassment, including third-party and anonymous reports, to the facility's designated investigators; (See Section 361 of PREA.)
- L) Occurrence of serious infectious disease or illness within the facility; and
- M) Any injury, illness, mental health emergency or chronic condition that requires outside hospitalization.
- Notification shall be made whenever possible to the Office of Detention and Audit Services within 24 hours but in no case later than 72 hours. Notification to the Administrative Office of the Illinois Courts shall be made no later than 72 hours after the extraordinary or unusual circumstance. Timely notification of any extraordinary or unusual circumstance shall be made to the youth's parent's or guardian. If the youth is under the guardianship of the Department of Children and Family Services, the notification shall be made to the youth's caseworker. If a juvenile court retains jurisdiction over the youth, notification shall be made to the youth's attorney or other legal representative of record and the court of jurisdiction.

# e) Report to Court

A written report that summarizes the needs, personal and social problems, strengths and other pertinent findings as revealed in detention activities and services shall be forwarded to the probation officer and to the court upon request.

- f) Fingerprinting and Photographing
  A detention facility shall not transmit any fingerprint or photograph relating to a
  youth who has been arrested or taken into custody before the youth's 17th
  birthday, unless so authorized by the court in accordance with Section 1-7(B)(1)
  of the Juvenile Court Act.
- g) Daily Population Report

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A daily detention population report shall be supplied to the judge and the director of court services by the superintendent. The report shall include the name of each youth, day admitted, accumulated days of stay, assigned probation officer, date of adjudicatory hearing and any other information the judge might request to assist the control of admissions.

## h) Detention Over Thirty Days

Any youth who has been detained continuously, or in the aggregate for the same offense, for more than 30 days must be brought to the attention of the chief judge and presiding judge of the juvenile court having jurisdiction in the case, the youth's parent or guardian, and youth's legal representative by the facility head.

# i) Grievances

A log of all grievances shall be maintained. The log shall include the name of the youth, date the grievance was filed, nature of the grievance, the date of any appeal and the date the grievance was resolved.

## Section 2602.50 Admission Procedures

## a) Posting of Rights

A Notice of Rights, in Spanish and English, available from the Office of Detention and Audit Services, shall be conspicuously posted in all areas, other than detention rooms, where youth are held in custody.

## b) Legal Authority for Detention

The staff member accepting youth for detention must determine that each is being detained under proper legal authority, as provided by court order or written authorization from a court services staff member designated to screen detention referrals from law enforcement. Court services staff members, including juvenile probation officers, can screen a youth for detention referrals but cannot impose the sentence.

## c) Identity

Identity of the youth being admitted must be verified. A photograph of the youth shall be taken upon admission and kept as a part of the youth's personal record.

## d) Injuries

Any seriously injured, seriously ill, intoxicated or unconscious youth must not be admitted to the detention facility until a medical examination has been conducted

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by a licensed physician. A written record of diagnosis, treatment, and medication prescribed shall accompany the youth if detention admission is approved by the examining licensed physician.

## e) Parental Notification

Detention staff shall notify the parents, guardian or other legal custodian of the youth's admission within one hour after arrival. The date, time of the call and name of person contacted shall be recorded and included in the youth's personal record.

## f) Search

A thorough search of the youth's person shall be performed by a staff member to assure against the introduction of weapons, contraband or body pests. Following admission, a strip search may be administered only when there is individualized, reasonable suspicion.

- 1) The search shall be performed in an area that ensures privacy and dignity of the individual. The individual shall not be exposed to the view of others not specifically involved in the process;
- 2) Searches shall be conducted by a person of the same gender (transgender youth shall be allowed to choose the gender of the staff who will conduct the search);
- 3) All personal clothing shall be carefully searched for contraband; and
- 4) The probing of body cavities may not be done except where there is reasonable suspicion to believe that the youth is carrying contraband there, and searches may only be conducted by medically trained persons (e.g., physician, physician assistant, registered nurse, licensed practical nurse, paramedic) in a private location and under sanitary conditions.

## g) Personal Property

There shall be a written policy regarding personal property taken from youth. The policy shall ensure that:

1) Personal property taken from youth shall be listed and described in the presence of the youth and a receipt issued;

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- 2) The receipt must show the signatures of the admitting staff member and the youth, with the original filed in the youth's personal record file and the duplicate given to the youth;
- 3) All personal property of the youth shall be securely stored until release, discharge or transfer occurs, unless the youth approves, in writing, the release of the property to a designated person;
- 4) Personal property released to a third party must have the youth's signature approval and the signature receipt of the third party;
- 5) Contraband items, officially confiscated or disposed of, shall be shown on the inventory and the youth's signature shall be obtained along with the signature of the staff member;
- 6) Items of personal property subsequently added shall be recorded on the inventory and the youth's signature shall be obtained along with the signature of the staff member; and
- 7) Personal clothing shall be laundered or dry cleaned, as appropriate, before storage and made ready for a youth's court appearance, release or approved use during the detention period.

## h) Medical Screening

- 1) A medical screening shall be performed as part of the admission process either by a qualified medical professional or a staff member who has been trained by medical staff to perform initial screening. Screening shall document questions and responses related to:
  - A) Current physical, mental, and dental health status or complaints including gynecological issues or pregnancy;
  - B) Recent injuries or physical trauma;
  - C) Allergies or special health requirements including special diets;
  - D) Current sexually transmitted infections and symptoms of infectious or communicable diseases, including tuberculosis;

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- E) Recent drug or alcohol use and withdrawal symptoms;
- F) Current medications needed; and
- G) Names of current health care providers in the community.
- 2) The screener shall observe the youth for:
  - A) Signs of trauma or physical injuries;
  - B) Skin conditions including bruising, lesions, infestation, rash or needle marks;
  - C) Physical disabilities including mobility, hearing or vision problems; and
  - D) Signs of intellectual, developmental or learning disabilities.
- 3) Serious injuries or signs of trauma at admission shall be photographed in color.
  - A) The admitting staff member shall observe the youth for any obvious injuries or illnesses requiring immediate emergency medical care, rashes, unusual cough, high temperature, body pests and general mental status. The officer shall determine by questioning whether the youth has medical conditions such as dependence on drugs or alcohol, diabetes, epilepsy, past treatment for mental disorders or allergies; whether the youth is on medication; and if female, whether the youth is pregnant. The person performing the examination shall be trained to identify medical and mental problems.
  - B) The admitting staff member shall contact the parents, guardian or other responsible person, at the time of the first visit, to obtain the medical history of the youth, including current medication and Medicaid/insurance information. Current prescription medication shall be continued without interruption unless a qualified medical

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professional determines in consultation with the prescribing physician, youth, and family that continuation is not indicated.

- C) A mental health screening, including a complete evaluation of risk for suicide must be performed by a mental health practitioner or staff member who has been trained by a mental health practitioner.
- D) Any youth showing signs of or reporting physical or mental distress, drug or alcohol abuse shall be referred to health care personnel immediately.

## 4) PREA Assessment

- A) Within 72 hours after the youth's arrival at the facility and periodically throughout a youth's confinement, the agency shall obtain and use information about each youth's personal history and behavior to reduce the risk of sexual abuse by or upon a resident.
- B) Assessments shall be conducted using an objective screening instrument.
- C) At a minimum, the agency shall attempt to ascertain information about:
  - i) Prior sexual victimization or abusiveness;
  - ii) Any gender nonconforming appearance or manner or identification as lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender or intersex, and whether the youth may therefore be vulnerable to sexual abuse:
  - iii) Current charges and offense history;
  - iv) Age;
  - v) Level of emotional and cognitive development;
  - vi) Physical size and stature;

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- vii) Mental illness or mental disabilities;
- viii) Intellectual or developmental disabilities;
- ix) Physical disabilities;
- x) The youth's own perception of vulnerability; and
- xi) Any other specific information about individual youths that may indicate heightened needs for supervision, additional safety precautions, or separation from certain other residents.
- D) This information shall be ascertained through conversations with the youth during the intake process and medical and mental health screenings; during classification assessments; and by reviewing court records, case files, facility behavioral records and other relevant documentation from the youth's files.
- E) The agency shall implement appropriate controls on the dissemination within the facility of responses to questions asked pursuant to this standard in order to ensure that sensitive information is not exploited to the youth's detriment by staff or other residents. (See Section 341 of PREA.)
- i) Placement of Youth in Housing, Bed, Program, Education and Work Assignments PREA
  - 1) The agency shall use all information obtained pursuant to Section 341 of PREA and subsequently to make housing, bed, program, education and work assignments for youth with the goal of keeping all youth safe and free from sexual abuse.
  - 2) Youth may be isolated from others only as a last resort when less restrictive measures are inadequate to keep them and other residents safe, and then only until an alternative means of keeping all residents safe can be arranged. During any period of isolation, agencies shall not deny youth daily large-muscle exercise and any legally required educational

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programming or special education services. Youth in isolation shall receive daily visits from a medical or mental health care clinician. Youth shall also have access to other programs and work opportunities to the extent possible.

- 3) Lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender or intersex youth shall not be placed in particular housing, bed or other assignments solely on the basis of the identification or status, nor shall agencies consider lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender or intersex identification or status as an indicator of likelihood of being sexually abusive.
- 4) In deciding whether to assign a transgender or intersex resident to a facility for male or female residents, and in making other housing and programming assignments, the agency shall consider on a case-by-case basis whether a placement would ensure the youth's health and safety, and whether the placement would present management or security problems.
- 5) Placement and programming assignments for each transgender or intersex youth shall be reassessed at least twice each year to review any threats to safety experienced by the resident.
- 6) A transgender or intersex youth's own views with respect to their own safety shall be given serious consideration.
- 7) Transgender and intersex youth shall be given the opportunity to shower separately from other residents.
- 8) If a resident is isolated pursuant to subsection (i)(2), the facility shall clearly document:
  - A) The basis for the facility's concern for the youth' safety; and
  - B) The reason why no alternative means of separation can be arranged.
- 9) Every 30 days, the facility shall afford each resident described in subsection (i)(8) of this Section a review to determine whether there is a continuing need for separation from the general population. (See Section 342 of PREA.)

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# j) Medication

Any medication in the possession of a youth at admission shall be labeled for identification and withheld until a medical doctor determines the disposition. This determination shall be made at the earliest possible time, but in no instance shall it exceed eight hours after admission or within the time interval specified for administration of the medication on the prescription container, whichever is less.

## k) Personal Record Information

A record for each youth shall be established at admission and maintained throughout the period of detention in accordance with the records requirements set forth in Section 2602.40.

## 1) Showers

All youth must shower or bathe when admitted, unless otherwise advised by medical staff in individual cases.

## m) Factors for Placement

The youth shall be assigned to suitable quarters. (See Section 2602.70.)

## n) Items of Issue

Youth shall be issued clean bedding, towel, necessary clothing, soap, toothbrush and dentifrice. Youth shall also be issued clothing.

- Bedding shall consist of sheets, flame retardant mattress, blankets appropriate to the season of the year and a pillow. These items will be provided to a youth unless the youth has been placed on a mental health crisis status and the bedding poses a threat to the youth's safety as determined by a mental health professional.
- 2) The towel shall be cloth and of bath size.
- 3) Clothing, including shoes, shall be climate and weather appropriate. Clothing and other garments shall be of an appropriate size and in a state of good, usable condition. Clothing allotment shall be sufficient to allow youth to change clothes to sleep.

## o) Rules and Regulations

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A copy of the printed detention facility rules and regulations shall be given, explained and acknowledged by each youth at time of admission. Written documentation shall exist as to distribution, explanation and acknowledgement.

## p) Admission Isolation

A youth shall be placed in general population for regular programming immediately following admission.

## q) Orientation

An initial orientation shall be conducted by a detention staff member at time of admission. The orientation shall include:

- 1) Information pertaining to rising and retiring, meals, mail procedures, telephone privileges, visiting, correspondence, commissary, recreation and medical care;
- 2) Rules of conduct;
- 3) Disciplinary procedures and behavioral programming, including rewards and sanctions;
- 4) Information regarding programs (i.e., education, arts and crafts, counseling and all social services);
- 5) Procedures for making requests or entering complaints to staff members, judiciary or to Department personnel;
- 6) Orientation presentations shall be in written form and read to youth. Youth with limited English proficiency shall be given interpretive assistance.

## r) Reporting of Sexual Abuse – PREA

- The agency shall provide multiple internal ways for youth to privately report sexual abuse and sexual harassment, retaliation by other youth or staff for reporting sexual abuse and sexual harassment, and staff neglect or violation of responsibilities that may have contributed to the incidents.
- 2) The agency shall also provide at least one way for youth to report abuse or harassment to a public or private entity or office that is not part of the

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agency and that is able to receive and immediately forward resident reports of sexual abuse and sexual harassment to agency officials, allowing the resident to remain anonymous upon request. Youth detained pursuant to a judicial immigration warrant shall be provided information on how to contact relevant consular officials and relevant officials at the Department of Homeland Security.

- 3) Staff shall accept reports made verbally, in writing, anonymously and from third parties and shall promptly document any verbal reports.
- 4) The facility shall provide youth with access to tools necessary to make a written report.
- 5) The agency shall provide a method for staff to privately report sexual abuse and sexual harassment of youth. (See Section 351 of PREA.)
- 6) Exhaustion of Administrative Remedies.

  An agency shall be exempt from the standards of this subsection (r)(6) if it does not have administrative procedures to address youth grievances regarding sexual abuse because the youth may proceed directly to federal court. If an agency does have administrative procedures to address youth grievances regarding sexual abuse, then the agency's procedures must meet the requirements in this subsection (r)(6).

### A) Time Limits

- The agency shall not impose a time limit on when a youth may submit a grievance regarding an allegation of sexual abuse;
- ii) The agency may apply otherwise-applicable time limits on any portion of a grievance that does not allege an incident of sexual abuse;
- iii) The agency shall not require a youth to use any informal grievance process, or to otherwise attempt to resolve with staff, an alleged incident of sexual abuse; and

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iv) Nothing in this subsection(r)(6)(B) shall restrict the agency's ability to defend against a lawsuit filed by a youth on the ground that the applicable statute of limitations has expired.

## B) The agency shall ensure that:

- i) A youth who alleges sexual abuse may submit a grievance without submitting it to a staff member who is the subject of the complaint; and
- ii) The grievance is not referred to a staff member who is the subject of the complaint.

# C) Final Decision

- i) The agency shall issue a final agency decision on the merits of any portion of a grievance alleging sexual abuse within 90 days of the initial filing of the grievance;
- ii) Computation of the 90-day time period shall not include time consumed by residents in preparing any administrative appeal;
- iii) The agency may claim an extension of time to respond, of up to 70 days, if the normal time period for response is insufficient to make an appropriate decision. The agency shall notify the youth in writing of any extension and provide a date by which a decision will be made; and
- iv) At any level of the administrative process, including the final level, if the youth does not receive a response within the time allotted for reply, including any properly noticed extension, the youth may consider the absence of a response to be a denial at that level.

## D) Third Party Requests

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- Third parties, including fellow youth, staff members, family members, attorneys and outside advocates, shall be permitted to assist youth in filing requests for administrative remedies relating to allegations of sexual abuse, and shall also be permitted to file requests on behalf of youth;
- ii) If a third party, other than a parent or legal guardian, files a request on behalf of a youth, the facility may require as a condition of processing the request that the alleged victim agree to have the request filed on their behalf, and may also require the alleged victim to personally pursue any subsequent steps in the administrative remedy process;
- iii) If the youth declines to have the request processed on their behalf, the agency shall document the youth's decision;
- iv) A parent or legal guardian of a youth shall be allowed to file a grievance regarding allegations of sexual abuse, including appeals, on behalf of the youth. A grievance shall not be conditioned upon the youth agreeing to have the request filed on their behalf.

## E) Emergency Grievance

- i) The agency shall establish procedures for the filing of an emergency grievance alleging that a youth is subject to a substantial risk of imminent sexual abuse.
- ii) After receiving an emergency grievance alleging a youth is subject to a substantial risk of imminent sexual abuse, the agency: shall immediately forward the grievance (or any portion thereof that alleges the substantial risk of imminent sexual abuse) to a level of review that immediate corrective action may be taken, shall provide an initial response within 48 hours, and shall issue a final agency decision within 5 calendar days. The initial response and final agency decision shall document the agency's determination whether the youth is in substantial risk of imminent sexual

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abuse and the action taken in response to the emergency grievance.

- F) The agency may discipline a youth for filing a grievance related to alleged sexual abuse only where the agency demonstrates that the youth filed the grievance in bad faith. (See Section 352 of PREA.)
- G) The facility shall provide a youth with access to outside victim advocates for emotional support services related to sexual abuse, by providing, posting or otherwise making accessible mailing addresses and telephone numbers, including toll free hotline numbers where available, of local, State, or national victim advocacy or rape crisis organizations, and, for persons detained pursuant to a judicial immigration warrant, immigrant services agencies. The facility shall enable reasonable communication between a youth and these organizations and agencies, in as confidential a manner as possible.
- H) The facility shall inform the youth, prior to giving them access, of the extent that communications will be monitored and reports of abuse will be forwarded to authorities in accordance with mandatory reporting laws.
- The agency shall maintain or attempt to enter into memoranda of understanding or other agreements with community service providers that are able to provide a youth with confidential emotional support services related to sexual abuse. The agency shall maintain copies of agreements or documentation showing attempts to enter into such agreements.
- J) The facility shall also provide a youth with reasonable and confidential access to their attorneys or other legal representation and reasonable access to parents or legal guardians. (See Section 353 of PREA.)
- 7) The agency shall establish a method to receive third-party reports of sexual abuse and sexual harassment and shall distribute publicly information on how to report sexual abuse and sexual harassment on behalf of a youth. (See Section 354 of PREA.)

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## Section 2602.60 Release Procedures

### a) Introduction

- 1) The legal authority for release is the juvenile court judge or designated representative.
- 2) Detention staff shall be familiar with documentation required before a youth is permitted to leave the detention facility, whether for a temporary period or a final release.

## b) Minimum Standards

### 1) Identification

Positive photographical identification shall be made by a staff member before discharge, transfer or release of a youth. When a youth is discharged or released, a record shall be made of the date, time and legal authority. If the youth is released to the custody of another, the name of the person or agency shall also be recorded.

## 2) Physical Screening

Prior to final release or discharge, a notation shall be made in the record of any known injuries, wounds, bruises or health problems.

## 3) Personal Property

All personal property and funds, other than those legally confiscated, inventoried at the time of admission or added during the time of detention and not transferred to a third party or expended during detention shall be returned to the youth.

- A) Property returned to the youth shall be carefully inventoried, on an itemized receipt created by the facility, and signed by the releasing staff member and the youth.
- B) A copy of the itemized and signed receipt shall be maintained by the detention facility as a permanent record.

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- C) Personal property of youth being transferred to another agency shall be inventoried on an itemized receipt and documentation shall be turned over to the transporting officer in the presence of the youth. A copy of the receipt shall contain the signature of the transporting officer and be made a part of the youth's personal record. Only personal property allowed by the receiving facility shall be transferred with the youth. Items not transferred shall be disposed of by the transferring facility in accordance with its written policy, (e.g., having a parent or guardian pick up items, mailing items to a person designated by youth).
- 4) Transfers to Illinois Department of Juvenile Justice
  Pursuant to Sections 3-8-1, 3-10-1 and 5-4-1 of the Unified Code of
  Corrections and Section 5-901 of the Juvenile Court Act of 1987, when a
  youth is delivered to the custody of the Department, items that include the
  following information must accompany the youth:
  - A) The sentencing order and copies of committing petition;
  - B) *All reports*;
  - C) Any statement by the court on the basis for imposing the sentence;
  - D) *Any sex offender evaluations*;
  - E) Any risk assessment or substance abuse treatment eligibility screening and assessment of the youth by an agent designated by the State to provide assessment services for the courts;
  - F) The number of days, if any, which the youth has been in custody and for which the youth is entitled to credit against the sentence;
  - G) Any medical or mental health records or summaries of the minor;
  - H) The municipality where the arrest of the youth occurred, the commission of the offense occurred, and the youth resided at the time of commission;

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- I) A report detailing the youth's criminal history in a manner and form prescribed by the Department; and
- J) All additional matters which the court directs the clerk to transmit. (Section 5-750(5) of the Juvenile Court Act)

# Section 2602.70 Housing

- a) The facility shall have written policy related to the placement of youth in housing units. The policy shall consider factors including:
  - 1) Age;
  - 2) Gender;
  - 3) History of violent behavior;
  - 4) Level of emotional and cognitive development;
  - 5) Physical size and ability;
  - 6) Intellectual or developmental disability;
  - 7) Mental health needs or history of trauma;
  - 8) Suicide risk; and
  - 9) Indications of vulnerability or need for separation from other youth.
- b) Detention Rooms

In order to ensure reasonable security, sanitation and personal comfort, detention rooms shall be designated for single occupancy and provide at least 80 square feet of floor space.

1) Detention Room Equipment Each room shall be equipped with the following:

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- A) A bed that shall be affixed to the floor of the room. Mattresses with fire retardant treated cotton filling with a flame retardant, waterproofed, and cotton cover are required;
- B) A washbasin with piped hot and cold water. A supply of disposable drinking cups shall be provided if the washbasin is not drinking fountain equipped;
- C) A toilet; and
- D) A tamperproof light fixture to ensure a comfortable reading level.
- 2) Detention Room Level
  Detention rooms shall be located above ground level.
- c) Living Area

A living area containing no less than 30 square feet per youth must be provided in conjunction with each cluster of detention rooms.

- 1) Each living area shall be equipped with tables and chairs. Seating shall be provided for each youth.
- 2) Music and television equipment shall be provided.
- 3) A cold water drinking fountain shall be provided.
- 4) Shower areas shall be adjacent to sleeping areas. A minimum of one shower head for every six occupants shall be provided. Water for showers shall be thermostatically regulated to between 100 and 120 degrees Fahrenheit.
- d) Dangerous Items

Items adaptable for use as a weapon (i.e., plumbing, conduit, heating equipment, etc.) shall not be accessible to youth.

e) Viewing Devices

There shall be no viewing devices (e.g., peep holes, one-way vision mirrors) that youth are not aware of.

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- f) Ventilation
  The facility shall be comfortably heated and cooled according to the season.
- g) Compliance
  Those non-compliances relating to physical conditions that adversely affect the treatment of youth with respect to their health and safety may be considered for further action under Section 3-15-2(b) of the Unified Code of Corrections.
- h) Variances

Variances connected with physical requirements may be granted by the Director of the Department for existing facilities. Variance expiration dates will be determined at the time granted. Variance requests of an administrative nature will not be granted. In determining whether to grant a variance, the Department will consider, among other factors, the nature of the standard, previous noncompliance, the cost, the population, the alternative means of complying with the intent of the standard, the consequences if the variance is not granted, and the safety and security of the facility or individuals.

- The variance request must be in writing and pertain to a specific standard. The request must describe the reasons for the variance; the period of time for the variance; any hardship the facility might experience by complying with the standard; plans to be implemented to eventually comply with the particular standard; and a statement that the variance would not adversely affect the health and safety of youth or security of the facility.
- 2) The approval or denial of a variance request will be returned by letter to the requesting governmental agency.
- The Director of the Department may grant a renewal of the variance provided documentation is received from the governing body that indicates a good faith effort on their part to effect necessary actions to comply with the standard in question.
- 4) A permanent variance, depending on the circumstances, may be granted.

### Section 2602.80 Medical and Health Care

a) Medical and Health Services

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All facilities shall employ a competent medical doctor, physician assistant, nurse practitioner, or registered nurse to ensure that the following are available:

- 1) Protocol for youth to report illnesses and injuries.
- 2) Treatment of ailments.
- 3) Prescription and administration of medications and special diets.
- 4) Arrangements for hospitalization.
- 5) Liaison with community medical facilities and resources, including providers for emergency medical care.
- 6) Environmental health inspections and procedures.
- 7) Supervision of special treatment programs, as for drug addicts, alcoholics, etc.
- 8) Maintenance of accurate medical records for each youth.
- 9) Maintenance of detailed records log of medical supplies, particularly of narcotics, barbiturates, amphetamines, and other dangerous drugs.
- 10) Vaccinations.
- b) Physician and Dental Services

A medical doctor shall be available to attend the medical needs of youth. Arrangements shall be made for a dentist to provide emergency dental care.

- 1) General medical physician services shall be provided in accordance with one or more of the following procedures:
  - A) On salary, in accordance with locally established personnel pay plan;
  - B) A contract with a local physician or clinic for full-time coverage at specific hours and for emergencies;

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- C) A contract with a local physician to conduct sick call, to be on call for emergencies and to examine newly admitted youth;
- D) Arrangements with a nearby hospital to provide all needed medical services: and
- E) Services rendered, without cost, by another agency or department or with costs prorated.
- 2) Access to psychiatric and/or psychological services shall be provided in individual cases as needed.
- c) Medical Examination Room

A medical examining room shall be located close to or be part of the admissions area.

d) Medical Examination

All youth admitted to detention shall undergo a physical examination as prescribed in Section 2602.50(h).

- 1) Newly admitted youth suspected of having any type of communicable disease shall be isolated and an immediate referral shall be made to the facility physician for possible transfer to a medical facility, unless the admitting facility can safely and effectively segregate and maintain a medically prescribed course of treatment.
- 2) All youth confined for more than seven days shall be given a medical screening by a medical doctor, registered nurse or physician assistant.
- e) Sick Call

A schedule and procedure shall be established for daily sick call.

- 1) The names of youth reporting to sick call shall be recorded in the medical log.
- 2) Youth with emergency complaints shall receive attention as quickly as possible, regardless of the sick call schedule.

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3) Nonmedical detention staff may issue any form of over-the-counter medication, providing the facility physician gives prior written approval to the facility for the issue.

# f) Record or Log

A record shall be maintained as part of the youth's personal file of all treatment (including special diet) and medication prescribed, including the date and hour the treatment and medication is administered. A record shall be maintained of over-the-counter medication (i.e., aspirin, cough medicine, etc.) issued by detention staff. A youth's treatment and medication program shall be a part of the summary to the probation officer.

# g) Medical Security

Security of supplies must be maintained at all times.

- 1) When a physician or other medical personnel attends patients at the facility, a staff member shall be present to assure an orderly process.
- 2) Drugs, including over-the-counter medication and other abusable medical supplies, shall be secured and accessible only to designated staff.
- 3) Youth shall receive one dose of medication at a time and shall be required to ingest medication in the presence of a medical staff member or detention staff member.

### h) First Aid Training

One person on duty, per shift, shall have basic first aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) training.

# i) First Aid Supplies

Those facilities not having a dispensary shall maintain a stock of first aid supplies for the treatment of cuts, bruises, sprains and other minor injuries. First aid supplies must be secured and not accessible to youth.

## j) Parental Notification

Recommendations of the facility physician shall be reported to parents or guardians, in writing, through the probation officer. Parents or guardians, the probation officer, and the court shall be immediately notified of a youth's serious illness or accident.

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## k) Recommendations

- 1) Medication to be ingested should, whenever possible, be in liquid form.
- 2) Conditions requiring immediate attention by a physician include, but are not limited to: head injuries, coma, broken bones, open wounds, history of diabetes, epilepsy, tuberculosis, venereal disease, fever or bleeding.
- 3) The Department of Public Health may be requested to assist detention facilities by:
  - A) Providing immunizations;
  - B) Investigating epidemics, contagious diseases, food poisoning and providing environmental inspections; and
  - C) Providing health education literature, lectures and staff in-service training consultation.
- 4) The Department of Human Services may be requested to assist detention facilities. Since youth may be emotionally disturbed, pre-psychotic, or psychotic but in a temporary state of remission, the Department of Human Services may provide:
  - A) Mental health staff members for detention facilities;
  - B) Hospitalization of psychotic youth;
  - C) In-patient and out-patient treatment of discharged youth;
  - D) Mental health education; and
  - E) Diagnostic examinations for reports and commitments.
- 5) Existing facilities should provide a private area for a medical examining room.

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- 6) Detention personnel should receive instruction for emergency care of epileptics during seizures. Specialized care for epileptics will be determined by the detention physician.
- 7) Diabetics and epileptics should be closely supervised as they may fail to follow their diet, react to an overdose of medication or, conversely, ignore necessary medication. Diabetics and epileptics should be regularly seen by the facility physician.

## Section 2602.90 Mental Health Services

- a) All facilities shall employ or contract with qualified mental health professionals to address the needs of youth identified in the mental health screening, as well as needs that arise during the period of confinement. Services shall meet or exceed the community level of care.
- b) Youth with significant mental health needs shall be assessed by a qualified mental health professional. A service plan shall be developed for each youth that includes:
  - 1) Counseling or psychotherapy to be provided;
  - 2) Behavioral management strategies and goals;
  - 3) Medication;
  - 4) Protocol for monitoring youth's progress; and
  - 5) Needed adjustments to normal detention programs and procedures.
- c) The facility shall provide appropriate services to youth with serious mental illnesses (e.g., bi-polar disorder, psychosis, severe depression) including psychiatric evaluation and care, as well as prescribing and monitoring psychotropic medication.
- d) Suicide Prevention/Intervention
  - The facility shall have policies and procedures in place to identify youth who are at risk of suicide and develop individualized emergency intervention plans in concert with a qualified mental health professional.

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- 1) Youth who are considered actively suicidal must be under constant supervision or transferred to a mental health facility.
- 2) Youth who are at risk of self-harm shall be encouraged to participate in programming.
- 3) Youth at risk of self-harm shall not be clothed or housed in degrading or uncomfortable garments or environments or left naked.
- 4) Rescue tools shall be available and easily accessible to staff on all living units.

# Section 2602.100 Clothing, Personal Hygiene, Grooming

a) Laundry

Mechanical washing, drying equipment and cleaning agents must be provided when youth are required to supply and wear personal clothing.

- 1) If youth are required to wash and dry their personal clothing, a staff member shall supervise and instruct youth in the proper use of cleaning aids during the washing process.
- 2) When clothing is provided by the facility, clean clothing shall be issued at least three times weekly.
- 3) Youth shall be provided with clean underclothing and socks daily.
- b) Grooming and Personal Hygiene
  - 1) Hair combs and hair brushes shall be furnished to each youth upon admission.
  - 2) Opportunities to shower shall be provided daily except as amended by medical advice in individual cases. Facilities shall provide shampoo and soap without cost to youth.
  - 3) Youth shall not be required to shave.

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- A) However, youth shall be permitted to shave as often as desired. Shaving equipment shall be made available.
- B) There shall be no standard hair length or style required.
- C) Sideburns, mustaches and beards are acceptable.
- 4) Female youth shall be provided articles for feminine hygiene as requested by youth without limit or cost.

### Section 2602.110 Food Services

- Meal and Food Service
   Detention facilities shall provide meals and food service that conform to the following:
  - 1) Food must be of sufficient nutritional value with a balance of fruits and vegetables and provide a daily minimum of 2,500-3,000 calories. Food shall not be used as a reward or withheld as a disciplinary measure.
  - 2) Meals shall be provided at reasonable and proper intervals (i.e., adhering to recognized breakfast, lunch, and dinner schedules). No more than 14 hours shall elapse between the serving of evening and breakfast meals, if no bed snack is allowed.
  - Three complete and balanced meals shall be served to each youth for each 24 hours of detention.
  - 4) A drink, in addition to water, shall be available with each meal and milk shall be available for at least two meals during each 24 hours of detention.
  - 5) Special diets shall be adhered to when prescribed by a physician.
  - 6) The superintendent may elect to provide meals and food service by one or more of the following methods:
    - A) Contract for catered food service.

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- B) Provide frozen or otherwise pre-prepared meals that have been processed by the procedure required to produce a condition suitable for consumption.
- C) Food preparation and service in an on-site kitchen with food service staff who are employees of the facility.
- 7) At least one full-time cook or the food service provider shall have food services sanitation manager certification from the Illinois Department of Public Health.
- 8) Meals shall be served and conducted in a group setting except when prohibited by security or medical needs.
- 9) Divided or compartmented trays shall be used for full meal service. Food trays, dishes and eating utensils shall be removed from the dining room soon after the meal is finished and returned to the kitchen for proper washing and sterilizing or disposal.
- 10) Ranges, stoves and ovens shall be equipped with an accurate thermostat or temperature gauge.
- A mechanical dishwasher, meeting Illinois Department of Public Health standards (77 Ill. Adm. Code 750) is preferred, but in its absence:
  - A) A three-compartment stainless steel sink with drainboard is required: one compartment for washing, 110 degrees Fahrenheit water containing adequate soap or detergent; one compartment for rinsing; and one compartment for sterilization, with the water temperature no less than 170 degrees Fahrenheit or sterilization using a sanitizing agent.
  - B) Dishes, trays and eating utensils shall be drain dried and not wiped dry.
- Dry stores such as flour, cereal, dried beans, peas, coffee and canned goods shall be stored in a cool, dry and well-ventilated area, screened or otherwise protected against insects and rodents.

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- A) Containers used to store dry bulk quantities shall be lined with or have the interior coated with an acceptable impervious substance or plastic.
- B) Fresh fruits, vegetables, dairy products, meats and frozen food shall be refrigerated in accordance with Illinois Department of Public Health standards. All refrigerators and freezers shall be equipped with an accurate thermometer. Frozen food shall be kept at or below 0 degrees Fahrenheit. All perishable foods shall be stored at such temperature as will protect against spoilage (no higher than 45 degrees Fahrenheit).
- b) Method of Providing Food Service Food preparation sources must meet the conditions and requirements, including licensing requirements, established by the Illinois Department of Public Health (77 Ill. Adm. Code 750).
- c) Menus Menus shall be preplanned and copies of the menu served shall be maintained for three months. The menu shall be diversified so as to avoid the monotony of a standardized diet.
- d) Staff Meals
  Staff members shall be served meals no different in quality, quantity or menu than that served to youth.

### Section 2602.120 Sanitation

- a) General Requirements
  A cleaning schedule shall be established.
  - 1) Floors shall be swept and mopped at least once daily.
  - 2) Windows shall be clean.
  - 3) Insect screens shall be installed in windows, when appropriate, for protection from flying insects.

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- 4) Ventilation must be sufficient to admit fresh air and remove disagreeable odors.
- 5) Forced air or other form of artificial ventilation in the living area shall provide 60 cubic feet per minute of air exchange per person.
- 6) Walls shall be kept clear of etched or inscribed drawings or writing.
- 7) Walkways and corridors shall be free of litter and trash.
- 8) Mops and other cleaning tools and implements shall be thoroughly cleaned and dried after each use and securely stored in a well-ventilated place.
- 9) All youth cleaning details shall be under the supervision of a staff member.

# b) Facility Equipment

Quarters equipment (e.g., toilets, washbasins, shower stalls and sinks) shall be thoroughly cleaned each day.

- 1) All trash and garbage containers shall be equipped with tight-fitting covers.
- 2) Trash and garbage shall be removed at least daily and disposed of in a sanitary manner.
- c) Facility Drinking Equipment

A drinking fountain shall be provided in the indoor recreational area and accessible to any outdoor recreational area.

### d) Facility Supplies

An adequate supply of clean clothing, bedding, towels, soap and cleaning supplies shall be maintained.

- 1) Sheets and mattress covers shall be changed and washed at least once a week.
- 2) Vinyl-covered mattresses must be washed with hot water, detergent and disinfectant monthly or before reissue.

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- 3) Blankets shall be laundered, or otherwise sterilized, monthly or before reissue.
- 4) Cotton or fiber-filled mattresses or pads shall be aired and spray-sanitized monthly or before reissue.
- 5) A clean towel shall be issued to each youth at least three times weekly.
- 6) Shaving and barber tools shall be thoroughly cleaned by the user, returned to a staff member, and secured.

# e) Facility Food Service

The floors of all rooms in which food or drink is stored, prepared, served or in which utensils are washed, shall be kept clean.

- 1) All counters, shelves, tables, equipment, and utensils with which food or drink come in contact shall be maintained in good repair and free of corrosion, cracks and chipped or pitted surfaces.
- 2) Utensils shall be stored in a clean, dry place protected (covered or inverted) from flies, dust, overhead leakage and condensation.
- 3) Plumbing shall be in good working order.
- 4) The range cooking surface shall be scraped daily. Hoods, vents and filters shall be cleaned regularly.
- 5) All windows, walls, and woodwork shall be kept clean.

### f) Body Pests

Frequent inspection of living areas shall be made to aid in control of body pests. Immediate extermination measures shall be taken when body pest infestation occurs, including spraying or fumigation of bedding, clothing, equipment and all areas of the building supportive to existence and reproduction of the pests.

## g) Pest and Vermin Control

A continuous and effective program of insect and rodent control and extermination shall be established.

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# Section 2602.130 Supervision

- a) Shift Coverage
  - There must be sufficient staff members to ensure a ratio of 1:8 staff per youth during waking hours and 1:16 during sleeping hours present in the detention area, awake and alert at all times, to provide supervision while youth are in custody.
  - 1) No detention facility shall have fewer than three persons on duty, except two staff persons may be on duty and one on call when only male or female youth are detained (e.g., when there are no female youth in detention, a female staff member must be on immediate call and when there are no male youth in detention a male staff member must be on immediate call.) On the midnight shift, two persons may be on duty and one on call.
  - 2) Staff members shall maintain a record of visual contact with each youth no less than once every 30 minutes; however, visual contact for youth on crisis status shall be made at least once every 10 minutes. Crisis status is a determination made by a mental health professional or other designated staff member to provide for the safety of a youth experiencing crisis, including the designation of a crisis level and implementation of an individualized Crisis Care Plan. Entries shall show the time of checks by the staff member, signature and any relevant remarks.
  - 3) Supervision of youth shall be constant. Responsibility for supervision of youth remains with staff members. Non-staff persons, such as volunteers, should provide only that supervision necessary to direct or to perform the specific activity for which they are present.
  - 4) Under the following conditions, except in extreme circumstances, supervision shall be provided by a person of the same gender:
    - A) When procedures require physical contact or examination, such as strip searches; and
    - B) During periods of personal hygiene activities and care such as showers, toileting and related activities.

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5) The standard in subsection (a)(4) does not prohibit the use of necessary force by a staff member of a sex other than that of a youth.

## b) Log Record

A shift log shall be maintained as a record of incidents and activities, including supervisory checks, occurring on the shift.

## c) Peer Supervision

No youth shall be allowed to have authority or disciplinary control over another youth.

## d) Night Hours

Designated lights-out time shall be determined by administrative policy but shall not be set earlier than 10 p.m.

## e) Public View

To the extent possible, detained youth shall be protected from observation that reveals their individual identity.

## f) Detention Room Observation Windows

Each detention room door shall be provided with an observation window of at least 60 square inches, with the smaller dimension no less than 5 inches wide, to provide visual supervision of the room. All glass shall be wire reinforced, heavy safety-type or high tempered, measuring at least one-fourth inch thick.

## Section 2602.140 Security

# a) Searches

Youth permitted to leave the facility grounds temporarily, for any reason, shall be thoroughly searched prior to leaving and before reentering. A strip search may be administered only when there is individualized, reasonable suspicion.

## b) Training

Staff members and other personnel assigned to detention duties must be trained in security measures and handling of special incidents such as assault, disturbance, fire and natural disasters.

# c) Detention Security

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Staff members must exercise and control security measures and shall not permit youth assistance.

- 1) All detention locks and doors shall be regularly and frequently inspected to ensure their proper working order and to detect escape efforts.
- 2) Living unit doors opening into a corridor shall be kept locked except when necessary to permit entry or exit.
- 3) Detention rooms and storage rooms shall be kept locked at all times when not in use.
- d) Light Switches

Electric light switches shall be in the corridor. Light switches shall be key operated.

e) Detention Windows

All glass shall be wire reinforced, heavy safety type or high tempered, measuring at least one-fourth inch thick. All detention windows that can be opened shall be covered with stainless-steel mesh detention screen with minimum 800 psi (12 strands per inch) and spring mounted with lock controlled frame mounted flush with the inside wall.

- f) Room Searches
  - Frequent but irregularly scheduled searches of youth and their quarters shall be made to detect the presence of weapons and other contraband and should be orderly and with recognition of the youth's rights. Room searches should be conducted with the youth observing the procedure, whenever possible.
- g) Body Searches and Viewing PREA
  - 1) The facility shall not conduct cross-gender strip searches or cross-gender visual body cavity searches (e.g., a search of the anal or genital opening) except in exigent circumstances or when performed by medical practitioners.
  - 2) The agency shall not conduct cross-gender pat-down searches except in exigent circumstances.

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- 3) The facility shall document and justify all cross-gender strip searches, cross-gender visual body cavity searches and cross-gender pat-down searches.
- 4) The facility shall implement policies and procedures that enable youth to shower, perform bodily functions and change clothing without nonmedical staff of the opposite gender viewing their breasts, buttocks or genitalia, except in exigent circumstances or when the viewing is incidental to routine cell checks. Policies and procedures shall require staff of the opposite gender to announce their presence when entering a resident housing unit. In facilities (such as group homes) that do not contain discrete housing units, staff of the opposite gender shall be required to announce their presence when entering an area where residents are likely to be showering, performing bodily functions or changing clothing.
- 5) The facility shall not search or physically examine a transgender or intersex youth for the sole purpose of determining the youth's genital status. If the youth's genital status is unknown, it may be determined during conversations with the youth, by reviewing medical records, or, if necessary, by learning that information as part of a broader medical examination conducted in private by a medical practitioner.
- 6) The agency shall train security staff in how to conduct cross-gender patdown searches, and searches of transgender and intersex youth, in a professional and respectful manner, and in the least intrusive manner possible, consistent with security needs. (See Section 315 of PREA.)

# h) Makeshift Weapons

After use, tools and equipment shall be accounted for by the staff member on duty and returned to their proper storage space.

- 1) Eating utensils shall be accounted for after each meal and returned to the kitchen.
- 2) Kitchen cutlery (i.e., paring knives, butcher knives, etc.) shall be listed and inventoried daily.
- 3) Tools and equipment shall be listed and inventoried after each use.

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### i) Maintenance

Any damaged or nonfunctioning security equipment must be promptly repaired. When it is necessary for outside maintenance to work in a detention living area, all youth shall be removed from the area and the living area carefully searched before youth are readmitted. Maintenance tools shall be carefully checked into and out of the detention area.

## j) Access to Records by Youth

No youth shall be assigned work that requires access to personal records of youth currently or previously in detention nor to staff personnel records.

### k) Population Count

A master population or locator board shall be established and maintained at the control center indicating the various group living areas and housing assignments. A head count shall be made and recorded at least four times daily, including counts taken at change of shift and night lockup.

## 1) Key Control

Detention keys shall be stored in a secure key locker when not in use. There shall be at least one full set of detention keys, separate from those in use, stored in a safe place accessible only to staff members for use in an emergency. An inventory of all keys shall be made at the beginning of each shift. Youth shall not be permitted to handle, use or have detention keys of any type in their possession.

# m) Firearms and Other Weapons

No person, including law enforcement personnel, shall be permitted to enter any section of the detention area with a gun or other weapon. Weapons shall be stored in a secure and locked drawer, cabinet or container outside the security area.

# n) Emergency Power Source

An emergency electrical power source shall be available in the event of a power failure.

## Section 2602.150 Safety

# a) Fire Protection

The following procedures shall be followed to ensure safeguards against fire:

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- 1) Extinguishers shall be readily accessible to staff members, but not to youth. The local fire department shall be contacted regarding the location, type and number of fire extinguishers.
- 2) Extinguishers shall be examined not less than once each year and tagged with the date of inspection and initials of the inspector.
- 3) All staff members shall be familiar with the characteristics and operation of all types of extinguishers in the facility.
- 4) Fire drills for staff personnel shall be conducted quarterly on each shift.
- 5) A fire alarm system which includes smoke and carbon monoxide detectors shall be installed, maintained in good condition and inspected at least yearly by the local fire department. Date of inspection shall be recorded.

# b) Emergency Exits

Emergency exit doors shall be clearly indicated with at least 4½ inch block lettering stating "EXIT" in all capital letters; their location shall be made known to all staff members; and the keys for the doors shall be immediately available to staff members. There shall be two exits from each floor of detention.

# c) Horseplay

Youth shall be prohibited from engaging in wrestling, horseplay or any activity that could cause injury. Employees shall not engage in wrestling or other horseplay.

### d) Safety Orientation

Youth who volunteer and are assigned to vocational-type tasks shall be given a safety orientation prior to participation and shall be supervised while performing the task.

### e) Combustible Materials

Combustible materials such as drapes, curtains and rugs shall be of flameproof material. Paint shall be flame retardant.

### Section 2602.160 Grievances

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This Section shall apply to all grievances except for grievances regarding sexual misconduct outlined in Section 2206.170(d).

- a) Prior to submitting a grievance, all youth are encouraged to discuss the matter with a supervising staff member. All supervising staff members shall take reasonable steps to resolve youth issues whenever possible.
- b) Youth may file a grievance for any issue. Examples of common issues for youth grievances include, but are not limited to, the following:
  - 1) Damaged or lost personal property;
  - 2) Staff conduct;
  - 3) Handling of mail;
  - 4) Dietary issues;
  - 5) Medical or mental health treatment issues;
  - 6) Requests for Americans with Disabilities Act (42 USC 12101) accommodation; and
  - 7) Disciplinary issues.
- c) Youth grievances must be submitted in writing. Copies of grievance forms shall be available for youth to use, and the youth may keep a copy for the youth's records. Grievances may be submitted to the designated detention officer by hand or by depositing the grievance form in the locked grievance box.
- d) A grievance shall be filed within five calendar days after the discovery of the incident, occurrence, or problem that gives rise to the grievance. However, if a youth can demonstrate that a grievance was not timely filed for good cause, the grievance shall be considered.
- e) Youth may submit emergency grievances through this process but shall be encouraged to immediately report issues posing a substantial risk of imminent personal injury or other serious or irreparable harm to supervising staff members. Supervising staff members shall contact the superintendent or the superintendent's

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designee for prompt resolution of emergency issues posing a substantial risk of imminent personal injury or other serious or irreparable harm. Youth shall be instructed to note on the grievance form if it is submitted as an emergency.

- f) The designated detention administrator shall respond to all submitted emergency youth grievances as follows:
  - 1) Conduct an initial review of facts to determine whether circumstances indicate an emergency.
  - 2) Note on the grievance form when circumstances indicate an emergency and immediately forward to the superintendent. Also, immediately forward allegations of sexual misconduct to the PREA Coordinator.
  - 3) Note on the grievance form when circumstances do not indicate an emergency, notify the youth of this determination on the grievance form, and respond to the grievance in accordance with non-emergency procedures.
- g) The designated detention administrator shall respond to all non-emergency youth grievances as follows:
  - 1) Examine all relevant information concerning the issue being grieved, including interviewing witnesses and collecting documentation.
  - 2) Conduct a face-to-face meeting with the youth when the designated detention administrator determines there are serious issues related to safety, security, and well-being that are the subject of the grievance.
  - 3) Document all information sources on the response to youth grievance form (response form).
  - 4) When the designated detention administrator is capable of resolving the grievance, provide the youth with a response form within five working days of receipt, and forward a copy to the superintendent. The response shall include a description of the information considered and a rationale for the response.

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- 5) When the designated detention administrator is incapable of resolving the grievance, send the grievance form, all supporting documentation, and the partially-completed response form to the superintendent for review within five working days of receipt.
- h) Superintendents shall respond to youth grievances as follows:
  - 1) For emergency grievances, the superintendent shall provide the youth with a written response utilizing the grievance form within one working day of receipt and forward a copy for inclusion in the youth's file.
  - 2) For non-emergency grievances not resolved by the designated detention administrator, the superintendent shall review the grievance form and supporting documentation and provide the youth with a response form within five working days of the superintendent's receipt. A copy of the response form shall be forwarded for inclusion in the youth's file.
  - 3) For non-emergency grievances resolved by the designated detention administrator, the superintendent shall review the grievance form and supporting documentation and forward a copy for inclusion in the youth's file.
- i) A youth may appeal the designated detention administrator written response by completing the appeal section of the response form and sending the grievance form, response form, and supporting documentation to the superintendent within 5 calendar days of receiving the response. Upon receipt, the superintendent shall review the grievance and provide the youth with a written response within five working days.
- j) If the youth withdraws a grievance after submitting it, the designated detention administrator must document the withdrawal on the grievance form.

## Section 2602.170 Discipline

a) All facilities shall have a developmentally appropriate, research informed behavioral management program that supports the development of pro-social skills and provides positive reinforcement for good behavior. The program shall provide opportunities for immediate recognition of pro-social behavior as well as meaningful incentives and rewards for improvement and maintenance of desired

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behavior. The program shall also include potential sanctions for negative behavior that are developmentally appropriate, research informed, proportionate and fair.

## b) Written Rules

As part of the orientation process, prior to joining the programming, each youth shall receive a thorough verbal explanation of the rules and behavioral expectations as well as written copy of the rules and program. The verbal and written explanation shall include:

- 1) The rules and regulations governing, and rewards for, behavior.
- 2) A description of incentives and rewards.
- 3) A description of behaviors that may incur sanction.
- 4) Potential sanctions for negative behavior.
- 5) Authorized methods of seeking information and making complaints, including time frame for resolution of complaints and appeal procedures and access to an advocate.
- 6) All other matters necessary to enable youth to understand both their rights and obligations.
- c) Written Rules for Youth with limited English Proficiency or Youth with disabilities
  - If a youth has limited English proficiency or a disability, the facility shall provide a translator or interpreter to explain the rules in the youth's primary language or a manner to ensure the youth will understand. Written rules should be available in multiple languages common among youth in the community.
  - 2) Written Rules Preventing Sex Abuse PREA
    - A) The agency shall take appropriate steps to ensure that youth with disabilities (e.g., youth who are deaf or hard of hearing, who are blind or have low vision, who have intellectual, psychiatric, or speech disabilities), have an equal opportunity to participate in or

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benefit from all aspects of the agency's efforts to prevent, detect and respond to sexual abuse and sexual harassment. Steps shall include, when necessary to ensure effective communication with youth who are deaf or hard of hearing, providing access to interpreters who can interpret effectively, accurately, and impartially, both receptively and expressively, using any necessary specialized vocabulary. In addition, the agency shall ensure that written materials are provided in formats or through methods that ensure effective communication with youth with disabilities, including residents who have intellectual disabilities, limited reading skills, or who are blind or have low vision. An agency is not required to take actions that it can demonstrate would result in a fundamental alteration in the nature of a service, program or activity, or in undue financial and administrative burdens, as those terms are used in regulations promulgated under title II of the Americans With Disabilities Act, 28 CFR 35.164.

- B) The agency shall take reasonable steps to ensure meaningful access to all aspects of the agency's efforts to prevent, detect and respond to sexual abuse and sexual harassment to youth who are limited English proficient, including steps to provide interpreters who can interpret effectively, accurately and impartially, both receptively and expressively, using any necessary specialized vocabulary.
- C) The agency shall not rely on youth interpreters, readers, or other types of youth assistants except in limited circumstances where an extended delay in obtaining an effective interpreter could compromise the youth safety, the performance of first-response duties under Section 364 of PREA, or the investigation of the youth's allegations. (See Section 316 of PREA.).

# d) Grievances – PREA

Each youth shall be permitted to make requests or complaints to the detention administration, without censorship as to substance. Established protocols shall allow for multiple avenues to submit complaints to facility or department administrators.

1) The agency shall provide multiple internal ways for youth to privately report sexual abuse and sexual harassment, retaliation by other residents or

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staff for reporting sexual abuse and sexual harassment, and staff neglect or violation of responsibilities that may have contributed to such incidents.

- 2) The agency shall also provide at least one way for youth to report abuse or harassment to a public or private entity or office that is not part of the agency and that is able to receive and immediately forward youth reports of sexual abuse and sexual harassment to agency officials, allowing the resident to remain anonymous upon request. Youth detained pursuant to a judicial immigration warrant shall be provided information on how to contact relevant consular officials and relevant officials at the Department of Homeland Security.
- 3) Staff shall accept reports made verbally, in writing, anonymously and from third parties and shall promptly document any verbal reports.
- 4) The facility shall provide youth with access to tools necessary to make a written report.
- 5) The agency shall provide a method for staff to privately report sexual abuse and sexual harassment of residents. (See Section 351 of PREA.)
- 6) Exhaustion of Administrative Remedies

## A) Time Limits

- i) The agency shall not impose a time limit on when a youth may submit a grievance regarding an allegation of sexual abuse.
- ii) The agency may apply otherwise-applicable time limits on any portion of a grievance that does not allege an incident of sexual abuse.
- iii) The agency shall not require a youth to use any informal grievance process, or to otherwise attempt to resolve with staff, an alleged incident of sexual abuse.

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iv) Nothing in this Section shall restrict the agency's ability to defend against a lawsuit filed by a youth on the ground that the applicable statute of limitations has expired.

# B) The agency shall ensure that:

- i) A youth who alleges sexual abuse may submit a grievance without submitting it to a staff member who is the subject of the complaint, and
- ii) The grievance is not referred to a staff member who is the subject of the complaint.

## C) Final Decisions

- i) The agency shall issue its final decision on the merits of any portion of a grievance alleging sexual abuse within 90 days of the initial filing of the grievance.
- ii) Computation of the 90-day time period shall not include time consumed by youth in preparing any administrative appeal.
- iii) The agency may claim an extension of time to respond, of up to 70 days, if the normal time period for response is insufficient to make an appropriate decision. The agency shall notify the youth in writing of any extension and provide a date by which a decision will be made.
- iv) At any level of the administrative process, including the final level, if the youth does not receive a response within the time allotted for reply, including any properly noticed extension, the youth may consider the absence of a response to be a denial at that level.

#### D) Third Parties

i) Third parties, including fellow youth, staff members, family members, attorneys and outside advocates, shall be

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permitted to assist youth in filing requests for administrative remedies relating to allegations of sexual abuse, and shall also be permitted to file requests on behalf of youth.

- ii) If a third party, other than a parent or legal guardian, files a request on behalf of a youth, the facility may require as a condition of processing the request that the alleged victim agree to have the request filed on their behalf, and may also require the alleged victim to personally pursue any subsequent steps in the administrative remedy process.
- iii) If the youth declines to have the request processed on their behalf, the agency shall document the youth's decision.
- iv) A parent or legal guardian of a youth shall be allowed to file a grievance regarding allegations of sexual abuse, including appeals, on behalf of a youth. A grievance shall not be conditioned upon the youth agreeing to have the request filed on their behalf.

### E) Emergency Grievance

- i) The agency shall establish procedures for the filing of an emergency grievance alleging that a youth is subject to a substantial risk of imminent sexual abuse.
- ii) After receiving an emergency grievance alleging a youth is subject to a substantial risk of imminent sexual abuse, the agency shall immediately forward the grievance (or any portion thereof that alleges the substantial risk of imminent sexual abuse) to a level of review at which immediate corrective action may be taken, shall provide an initial response within 48 hours of receipt, and shall issue a final agency decision within 5 calendar days of receipt. The initial response and final agency decision shall document the agency's determination whether the youth is in substantial risk of imminent sexual abuse and the action taken in response to the emergency grievance.

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- F) The agency may discipline a youth for filing a grievance related to alleged sexual abuse only when the agency demonstrates that the youth filed the grievance in bad faith. (See Section 352 of PREA.)
- 7) The agency shall establish a method to receive third-party reports of sexual abuse and sexual harassment and shall distribute publicly information on how to report sexual abuse and sexual harassment on behalf of a youth. (See Section 354 of PREA.)
- 8) Youth Access to Outside Support Services and Legal Representation
  - A) The facility shall provide youth with access to outside victim advocates for emotional support services related to sexual abuse, by providing, posting or otherwise making accessible mailing addresses and telephone numbers, including toll free hotline numbers when available, of local, State, or national victim advocacy or rape crisis organizations, and, for persons detained solely for civil immigration purposes, immigrant services agencies. The facility shall enable reasonable communication between youth and these organizations and agencies, in as confidential a manner as possible.
  - B) The facility shall inform youth, prior to giving them access, of the extent to which communications will be monitored and the extent to which reports of abuse will be forwarded to authorities in accordance with mandatory reporting laws.
  - C) The agency shall maintain or attempt to enter into memoranda of understanding or other agreements with community service providers that are able to provide youth with confidential emotional support services related to sexual abuse. The agency shall maintain copies of agreements or documentation showing attempts to enter into such agreements.
  - D) The facility shall also provide youth with reasonable and confidential access to their attorneys or other legal representation and reasonable access to parents or legal guardians. (See Section 353 of PREA.)

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e)	Prohibited	F	unis	hment
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- 1) Youth shall not be deprived of the following basic rights as part of a disciplinary response:
  - A) Mattress, pillow, blanket, sheets;
  - B) Meals including evening snacks;
  - C) Clean clothes;
  - D) Personal hygiene items;
  - E) Daily exercise;
  - F) Approved phone calls;
  - G) Ability to send and receive mail;
  - H) Education;
  - I) Medical and mental health services:
  - J) Access to shower;
  - K) Visits with family or attorney;
  - L) Access to reading materials; and
  - M) Access to religious services/counseling.
- 2) Group punishment for the misbehavior of one or more youth is prohibited. Punishment must be meted out on an individual basis.
- 3) Corporal punishment or any punishment designed to humiliate or degrade youth is prohibited.
- f) Use of Force by a Staff Member

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When the use of force is authorized, only the least force necessary under the circumstances shall be employed. When force is used, a complete written report shall be made. The facility shall have written policy and procedures that clearly define the parameters for use of force. Use of force must be used as a last resort after de-escalation and other strategies have failed. Staff must be trained in acceptable methods of physical intervention.

- 1) Use of force must be limited to those situations where a youth's behavior is an immediate threat to themselves or to others.
- 2) Staff must use the least restrictive response necessary and only for the period of time necessary for the youth to gain control.
- 3) Pressure point control and pain compliance techniques are prohibited.
- 4) Restraining youth in a manner that restricts the airway is prohibited.
- 5) Supervisory staff shall debrief youth and staff involved in any use of force and develop strategies that might preclude future incidents.

# g) Use of Restraints

Mechanical restraints may only be used when other methods of control are not effective and only for the time necessary for the youth to regain control.

- 1) Restraints may not be used for disciplinary reasons.
- 2) Handcuffed youth must never be left alone.
- 3) Youth may not be handcuffed to stationary objects.
- 4) Placing youth in stress positions or hog-tying youth is prohibited.
- 5) Use of straitjackets, restraint chairs and four or five point restraints are prohibited.
- 6) Other instruments of restraint such as belly chains shall not be used except as a precaution against escape during transportation.

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- 7) Youth who are transported to court must have shackles or chains removed prior to entering the courtroom unless otherwise ordered by the judge.
- 8) When restraints are used, a full written report shall be made.
- 9) Restraints are prohibited on pregnant youth when in active labor.

## h) Chemical Agents

The use of chemical agents, including pepper spray, tear gas, and mace is generally prohibited. Chemical agents may be utilized when the youth's current behavior indicates that a physical hold or mechanical restraint would be impossible or insufficient to effectively diminish the imminent risk of serious harm. An unusual incident report shall be made pursuant to Section 2206.40(d) after any use of chemical agents.

## i) Room Confinement

The agency shall have written policies and procedures that limit the use of room confinement as punishment for rule violations. Voluntary requests for brief time outs by youth should be allowed and are not considered room confinement. Room confinement may be used only as a temporary response to behavior that threatens the safety of the youth or others.

- 1) Prior to use of room confinement, staff shall have employed de-escalation techniques.
- 2) Room confinement shall not be used for a fixed period of time, but only until the youth is calm enough to rejoin programming without being a risk to the safety of others.
- 3) Supervisory staff shall be notified immediately when room confinement is used.
- 4) Staff shall employ de-escalation techniques and engage the youth while the youth is confined.
- 5) Youth confined to their rooms shall be directly supervised or minimally checked every 30 minutes. Youth on crisis status shall be minimally checked every 10 minutes.

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- 6) At no time should room confinement exceed 4 hours without administrators and/or mental health staff developing an individualized plan to address the behavior.
- 7) A full written report shall be made whenever room confinement is used.

## Section 2602.180 Employment of Youth

### Work Assignments

Youth shall be expected to keep their rooms clean and assist with maintaining cleanliness of communal areas. Staff shall supervise all work assignments and provide necessary supplies and equipment. At no time shall youth perform any dangerous work or be exposed to toxic chemicals. If the facility chooses to offer opportunities for extra work assignments, positive behavioral incentives should be available for youth who volunteer.

### Section 2602.190 Mail Procedures

- a) Scope
  - Procedures for receiving and sending mail must protect the youth's personal rights and provide for reasonable security practices consistent with the function of a detention facility. A youth shall be allowed to correspond with anyone if the correspondence does not violate any State or federal law, except a youth shall not be allowed to correspond with the victims of the youth's current or any previous offense unless the victim has given consent in writing.
- b) Incoming Mail

Youth shall be permitted to receive an unlimited number of letters.

- 1) Incoming mail shall not be read, censored or reproduced but may be opened and examined for contraband or funds.
- 2) Cashier's checks, money orders, certified checks or cash shall be recorded in the youth's personal property record or trust fund account indicating the sender, amount and date.
- 3) Incoming letters containing contraband shall be held for further inspection and disposition by the superintendent.

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- A) Contraband received shall be handled with care and labeled with the date of receipt, the name and address of the sender, the name of the youth to whom it is addressed, and the date and names of persons handling same.
- B) The appropriate law enforcement agencies shall be notified, and the items safeguarded in the event they are to be used as evidence in criminal proceedings or disciplinary action.
- 4) All mail shall be distributed to the youth on the day it is received. A discharged or transferred youth's mail shall be forwarded unopened. If no forwarding address is available, mail shall be returned, unopened, to the sender.
- 5) A youth shall not be allowed to open, read or deliver another youth's mail.
- 6) Youth may receive books and periodicals subject to inspection by detention staff members. Packages may be received only if approved by administrative policy and shall be subject to inspection before being delivered to the youth.
- 7) The superintendent or designee shall retain the right to inspect non-privileged incoming mail when it is believed that security may be impaired.

### c) Outgoing Mail

Each youth shall be permitted to send, at personal expense, an unlimited number of letters.

- 1) Postage shall be provided to indigent youth for at least three letters per week.
- 2) Postage supplied to youth shall not be transferable.
- 3) Appropriate stationery, envelopes and a writing implement shall be supplied.
- 4) Youth may not send packages by mail unless granted permission to do so by the superintendent.

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- 5) Outgoing mail shall be collected Monday through Friday. Every effort shall be made to ensure that outgoing mail is delivered to the US Postal Service on the same day.
- The superintendent or designee shall retain the right to inspect non-privileged outgoing mail when it is believed that security may be impaired. Except for privileged mail, youth shall submit outgoing mail in unsealed envelopes.
- d) Outgoing Privileged Mail

Outgoing letters from youth to persons or organizations listed in this subsection (d) are privileged communications and may be sealed by the youth prior to submission for mailing. Letters shall not be opened by the detention staff before mailing and shall be dispatched promptly.

- 1) Elected or appointed federal or State officials including any U.S. Senator or Representative; any federal judge or the clerk of any federal court; the Attorney General of the United States; the Director of the Federal Bureau of Prisons; the Governor of the State of Illinois; any Illinois Circuit, Associate, Appellate or Supreme Court judge; the Illinois Attorney General; and any member of the Illinois General Assembly.
- 2) The Director of the Department; a Deputy Director of the Department; and the Chief of the Office of Detention and Audit Services of the Department.
- 3) Any attorney currently licensed to practice law.
- 4) All correspondence addressed to legal aid organizations and any other organization whose official declared purpose is to provide legal services for youth. These letters may be addressed either to paraprofessional personnel at the organization or to the organization office.
- 5) The John Howard Association.
- e) Incoming Privileged Mail

Incoming mail from persons or organizations identified in the preceding standard may be opened only for verifying the addressee and the addressor, and to

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ascertain that nothing other than legal and/or official matter is enclosed. Mail opening must be in the presence of the youth.

# f) Disciplinary Denial

Youth shall not be denied mail rights for disciplinary purposes; however, a serious violation of mail regulations may result in close scrutiny of mail.

g) Release, Transfer or Discharge

A released, transferred or discharged youth shall be permitted to take all personal mail.

# Section 2602.200 Telephone

a) Telephone Communication Upon Admittance
Each youth shall be given an opportunity to make a reasonable number of
telephone calls upon admittance to reach a parent, guardian, or an attorney. (Refer
to Notice of Rights, Section 2602.50(a).)

# b) Telephone Schedule

A schedule to permit each youth to place at least two telephone, free of charge, calls each week shall be established. Additional calls may be permitted by local administrative direction.

- 1) A minimum of 15 minutes shall be allotted for each phone call.
- 2) Telephone calls shall not be monitored; however, verification of the party called may be required.
- 3) A record of telephone calls, including date and person called, shall be maintained.

# c) Incoming Telephone Calls

Youth shall be allowed to receive a reasonable number of telephone calls from parents, guardians and clergy. These calls may be monitored. A designated time period each day shall be established by the administration for youth to receive calls so as not to interfere with the normal functions of the detention facility.

d) Calls with Attorneys

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Telephone calls with attorneys shall not be restricted and shall not count against the allotted number of calls. These calls shall be considered private and shall not be monitored. Verification of the attorney may be required.

e) Violation of Telephone Rules
Violation of detention rules governing the telephone program may result in
suspension of telephone usage for a designated period of time for the youth.

### Section 2602.210 Visiting

- a) Minimum Standards
  - 1) Visit Regulations
    The superintendent shall establish written procedures regarding visits.
    - A) A liberal visiting schedule shall be established identifying no fewer than two visiting days each week, one of which must be during the weekday evening hours and one during the weekend. Additionally, visiting shall be allowed on all legal holidays. A facility can, on a case-by-case basis, allow visits outside the normal visiting hours to ensure at least weekly visitation if the parents' or guardians' work schedule precludes visits during regular hours or a family emergency exists (e.g., death in family).
    - B) Facility policy shall prioritize family engagement with youth during custody. Minimally parents and grandparents shall be allowed visits with consideration for siblings, extended family, children of the youth and other concerned adults. A list of authorized visitors for each youth shall be developed in consultation with the assigned court services or aftercare worker.
    - C) No restriction shall be placed on visits by attorney, clergy, social workers, probation officers or other persons professionally associated with a youth's case at reasonable non-scheduled hours. These visits shall not count against any limitation that may be placed on the number of visits allowed.
    - D) Youth shall be authorized at least one hour for each visit.

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- E) Visits shall be supervised only to the extent that privacy is assured. Visits shall be contact visits unless specific concerns preclude contact visits for identified individuals.
- F) Facility policy shall have an option for video conferencing.
- 2) Privileged and Confidential Visitation An area for private interviews between youth and attorneys, religious advisors or other professional person shall be provided and arranged t

An area for private interviews between youth and attorneys, religious advisors or other professional person shall be provided and arranged to ensure privacy.

3) Security Precaution
All adult visitors shall be required to provide identification and sign a visitor register before being permitted to visit a youth.

## 4) Searches

The visiting area should be thoroughly searched before and after each visit. Visitors are subject to search, and a search notice sign must be conspicuously posted. Youth must be thoroughly searched after each contact visit. A strip search may be administered to a youth only when there is individualized, reasonable suspicion.

### b) Restrictions

- 1) Persons prohibited by court order from contact with a youth shall be denied visits.
- 2) Persons suspected to be under the influence of alcoholic beverages or drugs should be denied visits with youth.
- 3) Visitors shall be prohibited from bringing personal items in accordance with rules of contraband. Facilities shall provide, free of charge, space for individuals to secure personal belongings.

## **Section 2602.220 Detention Programs**

Programs designed to address the risk and needs of delinquent youth shall be provided to youth in custody either by staff or community providers. Programs may include drug and alcohol treatment, group or individual counseling, social and life skills training and family interventions.

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Facilities shall have in place an evidence-based positive behavior program that target criminogenic risk and needs of youth in custody.

## Section 2602.230 Education

## a) Education

Each facility must designate a qualified educational authority responsible for the development and implementation of the educational program. The educational authority must ensure that:

- 1) The program complies with State and federal education standards.
- 2) Teacher student ratios are at least 1:12 for general education and 1:8 for students with Individualized Education Programs (IEPs).
- Qualified special education staff are assigned to youth with special education status and special education testing is available for youth in custody.
- 4) IEPs are in place for youth with special education status. Teachers shall follow the IEP and document the progress.
- 5) Materials and resources are similar to what would be available in a public school.
- 6) All youth are enrolled immediately upon admission.
- b) A detention facility shall operate a 12 month long schedule of school instruction and programming with appropriately certified teachers that are licensed by the State Board of Education. There shall be a minimum of five hours of instruction per day.

## c) Curriculum

The curriculum shall supply instruction in language arts, mathematics, biological or physical sciences, social studies, fine arts and physical developmental health.

## d) Notification

A youth's home school shall be immediately notified of the youth's detention status. Detention school attendance is credited on the youth's home school

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attendance record. Facilities shall develop protocols to optimize the potential for youth to receive credit in their home schools for work in detention.

- e) Obtaining and Sharing of School Records
  There shall be a written policy for obtaining school records upon a youth's
  admission into detention and for sharing of school records when a youth leaves
  detention in accordance with the Section 6 of the Illinois School Student Records
  Act [105 ILCS 10].
- f) Class Size
  Class size shall not exceed 12 students per teacher.
  - 1) Classes shall be coeducational.
  - 2) Remedial classes shall be limited to a maximum of eight students.
- g) Classroom Size
  Classrooms shall provide no less than 150 square feet for the teacher and 20 square feet per student per room.
  - 1) Toilet and washbasin facilities must be located in or near the classroom.
  - 2) Equipment and supplies shall be of similar quality and quantity as provided in public school facilities.
- h) Arts and Crafts Room

Arts and crafts activities requiring special equipment (i.e., pottery, woodshop) shall have a special room provided.

- 1) Special equipment shall have safety devices available and safety operational signs posted.
- 2) Each youth shall be given a safety orientation lecture before using equipment.
- 3) Secure storage areas shall be provided for tools, supplies and unfinished projects.
- 4) Tools shall be inventoried at the end of each class session.

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- School Exempt Youth
   A schedule shall be established providing for separate activities for youth who have already obtained their high school diplomas or GED.
- j) Reporting
  - 1) Each facility shall file an annual education plan no later than August 1 with Office of Detention and Audit Services and the Administrative Offices of the Illinois Courts. Each annual plan shall contain the following:
    - A) Number of anticipated school days;
    - B) How the curriculum complies with State and federal standards;
    - C) How the facility will limit class size; and
    - D) How course credits will be calculated and awarded.
  - 2) Each facility shall file an annual education report no later than July 1 with Office of Detention and Audit Services and the Administrative Offices of the Illinois Courts. Each annual report shall include the following:
    - A) Number of students served, including;
      - i) males;
      - ii) females;
      - iii) ages;
      - iv) grade level;
      - v) Individualized Education Program; and
      - iv) Plan under Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (29 UCS 701).

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- B) Total number of actual school days; and
- C) Teacher to student ratios.

## Section 2602.240 Library

a) Library Services

Library services shall be made available to all youth.

- Library materials shall include up-to-date information and recreational and education resources appropriate to a variety of age ranges and reading abilities.
- 2) Reading material shall reflect varying racial, ethnic, recreational, religious, political and educational interests.
- b) Written Policy
  There shall be a written policy describing access to the library.
- c) Library Personnel

In the absence of a full-time librarian, whether employed by a public library system or on the staff of the detention facility, there shall be a staff member whose job assignment shall include ongoing development and maintenance of the library and act as the liaison with a public library.

## Section 2602.250 Religious Services

- a) Minimum Standards
  - Religious Services
     Youth shall be afforded an opportunity to participate in religious services and receive religious counseling.
  - 2) Compulsory Participation Youth shall not be required to attend, participate or be exposed to religious services or discussions, or denied the same. Youth who choose not to participate in religious services shall not be confined to their rooms but allowed to participate in an alternative activity.

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#### b) Recommendation

Parents or guardian of a youth should be contacted when the youth expresses a desire to attend religious services or to receive religious counseling in a faith other than that of the family.

## Section 2602.260 Recreation and Leisure Time

## a) Recreation

Vigorous physical activities, indoor and out, shall be a part of the daily schedule. Passive indoor activities, in addition to television viewing and radio listening, shall be included. At least one hour of physical recreation and one hour of additional leisure activity shall be scheduled each day.

## b) Exercise Area

Facilities shall include a gymnasium and outdoor space of sufficient area to allow strenuous physical exercise.

- 1) The exercise room must be at least 20 by 40 feet for facilities of less than 60 rated capacity.
- 2) Facilities of 60 or more rated capacity shall have a standard size gymnasium.
- 3) Areas for outdoor yard exercise must provide at least 200 square feet of recreation space per youth with a minimum size of 3,000 square feet.

## c) Restrooms

Toilet facilities shall be immediately accessible to youth off the play area of exercise rooms and outdoor yard areas.

## d) Exercise Equipment

Exercise areas shall be appropriately equipped and utilized within the limitations of security requirements.

## f) Written Policy

There shall be a written policy covering day-to-day exercise activities and schedules.

## Section 2602.270 New Design and Construction

## NOTICE OF ADOPTED RULES

- a) Department Approval
  - The Department shall approve all remodeling and new construction plans of detention facilities. The Department will assist architects in planning new facilities through consultation and review of preliminary and final drawings submitted to the Department for examination.
  - 1) The architect's preliminary drawings shall be reviewed by the Department.
  - 2) A complete set of final plans and specifications shall be submitted to include:
    - A) Architectural design;
    - B) Heating and ventilating system;
    - C) Plumbing specifications;
    - D) Electrical specifications;
    - E) Specifications for construction materials;
    - F) Equipment; and
    - G) Furnishings.
  - 3) Change orders in construction, subsequent to final plan approval, must be submitted to the Department.
  - 4) Plans showing the proposed building location must be submitted to the Illinois Department of Natural Resources to determine compliance with the Regulation of Construction within Flood Plains (17 Ill. Adm. Code 3706) and Construction Activities in Special Flood Hazard Areas (Executive Order 79-4, effective June 1, 1979).
- b) Compliance with Local and State Laws and Existing Standards for County Detention Homes
  - The Department shall withhold approval of a site or building design not complying with the requirements of or having the approval of local zoning

boards, county or municipal governing bodies or commissions, or other responsible agencies.

## c) Location

The site shall be located so as to:

- 1) Assure privacy for youth;
- 2) Insure against encroachment by future construction on adjacent property;
- 3) Permit future expansion of the facility; and
- 4) Be reasonably accessible by available public transportation.

## d) Rated Capacity

The rated capacity of each detention facility shall be established prior to construction.

## e) Lighting

Fixtures shall be tamperproof, recessed and provide a comfortable reading level (30 foot-candles). Building design shall provide for maximum natural light.

## f) Emergency Systems

Each facility shall be equipped with an automatic fire alarm system, including smoke and carbon monoxide detectors, fire sprinkler system and an emergency lighting system.

## g) Secure Doors

Placement and type of doors throughout a facility shall be of physical condition to ensure security and safety:

- 1) Doors shall be either 14 gauge hollow metal filled with sound absorbing insulation or a solid hardwood with metal covering. Doors to sleeping quarters and detention area corridors shall have a secure observation port.
- Door jambs shall be hinged to metal frames set securely in the wall.
   Hinges shall be concealed, tamperproof mounted and contain tamperproof hinge pins.

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## 3) Doors in Youth Quarters

- A) Shall have knobs on the corridor side only with a solid metal non-projecting finger pull on the room side; and
- B) Each door shall have a security-type ventilating feature unless air conditioning is provided.

## h) Corridors

When a central corridor design is used, the corridor must be no less than eight feet wide. It must be without turns and blind spots and be well-lighted.

- 1) Individual rooms shall be on each side of the corridor in a staggered fashion.
- 2) Doors shall swing open into the corridor.
- 3) The corridor shall provide direct entrance to the living area from the sleeping area.

## i) Admission Area

The admission area shall be accessible by separate entrance for youth being admitted and shall be:

- 1) Adjacent to the detention area.
- 2) Equipped with toilet, washbasin and shower facilities.
- 3) Provided with a medical examination room adjacent to the admission area.

## j) Storage

Adequate storage area shall be provided in the admission area and living unit area. Storage rooms, particularly janitor closets, shall be ventilated.

## k) Administration Area

The administration area shall provide adequate office space for private consultations. Staff washroom and shower areas shall be provided.

1) Detention Room Space

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Detention room floor space shall be a minimum of 80 square feet.

- Reason for Emergency: The reason for the emergency is to maintain compliance with the Equal Pay Act of 2003 [820 ILCS 112] and the Personnel Code [20 ILCS 415]. The Personnel Code underscores the public's interest in ensuring that the Pay Plan provides the fair and reasonable compensation of state employees for services rendered. The Equal Pay Act of 2003 underscores the public's interest in ensuring that compensation decisions are equal, not tainted by implicit or explicit discrimination, for the same or substantially similar work. State government and the Pay Plan comply with the Equal Pay Act of 2003 by complying with the Personnel Code in the Pay Plan.

The Personnel Code and Pay Plan reflect the public need for fair and reasonable compensation of state employees who provide vital services such as public health, social services, child protection, and public safety across Illinois and oversight of critical work within state government. The compensation of vital services and oversight contributes to retaining current and attracting new state employees. State agencies experience the

ongoing and increasing difficulty hiring and retaining merit compensation employees to perform the often-life-saving work and oversight.

The Pay Plan provides structural pay parity. Given the fiscal year 2022 (FY2022) pay provisions in collective bargaining agreements that alter bargaining unit pay grades, FY2022 merit compensation, including MS- and broad-banded, salary ranges require structural realignment. The structural realignment is to increase the maximum salaries of the merit compensation salary ranges by 3.95%. The realignment provides structural integrity throughout the Pay Plan.

The Pay Plan provides for employee pay parity. Given the FY2022 pay provisions in the collective bargaining agreements for a general salary increase for bargaining-unit-represented state employees, salaries of merit compensation state employees require a 3.95% salary cost-of-living adjustment. The adjustment provides employee pay integrity throughout the Pay Plan.

The merit compensation adjustment and increase to maximum salaries in merit compensation salary ranges maintains pay parity throughout the Pay Plan during FY2022. Because the pay structure and employee compensation is integral to the State's ability to retain and attract merit compensation employees to provide for the health, safety and welfare of the public, the State's best interest is served by undertaking the salary adjustment for merit compensation state employees and the structural realignment of the merit compensation salary ranges effective at the beginning of FY2022, July 1, 2021.

10) <u>A Complete Description of the Subjects and Issues Involved</u>: In the table of contents, the fiscal year in the heading for Section 310.550 is changed.

In Section 310.530 subsection (c), the fiscal year is changed to incorporate a FY2022 cost-of-living adjustment into the Merit Compensation System implementation.

In Section 310.550, the fiscal year in the heading is changed. The effective year is changed to 2021 and the percentage amount of the adjustment is changed to 3.95%.

In Sections 310.Appendices D and G, the maximum base salary within each salary range is increased by 3.95%.

#### SUBPART B: APPLICABILITY

# Section 50.230 Child Care Eligibility EMERGENCY

a) To the extent resources permit, it is the intent of the Department to provide child care services to all applicants that meet the eligibility requirements set forth in this Section. If it is necessary to limit participation to stay within the amounts appropriated or resources available to the Department for child care services, participation will be limited to the priority service groups specified in subsection (c)(6) and that limitation in participation shall remain until such time as sufficient resources are available to serve all eligible applicants.

#### NOTICE OF EMERGENCY AMENDMENTS

- b) To be eligible for child care services, a child shall at the time of eligibility determination or redetermination:
  - 1) be under 13 years of age (if a child turns 13 years old during the eligibility period, that child shall remain eligible for CCAP for the remainder of the eligibility period); or
  - 2) be under age 19 and under court supervision or have physical, developmental, or intellectual disabilities as documented by a statement from a local health provider or other health professional.
- c) Parents and other relatives eligible to receive child care services include:
  - 1) Clients who receive Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) under Article IV of the Public Aid Code participating in work and/or training-related activities as specified in their Responsibility and Service Plan (RSP) (see 89 Ill. Adm. Code 112.74) as approved by the Department's TANF case worker.
  - Working families, including teen parents enrolled full-time in elementary or high school or high school equivalency classes to obtain a high school diploma or its equivalent, whose monthly incomes do not exceed the following amounts by family size at the time of initial program application:

These income guidelines will be indexed annually so that the thresholds are no less and no more than 85% of the most current SMI level for each family size.

- 5) If the countable income for a family is between 250225% FPL and 85% SMI at the end of an eligibility period, and all other eligibility factors are met, the family will be eligible for a 90-day graduated phase-out period that begins the first day of the new eligibility period. If the family requests child care assistance at any time after the graduated phase-out period, the request must be treated as a new application and the family must have family income below 200% of FPL to qualify.
- 6) Families who do not receive TANF and need child care services in order to attend school or training (up to and including the acquisition of the first Bachelor's Degree) whose monthly income does not exceed the monthly income ceilings in subsection (c)(2). Clients can be approved for education/training activities that will lead to multiple certificates within a designated career path (e.g., from Certified Nursing Assistant to Licensed Practical Nurse) or Associate Degrees, but only the first Bachelor's Degree. Clients may also be approved for additional vocational certificate programs if they are beginning a new career path in a new field or if classes are required to remain certified in their current employment. Child care services approved under this Part must be reasonably related to the education or training activity, including class hours and research, study, laboratory, library and transportation time, and unpaid educationally required work activities such as student teaching, an internship, a clinical, a practicum or an apprenticeship. Teen parents enrolled full-time in elementary or high school or high school equivalency classes will be eligible for full-time, full-year child care, including summers, when using a licensed child care provider, up to and including a three-month period after graduation, in order to secure employment or to prepare for higher education. If a parent is claimed as a dependent by another person for federal income tax purposes, that parent is only eligible if his or her income, when added to the income of the other person, does not exceed the monthly income ceiling in subsection (c)(2) for that family size. All education programs under this Part must be administered by an educational institution accredited under requirements of State law, including, but not limited to, the Barber, Cosmetology, Esthetics, Hair Braiding, and Nail Technology Act of 1985 [225 ILCS 410], the Real

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Estate Act of 2000 [225 ILCS 454], the Public Community College Act [110 ILCS 805], the University of Illinois Act [110 ILCS 305], the Chicago State University Law [110 ILCS 660], the Eastern Illinois University Law [110 ILCS 665], the Governors State University Law [110 ILCS 670], the Illinois State University Law [110 ILCS 675], the Northeastern Illinois University Law [110 ILCS 680], the Northern Illinois University Law [110 ILCS 685], the Western Illinois University Law [110 ILCS 690], or the Department of Financial and Professional Regulation. Social service agencies that provide recognized English as a Second Language (ESL) and other adult education courses and programs are not required to hold or maintain any separate type of accreditation, as long as the program they offer is supported by an accredited institution.

- A) Below Post-Secondary Education Eligibility and Participation Requirements
  - This category of education includes literacy and other adult basic education, English as a Second Language, and high school equivalency examination preparation programs. Clients/applicants who have already earned a vocational certificate are still eligible for below post-secondary education activities if they have not already earned a high school diploma or high school equivalency certificate.
  - i) There is no work requirement for the first 24 non-consecutive months the client participates. Families eligible to receive child care services while they attend an education or training program under this Section must not already possess a Bachelor's, Master's or Doctorate Degree.
  - ii) From the 25<sup>th</sup> month on, the client must work at least 20 hours per week. Child care provided to a teen parent to obtain a high school diploma or its equivalent does not count against this 24-month limit. Individuals enrolled in below post-secondary education must maintain a "C" average if this measurement is used by the institution to determine satisfactory progress. The client will be allowed one eligibility period below a "C" average to bring the grades up to a "C" average. When grades are not used, progress will be determined by the written policy of the

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institution to establish a comparable grade level upon completion of the academic term. The determination of satisfactory progress must be reported upon completion of each eligibility period.

- B) Vocational Education Eligibility and Participation Requirements
  Programs in this category of education may be offered by a public
  community college, public or private university, or private
  business/technical school.
  - i) The program usually results in the receipt of a Certificate of Achievement or Completion and/or prepares the client for a specific job or to obtain a license required by some occupations. Families eligible to receive child care services while they attend an education or training program under this Section must not already possess a Bachelor's, Master's or Doctorate Degree. Clients/applicants may be approved for multiple vocational certificate programs if they are within a designated career path (e.g., from Certified Nursing Assistant to Licensed Practical Nurse) or are beginning a new career path in a new field, or if classes are required to remain certified in their current employment.
  - ii) There is no work requirement for the first 24 non-consecutive months the client participates. From the 25<sup>th</sup> month on, the client must work at least 20 hours per week. Individuals enrolled in vocational education must maintain a "C" average if this measurement is used by the institution to determine satisfactory progress. The client will be allowed one eligibility period below a "C" average to bring the grades up to a "C" average. When grades are not used, progress will be determined by the written policy of the institution to establish a comparable grade level upon completion of the academic term. The determination of satisfactory progress must be reported upon completion of each eligibility period.
- C) Post-Secondary Education

#### NOTICE OF EMERGENCY AMENDMENTS

- i) This category of education includes all undergraduate college level courses that could result in an Associate or the client's first Bachelor's Degree. Families eligible to receive child care services while they attend an education or training program under this Section must:
  - be enrolled in a program accredited under requirements of State law as stated in subsection (c)(3).
  - not already have a Bachelor's, Master's or Doctorate Degree, if requesting child care to earn an Associate Degree. Child care will not be approved for attainment of a second Associate Degree.
  - not be in an, or have completed an, advanced degree program (beyond a Bachelor's Degree). Child care will not be approved for education beyond the attainment of a Bachelor's Degree.
- ii) There is no work requirement for the first 48 nonconsecutive months the client participates. From the 49<sup>th</sup> month on, the client must work at least 20 hours per week. Clients who do not work and who need child care to attend college must maintain a 2.5 grade point average (GPA) (on a 4.0 scale) if this measurement is used by the institution to determine satisfactory progress. Clients who work 20 hours or more per week in paid employment while they attend college must maintain a 2.0 GPA (on a 4.0 scale). In the absence of a GPA, satisfactory progress will be determined by the written policy of the institution. The determination of satisfactory progress, including test/retest results or GPA, must be reported upon completion of each eligibility period. If the client's GPA falls below 2.5 or 2.0 for those students who work or at any time the client does not maintain satisfactory progress, the client may continue to go to school for another eligibility period. If the GPA is below 2.5 or 2.0 two eligibility periods in a row, the client

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will be ineligible for child care until his or her GPA is at or above 2.5 or 2.0.

- D) For child care services received under education/training, a parent enrolled in web-based courses or correspondence learning from an accredited university or college is only eligible for child care assistance if both of the following are met:
  - The class is offered only at a regularly scheduled time (i.e., 11:00 a.m. every Monday and Wednesday) or the parent must leave the home to have access to a computer.
  - ii) The child or children for whom care is requested must be under the age of six, except during the summer or school breaks. Care shall not be authorized during the hours the child is in school or is home schooled, or if the child is in a two-parent family when the other parent is available to care for the child.
- E) Study Time
  Child care services may be granted for up to one hour of study time per week for each classroom hour or course credit. When possible, study periods should be arranged around regularly scheduled classes in order to provide a consistent and uninterrupted routine for children in care. Study time granted to add an extra day of care must be approved first by the

Department's Bureau of Child Care and Development Policy Unit.

- 8) Relatives (other than parents) who receive child-only TANF benefits as a Representative Payee for children in need of care while they work.
- 9) Families with active CCAP cases in which all parents in the household are called into active military duty and the relative caregivers are employed or in an approved education/training activity.
- 10) In the event the Department must limit participation due to insufficient appropriations or available resources, applicants included in the priority service groups are:

#### NOTICE OF EMERGENCY AMENDMENTS

- A) Recipients of Temporary Assistance for Needy Families as described in subsection (c)(1);
- B) Teen parents enrolled full-time in elementary school, high school or high school equivalency classes to obtain a high school degree or its equivalent;
- C) Families engaged in an eligible employment and/or educational activity with a special needs child and family income that does not exceed 185% of FPL for their family size;
- D) Working families whose monthly incomes do not exceed 185% of the most current FPL for their family size;
- E) Families that are not recipients of TANF whose monthly incomes do not exceed 185% of the most current FPL for their family size that need child care assistance to participate in education and training.
- d) All families must reside in Illinois.
- e) Payment for child care services to eligible parents may begin:
  - 1) if care was provided at the time and all eligibility factors are met, on either:
    - A) the date of the parent's signature on the Child Care Assistance Program (CCAP) application (Form 444-3455); or
    - B) one week (seven calendar days) prior to the stamped date of receipt of the CCAP application (Form 444-3455) by the Department or its agents, whichever is later; or
  - 2) on the date the child care provider actually begins providing child care services, if the application is received in advance of services being provided and all eligibility factors are met.
- f) Approval of payments will cease no less than 10 calendar days after the date of the termination notice sent to the parent by the Department or its agents following

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a determination of ineligibility. Care will be terminated immediately if it is determined the child is no longer enrolled with the approved provider or the family requests that its case be terminated.

#### SUBPART A: GENERAL PROVISIONS

# Section 1775.100 Purpose EMERGENCY

- a) Under the FY022 Budget Implementation Act, the Department of Public Health and the Department of the Lottery are authorized to *develop and offer a promotion and award prizes for the purpose of encouraging Illinois residents to be vaccinated against coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19).* [20 ILCS 1605/21.14 and 20 ILCS 2310/2310-628].
- b) The Department of Public Health and the Department of the Lottery have jointly determined the structure of the Promotion, which is *aimed at Illinois residents receiving COVID-19 vaccinations*. [20 ILCS 1605/21.14 and 20 ILCS 2310/2310-628].
- c) The Coronavirus Vaccine Incentive Public Health Promotion consists of a single Promotion with prizes totaling \$10 million dollars, entitled "All In For the Win."
  - 1) A portion of the Promotion includes educational awards for the benefit of minors. [20 ILCS 1605/21.14 and 20 ILCS 2310/2310-628].

#### NOTICE OF EMERGENCY RULES

- 2) A portion of the Promotion includes cash prizes for Illinois residents aged 18 years or older on the date of the drawing.
- d) The Promotion is a public outreach campaign consisting of a series of statewide and regional drawings to raise awareness and increase the number of Illinoisans who are vaccinated for COVID-19. Entries into the Promotional drawings are automatic upon an individual receiving at least one dose of the COVID-19 vaccination in Illinois and the vaccination information having been received and accepted by the Illinois Comprehensive Automated Immunization Registry Exchange (I-CARE) system by the time the draw pool is created, subject to the eligibility requirements set forth by these joint rules.
- e) These joint rules set forth the procedures for eligibility, drawing, winner identification, validation, notification and processing of winners from the \$10 million Promotion between July 8, 2021, and August 26, 2021. The cross-reference to the joint rule provisions for the Department Public Health is found in 77 Ill. Adm. Code 997.

# Section 1775.105 Definitions EMERGENCY

"Administrators" means the agency heads or the persons who are designated by the agency heads of Department of Public Health and the Department of the Lottery.

"Department of Public Health" or "IDPH" means the Illinois Department of Public Health.

"Department of the Lottery" means the Illinois Department of the Lottery.

"I-CARE" means the Illinois Comprehensive Automated Immunization Registry Exchange.

"Manager" means Camelot Illinois, LLC acting in its capacity as private manager or its successor designated by the Illinois Department of the Lottery.

"Treasurer" means the Illinois State Treasurer's Office.

#### NOTICE OF EMERGENCY RULES

"Promotion" means the "All In For the Win" Coronavirus Vaccine Incentive Public Health Promotion, authorized by the Illinois Lottery Law [20 ILCS 1605/21.14] and the Department of Public Health Powers and Duties Law of the Civil Administrative Code of Illinois [20 ILCS 2310/2310-628].

"Promotion Entities" means the Administrators and Manager.

# Section 1775.110 Responsibilities and Duties EMERGENCY

- a) The following are the responsibilities and duties of the Department of Public Health:
  - 1) Use I-CARE system to create the drawing pool for each drawing: the total number of eligible entries for each drawing (number of entries for each Scholarship Award drawing and for each Cash Prize drawing) as well the number of selections to be made (the winner and a number of alternates).
  - 2) Anonymize each individual in the pool by number.
  - 3) Receive from the Department of the Lottery a winner and at least five alternates, selected by random number generator based on the total number of entries.
  - 4) Identify the vaccinated individual whose number corresponds to the winning number drawn by the Department of the Lottery.
  - 5) Contact winners and obtain Authorization Form.
  - 6) IDPH will not provide the Department of the Lottery or the Treasurer any personal identifying information about any vaccinated individual without prior consent from the individual.
- b) The following are the responsibilities and duties of the Department of the Lottery:
  - 1) Conduct the drawings using a random number generator based on the total number of entries.

#### NOTICE OF EMERGENCY RULES

- 2) For each drawing, transmit to the IDPH a winner and at least five alternates.
- 3) Upon receipt of Authorization Form from IDPH, contacts the winner to assist with claiming of prize.
- c) IDPH will work with the Illinois State Treasurer's Office to establish the creation of Bright Start scholarship accounts for Promotion winners that are minors upon receipt of signed Authorization Forms from the guardians of these winners.

# **Section 1775.115 Agreement to the Game Rules EMERGENCY**

All winners claiming a prize in the Promotion fully and unconditionally agree to and accept the Game Rules found on the State of Illinois website: https://allin.illinois.gov and the decisions of the Administrators as final and binding in all matters related to the Promotion.

# **Section 1775.120 How to Enter EMERGENCY**

Entries are automatic upon an individual receiving, at a minimum, a single shot of the COVID-19 vaccination in Illinois and having their vaccination information received and accepted as valid by the I-CARE, prior to 11:59 p.m. Central Time 7 days prior to each drawing, in order to be included in each drawing.

# Section 1775.125 Pre-Drawing Procedures EMERGENCY

Before each drawing, the Department of Public Health will do the following:

- a) filter I-CARE for relevant drawing parameters, including:
  - 1) statewide and regional drawings, in the Restore Illinois Regions;
  - 2) for scholarship awards, individuals between the ages 12-17 years old; or
  - 3) for cash prizes, individuals over the age of 18 years old.
- b) remove duplicates of vaccinated individuals drawn from I-Care.

#### NOTICE OF EMERGENCY RULES

- c) assign a sequential number to each entry in I-CARE.
- d) provide the Department of the Lottery with the total number of entries for the drawing (IDPH will not provide any I-CARE data to the Department of the Lottery).

# Section 1775.130 Drawings EMERGENCY

The Department of the Lottery shall conduct each drawing as follows:

- a) The Department of the Lottery will conduct the drawings using a random number generator based on the total number of entries for each drawing.
- b) For each drawing, the Department of the Lottery's random number generator will select the appropriate number of winners and alternates.
- c) The Department of the Lottery will send the selected numbers to the Department of Public Health.
- d) The Department of Public Health will maintain a record of these numbers for recordkeeping purposes and in the event an alternate winner is needed.

# Section 1775.135 Winner Notification EMERGENCY

- a) If an individual's entry is selected in a Promotion drawing, the individual will be contacted by phone and/or e-mail, by the Department of Public Health. In order to receive the prize, the winner will be required to complete, sign, and return an Authorization Form with a copy of the individual's personal identification to, IDPH at the address included on the Authorization Form within the allotted time.
- b) Prior to contacting the winner, IDPH will confirm that the winner meets the eligibility requirements contained in Section 1775.200.
- c) Upon submission of the signed Authorization Form, IDPH will release to the Department of the Lottery or to the Treasurer the Authorization Form that includes the individual's name, address, email address, telephone numbers,

COVID-19 vaccination status, and the individual's public disclosure preferences as set out in the Authorization Form.

# Section 1775.140 Alternative Winner EMERGENCY

The Department of Public Health will bypass the winner and move to the next alternate when:

- a) The winner does not meet the eligibility requirements contained in Section 1775.200; or
- b) IDPH is unable to make contact with the winner after exhausting the contact information provided to IDPH for reasons including, but not limited to, a lack of contact information such as phone number or email address; or
- c) The winner does not execute the Authorization Form and return it via email to DPH.Communications@illinois.gov or faxed to 312-793-7963 by 4:30 p.m. 7 calendar days after the draw date.

# Section 1775.145 Claiming Deadline EMERGENCY

- a) Winners must claim their prize by 4:30 p.m. Central Time on the claiming deadline date as identified in Section 1775.205.
- b) If a winner refuses the prize, has been disqualified, or by the relevant claiming deadline has not claimed, submitted all required documentation, and information, including completing associated forms, or if any prize/prize notification has been returned as undeliverable, the winner will be disqualified and an alternate winner will be selected.
- c) A decision to replace a winner with an alternate is within the sole discretion and judgment of the Administrators.
  - 1) After IDPH proceeds to an alternate, the person who was previously selected as a winner is no longer entitled to the prize.
  - 2) The previously selected winner or any potential beneficiary may not assert any right or remedy on account of any disqualification, or other action.

#### NOTICE OF EMERGENCY RULES

- d) In the event of a winner's death or inability to claim the prize, the Department of the Lottery will make a determination regarding the awarding of the cash prize and IDPH will coordinate with the Treasurer in making a determination regarding the awarding of the scholarship prize. The decision will be final.
- e) All checks for cash prizes are provided by the Illinois Office of the Comptroller. Scholarship prizes will be provided as a Bright Start 529 College Savings scholarship that is administered by the Treasurer.

# **Section 1775.150 General Prize and Promotional Offer Restrictions EMERGENCY**

- a) The Promotion is subject to availability and change. No substitution is allowed by winner.
- b) The Promotion and prize are not exchangeable or otherwise transferable. The Administrators reserve the right to substitute the prize in whole or in part with other prizes of comparable or greater value, if the intended prize is not available for any reason, as determined by the Administrators.
- c) Any transportation and/or lodging are not included. The winners will be exclusively and solely responsible for all costs and expenses associated with Promotion prize redemption and prize acceptance and use that is not described as being provided, including but not limited to any expenses incurred by redeeming a Promotion prize or accepting a Promotion prize.
- d) The Promotion is governed by and shall be construed in accordance with Illinois law and is subject to all applicable federal, State, and local laws and regulations.
- e) Any and all taxes, including but not limited to federal, State, and local taxes, are the exclusive and sole responsibility of the winners. The winners shall provide their Social Security number or Electronic Transmitter Identification Number (ETIN) and appropriate tax documentation for tax reporting purposes. If required, the Administrators will file an IRS Form 1099 or similar document with the Internal Revenue Service for the fair market value of any prize. The winner will receive a W-2G form from the Lottery for the prize won. All amounts or values paid will be included in the taxable income the Lottery will report on the W-2G. The winner will be taxed on those amounts. The minimum required federal and

State taxes will be withheld from all cash prizes over \$5,000; additional amounts may be owed.

f) If the winner owes any State Obligations, then the cash prize will be applied first to unpaid State Obligations. The total amount of cash won, less tax withholdings and any State Obligations will be issued to the winner. "State Obligations" include, but are not limited to, child support and debt owed to a State agency or other governmental entity.

#### SUBPART B: VACCINATION INCENTIVE PRIZES

# Section 1775.200 Eligibility EMERGENCY

- a) The Promotion is open to individuals who, at the time of draw, are at least 18 years of age (for cash prizes) or 12-17 years of age (for scholarship awards), are residents of Illinois, have received at least a single shot of the COVID-19 vaccination in Illinois and had their vaccine information received and accepted as valid by I-CARE prior to 11:59 p.m. Central Time 7 days prior to each drawing during the Promotion Period.
- b) In addition, the following persons are not eligible to enter this Promotion or claim a prize:
  - any member of the Lottery Control Board ("Board"), any employee of the Illinois Lottery, any employees of the Manager, and certain other contractors and agents of the Illinois Lottery;
  - 2) any officers or employees of the Administrators or the Office of the Governor or Lieutenant Governor;
  - any officer, official, contractor or employee of the Department of Public Health who assisted in the creation of this Promotion, or in carrying out any of the drawings;
  - 4) officers and employees of audit firms performing service for the Illinois Lottery in administering the drawings for the Promotion;

- 5) any spouse, child, or family member residing as a member of the same household in the principal place of residence of any person designated in subsection (b)(1) through (b)(4); and
- any participant in the Lottery's Voluntary Exclusion Program or individual who has otherwise requested in writing to be excluded from this Promotion.
- c) The federal government will not provide IDPH with a list of Illinoisans who were vaccinated at certain federal facilities (e.g. U.S. Bureau of Prisons), so these individuals are not eligible for this Promotion. It is not possible for individuals to submit their records to IDPH;
- d) For those who received a COVID-19 vaccine at a federal Department of Veterans Affairs facility in Illinois, IDPH will work with DVA to obtain information in order to include eligible DVA patients in the Promotion and assist in notifying any winning DVA patient, as necessary.
- e) Individuals who meet the eligibility requirements of this Section will be entered in the next drawing during this Promotion.
- f) Eligible individuals may not win more than one prize during this Promotion. Any individual who wins a prize during this Promotion will be excluded from future drawings.

- a) The Department will conduct on-site reviews of approved sexual assault treatment plans with hospital, and approved pediatric health care facility, and approved federally qualified health care personnel at least once during each 3-year approval period to ensure that the established procedures are being followed. (Section 2.05-12.05(a) of the Act)
- b) If the Department determines that the hospital, or approved pediatric health care facility, or approved federally qualified health center is not in compliance with its approved plan, the Department will provide the hospital, or approved pediatric

health care facility, or approved federally qualified health center with a written list of the specific items of noncompliance within 10 working days after the conclusion of the on-site review. The hospital, or approved pediatric health care facility, or approved federally qualified health center shall have 10 working days to submit to the Department a plan of correction that contains the hospital's, or approved pediatric health care facility's, or approved federally qualified health center's specific proposals for correcting the items of noncompliance. The Department will review the plan of correction and notify the hospital, or approved pediatric health care facility, or approved federally qualified health center in writing within 10 working days as to whether the plan is acceptable or unacceptable. (Section 2.2-12-1(a) of the Act)

- c) The plan of correction must include the following specific proposals for correcting items of noncompliance:
  - 1) A time frame for implementing corrections;
  - 2) A description of the activity that will be undertaken to correct the items of noncompliance;
  - 3) Identification of the person or persons responsible for implementing the corrections; and
  - 4) A description of how the requirements of the Act and this Part will be met.
- d) If the Department finds the plan of correction unacceptable, the hospital, or approved pediatric health care facility, or approved federally qualified health center shall have 10 working days to resubmit an acceptable plan of correction. Upon notification that its plan of correction is acceptable, a hospital, or approved pediatric health care facility, or approved federally qualified health center shall implement the plan of correction within 60 days. (Section 2.1-12.1(a) of the Act)
- e) The failure of a hospital to submit an acceptable plan of correction or to implement the plan of correction, within the time frames required in this Section, will subject a hospital to the imposition of a fine by the Department. The Department will impose a fine of up to \$500 per day until the Department has determined that the hospital is in compliance with the requirements of the Act and this Section. (Section 2.1(b) of the Act)

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licensees, the apprenticeship education expense credit, the enterprise zone and high impact business construction jobs credits, appeals to the Tax Tribunal, and the Illinois Secure Choice Savings Program Act.

Changes will be made to Section 130.311 to reflect the amendments made by P.A. 102-0004 regarding testing materials and needles that qualify for the 1% rate of tax. Changes will be made to Section 130.120(vv) to reflect the extension of the sunset date for the exemption for menstrual pads, tampons and menstrual cups contained in P.A. 102-0016. Changes will be made to Section 130.425 to reflect the amendments to Section 1 of the Act made by SB0058enr, if it becomes law, regarding the removal of the limits on traded-in property. Changes will be made to Section 130.2050 to increase the presumed average cost of free meals provided to employees for purposes of establishing employers' Use Tax liability and to specify tax is to be paid at

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the rate that would have been imposed when the employer acquired the goods from the supplier.

## 2021-124 Gubernatorial Disaster Proclamation

**WHEREAS**, on the morning of June 29, 2021, a large industrial fire erupted at a battery storage facility located at 900 E. Benton Street, in Morris, Grundy County, Illinois; and

**WHEREAS**, nearly 100 tons of lithium batteries – an unprecedented amount – were stored at the site of the fire and provide a source of fuel for the fire; and

**WHEREAS**, the potentially hazardous nature of the smoke from the fire prompted local officials in the City of Morris to issue an evacuation order; and

**WHEREAS**, at my direction, personnel from the Illinois National Guard have been deployed to the scene of the fire to assist with the response; and

**WHEREAS**, the presence of lithium as a source of fuel for the fire has complicated the response to the fire, and creates a potential for flare-ups that may necessitate additional fire-fighting efforts; and

**WHEREAS**, to prepare for potential flare-ups, immediate disaster-related purchases are required, including for measures to contain runoff from any additional fire-fighting efforts; and

**WHEREAS**, reports received by the Illinois Emergency Management Agency indicate that local resources and capabilities have been exhausted and that state resources are needed to respond to and recover from the effects of this fire; and

**WHEREAS**, these circumstances give rise to an occurrence or threat of widespread or severe damage, injury or loss of life or property resulting from fire, and constitute a disaster as provided in Section 4 of the Illinois Emergency Management Agency Act; and,

**WHEREAS**, it is the policy of the State of Illinois that the State will be prepared to address any disasters and, therefore, it is necessary and appropriate to make additional State resources available to ensure that Illinoisans remain safe and secure; and,

**WHEREAS**, these conditions provide legal justification under section 7 of the Illinois Emergency Management Act for the issuance of a proclamation of disaster; and

**WHEREAS**, the Illinois Constitution, in Article V, Section 8, provides that "the Governor shall have the supreme executive power, and shall be responsible for the faithful execution of the laws," and states, in the Preamble, that a central purpose of the Illinois Constitution is "provide for the health, safety, and welfare of the people";

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#### **PROCLAMATIONS**

**NOW, THEREFORE**, in the interest of aiding the people of Illinois and the local governments responsible for ensuring public health and safety, I, JB Pritzker, Governor of the State of Illinois, hereby proclaim as follows:

- **Section 1.** Pursuant to the provisions of Section 7 of the Illinois Emergency Management Agency Act, 20 ILCS 3305/7, I find that a disaster exists within the State of Illinois and specifically declare Grundy County as a disaster area. The proclamation authorizes the exercise of all of the emergency powers provided in Section 7 of the Illinois Emergency Management Agency Act, 20 ILCS 3305/7, including but not limited to those specific emergency powers set forth below.
- **Section 2.** The Illinois Emergency Management Agency is directed to activate the State Emergency Operations Plan and coordinate State resources to support local governments in disaster response and recovery operations.
- **Section 3.** To aid with emergency purchases necessary for response and other emergency powers as authorized by the Illinois Emergency Management Agency Act, the provisions of the Illinois Procurement Code that would in any way prevent, hinder or delay necessary action in coping with the disaster are suspended to the extent they are not required by federal law. If necessary, and in accordance with Section 7(1) of the Illinois Emergency Management Agency Act, 20 ILCS 3305/7(1), the Governor may take appropriate executive action to suspend additional statutes, orders, rules, and regulations.
- **Section 4.** Pursuant to Section 7(3) of the Illinois Emergency Management Agency Act, 20 ILCS 3305/7(3), this proclamation activates the Governor's authority, as necessary, to transfer the direction, personnel or functions of State departments and agencies or units thereof for the purpose of performing or facilitating emergency response programs.
- **Section 5.** All State agencies are directed to cooperate with the Governor, other State agencies and local authorities in the development and implementation of strategies and plans to respond to and recover from the impacts of the present disaster.
- **Section 6.** This proclamation can facilitate a request for Federal disaster assistance if a complete and comprehensive assessment of damage indicates that effective recovery is beyond the capabilities of the State and affected local governments.
- **Section 7.** This proclamation shall be effective immediately and remain in effect for 30 days.
